

Coal Meeting

There was standing room only at the public meeting called by Leicestershire County Council at Packington School on January 19 to enable villagers to air their views on a planning application by UK Coal for permission to start open-cast mining on a site at Long Moor, between Ravenstone, Heather and Normanton le Heath.

The meeting was presided over by Cr David Jennings, chairman of the county council's development control board, and he and other councillors and officers attending were left in no doubt that the 100-plus people present were unanimous in objecting to the proposal.

This would involve the extraction of 725,000 tonnes of coal, averaging 5,754 tonnes per week over 126 weeks. A road and new access would be constructed to the north of the extraction area on to the C7110 Ashby Road. All lorry traffic would turn left on to the Ashby Road to its junction with the C7116 at Alton Hill, where it would turn right to the A511 and then left to the A42. There would be an average of 78 lorry movements a day from the site, equivalent to six per hour. Operating hours would be from 7am to 7pm Monday to Friday, and 7am to 12 noon on Saturdays.

There would be no working on Sundays or Bank Holidays

North West Leicestershire District councillor Nigel Smith, who represents Ravenstone and Packington, said that his council's minerals group had already recommended rejection of the application. He himself was emphatically against it on environmental, health and safety grounds. Airborne dust, which it was impossible to control, would affect residents and exacerbate asthma and other respiratory diseases. There were two schools in the area, at Ravenstone and Packington, whose pupils should not be subjected to such a health hazard. The noise was likely to be considerable and the roads to be used were dangerous and unsuitable accidents were bound to happen.



A representative of FOIL (Fight Opencast in Leicestershire) said that hundreds of letters of objection had been received from parishioners of the villages close to the site and these would be forwarded to the county council

Other points stressed by those attending the meeting included the fact that the "78 lorry movements from the site" cited by UK Coal must surely mean there would also be 78 lorry movements to the site (and who was going to monitor the movements anyway?). That diesel fumes from the wagons would pollute the air, road accidents were inevitable and that what was now a beautiful greenfield site would be completely blighted.

The chairman said he would request that councillors and officers involved in the decision visited the site beforehand and inspected the road.


The funeral was scheduled for Friday February 13 — a date, said Eve, that would have made Ray laugh.

Bob Miller.

It is nearly eight years since Bob Miller saw a Communication Workers' Union Humanitarian Aid (CWHUA) stand at a conference which, in effect, changed his life. It illustrated the work done by volunteers in war torn and poverty stricken East European countries by bringing relief in the shape of blankets and warm clothing.

Bob, who lives on the corner of Brook Close and Babelake Street in Packington, became hooked, and since then has himself made several journeys as part of CWUHA convoys to Bulgaria, Romania, Moldova and, latterly, Transnistria, a small republic within Moldova.

Nowadays it is not just blankets and warm clothing the convoys carry to orphanages and hospitals in these incredibly poor countries, but all sorts of desperately needed medical aid. His last trip, in September of last year, was to Transnistria. when the goods transported by the eight lorry convoy included incubators, an ECG machine, an operating table, wheelchairs, syringes, surgical gloves, bedding, beds, freezers, nappies, washing powder, paper, crayons, and hundreds of knitted teddies made by a small army of devoted knitters recruited by Marjorie Canner. Over the years literally thousands of these cuddly toys have been made, mostly by ladies in the immediate area, and are distributed to children en route and in the orphanages. They are always received with great delight by youngsters who rarely see a toy. The 2,000-mile journey took the crews through Belgium, Germany, Hungary, Romania and Moldova. After many delays at border crossings they finally reached the Children's Republican Hospital of Transnistria where they were welcomed with open arms, The hospital serves a population of 624,000 and, said one of the members of the convoy "looks as if it was last kitted out in the 1950s, with nothing since'

Says Bob: "We were shown round the hospital. Conditions were very basic. Tatiana, one of the staff, explained what a difference our aid would make to their lives. She wanted to thank everyone in the UK for their support, saying they will never forget the generosity of the British people". The volunteers also visited a psycho-neurological hospital, where "deformed, abandoned, Downs Syndrome children and psychotic adults live in a rambling,

crumbling building"

Bob, who is an administrator with Parcel Force in Leicester, spends endless hours preparing for his trips, raising money in a variety of ways and contacting various firms all over the county, who all contribute with amazing generosity

He paid particular tribute to the support given by his wife Ginny, who does all the paperwork and makes sure that every contributing firm or organisation receives a letter of thanks.

"I couldn't do it without her help, and that

of the people of Packington and the surrounding area, who have been wonderful with their support", he said. Bob is hoping to make another trip this coming September but doesn't yet know where it will be to, nor what will be needed. When he does he will let everyone know, and is sure that help will be forthcoming just as it has in the past. He emphasises that any cheques must be made out to CWUHA, and not to him personally. Admitting that some of the things he has seen on his journeys have upset him, Bob is nevertheless determined to carry on as long as he can.

"If we can make a difference to the life of just one of these children it will have been worth it" he explained.

PACKINGTON HORTICULTURAL SHOW SATURDAY 4TH SEPTEMBER 2004





Packington Parish Church

Packington Holy Rood Church has been awarded a grant of £38,000 by English Heritage towards the repair of its roof. This is great news and means that work on the copper roofs of the north and south naves and the south aisle should start within the next few months, and, hopefully, completed by the end of the year.


As a temporary measure the north nave roof was sandbagged and taped to hold the copper sheeting in place last year after a report on its "fairly poor" condition. The decision by English Heritage to provide finance to cover replacement of the roofs of both naves and also of the south aisle followed further inspections, when signs of serious deterioration were revealed. Total cost of the repairs is estimated to be around £54,000. Other grants totalling £3,000 have been obtained and the balance will come from the Church Fabric Fund, to which parishioners and others have been donating, and to which it is hoped donations will continue to be made.

Tales from the church

The 1840's and all that.

In the last edition of Packington Post, we told the story of the finding of the half-sovereign near to the Church, the date on the coin being 1849....

As a coincidence, the year 1846 is also recorded in the history of the Church, although at the time, the writer of the piece in question little realised the time-gap that would elapse since he put pen to paper. The story starts with the finding of a box in the old Vicarage cellar following the departure of the Killer family circa 1985. In finding the old box, and the close proximity to Bonfire Night, it was decided that for safety reasons, the box would provide a secure store for fireworks against the odd spark etc....

Such was the "firework box" employed for many years after, without a thought as to the original use of the antique. With the bonfire moving to the playing field from the previous spot in the old Vicarage garden, the box became redundant until yours truly in examining the inside lid, found some obviously original script which reads as follows: "This communion service was presented to the parish church in Packington, Leicestershire by Sir Abney Hastings Bart. A.D. 1846".
The box measures approx. 15" x 12" x 18"

deep, and when re-discovered was in need of some TLC, which was provided through the kind generosity of the Sumnall family. If only the box could talk, what a tale it might tell, as even now in seeing the original script one can imagine it sitting in the back of the Vicar's pony and trap en route to some outlying farm, bringing the sacrements to those perhaps unable to get to church.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Parish Council have met three times since I last reported our news.

In that time we have looked at 6 planning applications and held a village meeting regarding the proposal from UK Coal to open a new site on the edge of the Parish. The meeting called by the Council and the one hosted by LCC were well attended and some very pertinent questions were asked. The Council will be giving their views on this application at the next meeting scheduled for 11 February.

The Council are still working hard trying to realise the ambitions of the village appraisal, which was completed some time ago and I will try to give you a flavour of where we are in the grand scheme. Two of the major issues raised were:-

Traffic Calming – plans have now been drawn up and we are awaiting the comments from LCC Highways, prior to costing the scheme.

Recreation Ground — the working party is extremely active and plans are at present being drawn up for a scheme for play equipment. Councillors have recently attended training courses to ensure that the new play area will be fully compliant with "Disability Discrimination Act, which comes into force in October this year.

A new scheme is in the early stages of trying to improve the area surrounding the Pumping Station in Babelake St, and we are in contact with Severn Trent.

A new notice board has been donated by East Midland Airport. This will replace the old one beside the Memorial Hall, which is in sad need of repair.

Brown tourism signs, donated by Champney Springs, will soon appear on existing street signs in the village to direct traffic to the Health Hydro.

Other Council information —
The Ashby Road Race will take place on 14
March 2004 and will involve runners

passing through the village twice during the event.

There is a "free phone number" to report any highways problems – specifically potholes or other flaws with the highway/footway including problems with street lighting – 0800 626203.

A public enquiry is in the process of taking place regarding the upgrading of footpath 067 to a Bridal Way.

The Council have been issued with new information regarding "Equine Issues" including the need for owners to obtain a passport for their horses by 30 June 2004. The Council Audit for the year 2002/2003 has been successfully concluded by Hacker Young.

Last, but not least, the Council have set the budget for the coming year 2004/2005 being £41423 with £19,000 being raised by the Parish Precept.

Traffic Calming

Remember the village appraisal? Well, one of the major concerns highlighted by the appraisal was the speed of traffic travelling through the village! In response to this, a small committee has been formed whose aim is to investigate ways of reducing the speed of vehicles as they enter and then pass through Packington, while at the same time being conscious of the fact that any traffic calming measures should not have a negative impact on the "village feel". This was also highlighted in the appraisal as being very important to residents.

Over the past few months, the committee have been busy working on: -

- •Quantifying the size of the problem, by physically measuring the speed of traffic entering the village at various points.
- •Gaining the support of both the County and Parish councils for traffic calming measures.
- •Meeting with various representatives from the highways and traffic management departments.
- •Identifying and costing various traffic calming options.
- Visiting several villages where different types of traffic calming measures have been introduced.

The next steps for the committee are really associated with firming—up on the options we have available to us and to then develop a plan for implementing the measures.

A SpyCom unit is a door spyhole with a battery operated, two-way intercom fitted to it. These units are easy to install, but in case of difficulty two fitting services have been arranged.

A local master locksmith will fit the unit for £10 plus VAT, a third of the usual price. Alternatively, the charity Help the Aged will allow its Handy Van service to do the work providing the recipient fits its criteria. These are that the person is over 60 years of age; is not living with an adult working child; and has savings of less that £16,000. To date, 100 units have been given away in Coalville, 15 in Ashby and 35 in Kegworth, so there are plenty still available. Post Office



At a time when post offices up and down the country are being closed down, Packington is exceptionally lucky in having one that thrives.

As important to the village as the shop, the pub and the school, Packington Post Office and the associated newsagent's/confectioner's/off-license have been in the very capable hands of Ian and Jayne Gash for almost 18 years.

The hours are long. Ian's day starts at 5am every morning, when the daily newspapers arrive and doesn't finish until 6pm, when the shop closes. The post office itself is open from 9am — 1pm, and from 2pm — 5.30 pm, except for brief respites on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons — and even then the shop opens for an hour on Wednesdays for the evening papers, and is open as usual until 6 on Saturdays.

Despite all this Jayne and Ian say they enjoy the life and have no intention of giving up just yet. There are drawbacks — they can't go on holiday together, for example, and have to take advantage of their time-share home in the Gambia separately.

The couple were living in Ashby when Ian, who was working for the Coal Board, decided to take voluntary redundancy. While looking around for something else to do, the opportunity arose to take over at Packington. Encouraged by Jayne's sister, who had run post offices for years, they agreed to "go for it", and haven't looked back.

Packington Post Office is a particularly busy one, because it caters for most of south

Ashby, and with the closure of the town's Westfield office in the near future, lan expects to be even busier. People regard the short drive into Packington as well worth it just to be able to park outside the premises while they conduct their business! Facilities offered include being able to withdraw money from accounts with several banks - Lloyds-TSB, Barclays, Alliance & Leicester and the Co-op - without the hassle of going to the nearest hole in the wall. Then there are pensions – still available in cash over the counter if preferred. Ian says pension books will doubtless be phased out over the next year or two, but a Post Office card will be substituted and the transaction will be conducted in just the same way. Foreign currency (no commission) is available within a day or two of request, and there's a photo-copier, much used by Packington folk at 10p a page. Mobile phone top-ups are another useful facility. Newspapers provide about 60 per cent of the shop's takings (the rounds include a large part of Ashby) and there is an excellent range of magazines (plus any magazine published can be ordered). And if it's a greetings card you want, this is the place to look. There is a wide variety to choose from, all of them excellent value. Wines, spirits and beer, sweets, chocolates, ice cream and some stationery items make up the rest of the stock.

Any newsagency relies to a large extent on the reliability of its delivery boys and girls, and Ian and Jayne have nothing but praise for theirs. The village contingent includes Simon, Christopher, Graeme, and Ben (who also help in the shop at weekends), Matthew, Ben and twins Tamsin and Miles, all of whom turn out at 7am during term time, and slightly later at weekends and during school holidays. With daughter Paula and grandchildren Louis, (two and a half), and Charlotte (nine months) living nearby and visiting frequently, and the company of friendly chocolate Labrador Ellie (almost eight), Ian and Jayne Gash couldn't be more content with their lot. And Packington couldn't be happier with its post office.





Well done to all the staff who arrived early to ensure the school was kept open.






