The Great Bake Off at Packington Memorial Hall is back - Saturday 16th March from 12 pm – 5 pm.

Make your cakes and bakes at home and bring them along between 12 pm - 2pm on the day to enter them into one of 14 categories of baking.

This event is inspired by the popular TV show the Great British Bake Off where Paul Hollywood and Mary Berry put wannabe bakers through their paces. **NEW** for this year, Packington is putting local amateur bakers to the test in the LIVE Bake-Off challenge -

pitting eight bakers against each other in a bid to win the title of MASTER BAKER.

The Technical challenge will be formally judged and the hugely popular public vote is back too – the Signature and Invention challenge entries will be cut up into samples for a public vote. New this year the showstopper challenge will combine a formal judges score and a public vote on looks to decide the winner. There is a prize for the winner of each category and rosettes for the top three in each category.



Also taking place on the day is the table tennis tournament, decorate a cupcake activity for little ones and the Packington half mile. The competition is hotting up - and rumour has it that lots of people are practising their baking already! See Page 2 for entry details.



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
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Mark Page Reports

The article shown on the right documents her application for the job, which she published in the Staffordshire Advertiser. The language she used is very different to what someone would use today – this is exactly as it appeared in the Staffordshire Advertiser.

In the same paper, 21 days later she writes to thank the Board for choosing her to fill the position. She surely wouldn't have let it go into administration as the contemporary hospital is facing!


My Lords, Ladies, AND Gentlemen,




PMG News

Ferrets to fighters? Really! During our January 2012 PMG Evening Talk on the theme of "Odds and Ends", veteran Ashby Auctioneer and Valuer, Chris Yeomans, told us about his magical career. His first-ever sale in 1950 was of three ferrets for 25 shillings at nearby Ashby; later he even auctioned parts of prototype fighter-bomber TSR2, on behalf of the Defence Ministry in the late 60s after the cancellation of the project:



In February, intense interest was evident among PMG for two guest speakers from the Leicester branch of RoADAR (RoSPA Advanced Drivers and Riders). You have probably heard of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents, and we are all in favour!



Bob Paul gave us a timeline history of developments such as speed limits, licences, tests and tax

discs, before Neil Snow described RoADAR and their system of Advanced Driving. We were pleased to learn of the Police Drivers' Handbook, "Roadcraft" and of its "I-P-S-G-A" system for early hazard recognition and negotiation.



Amazingly, the friendly RoADAR volunteers are happy to tutor and report on our driving skills in our own vehicles, FREE, in preparation for Advanced Driving tests, which have possible Gold, Silver or Bronze levels of award for Advanced achievement.

One of our PMG members currently still holds a RoADAR Silver Advanced Driving Award.

Nature Notes

A spell of cold weather and lying snow often brings birds that don't normally visit into the garden in search of food.



During this year's snow my garden was host to a fieldfare who came every day for a week or so to feed on the berries of pyracantha, which were quite abundant. The bird was almost always to be seen in the same spot, perched on a branch, hungrily devouring the berries. Fieldfares are a winter visitor from Scandinavia; rather like a large thrush in appearance but with a grey head and rump, a brown back and a patch of orange on the chest. Normally they fly around in little flocks of a dozen or so but I have spoken to several people this year who have seen single individual specimens in the garden.

Another rare visitor to my garden was a cock pheasant who was seen pecking at the seeds that had fallen from the bird feeder or been dropped by other birds.



As soon as the snow vanished, so did the winter visitors! Also seen this winter: great spotted woodpecker, black-cap and numerous blue tits and great tits.

A parent interviewed on BBC Breakfast recently described how her young daughter had lost her sight permanently after getting dog mess on her fingers and then into her eves. Dog mess contains a number of nasties but the worst of these can cause permanent blindness as happened to this child. It was disgusting to see that one of our more irresponsible dog owners had allowed their dog to foul on top of the wall outside the primary school and had failed to clean up. Dog mess continues to be a problem in Mill Street and I would remind dog walkers that they must clean up after their dogs.

The penalty for not cleaning up is a fine of up to £1000 AND a criminal record. The penalty for a child might be permanent blindness. Thankfully, the dog mess outside the school was removed before the children came out of school.

Dear All,

Richard III and his bones have been causing much excitement of late, as well as many jokes: "Have you heard about parking in Leicester? Short stay 20 minutes; long stay 500 years!" Sorry about that! Anyway, Leicester Cathedral is in the midst of preparations for the re-interment of those bones with great ceremony - in stark contrast to the hasty burial in 1485 of a defeated king. He'd headed the Yorkist army in battle but was defeated by the house of Tudor in the Battle of Bosworth Field on 22nd August 1485. This signalled the end of the War of the Roses.

Have you been excited by the discovery? Have you joined the queues for the exhibition in Leicester? I must admit I've been surprised at the huge level of interest. So if anyone is aware that Richard III came to Packington at any point, let me know – we could get ourselves on the Richard III tourist trail! After all, Bosworth isn't far away.

My thinking turned to 'what sort of king was Richard III'? His reputation is decidedly mixed. It seems to be agreed he suffered from physical deformity which his skeleton has confirmed. His detractors portrayed him as a Machiavellian character who clawed his way to power, prepared to do murder on the way (the Princes in the Tower).

Others point out that he was a promoter of legal fairness and a good lawmaker for the common

people. Whatever, he ended up being hastily buried in Greyfriars in Leicester, a defeated king.

As we are approaching Holy Week and Easter, I found myself thinking of King Jesus, a very different sort of king. He was tempted to bring in God's Kingdom of love and peace in a variety of ways. 'Turn stones into bread' but full stomachs don't bring about a change in people's hearts. 'Jump off the highest tower in Jerusalem and defy gravity'. Yet magic is so easily discounted - it was done by strings, by smoke and mirrors we would say. All a trick. 'Defeat the powers of the world by force, so they would submit to him'. That was a third temptation. But defeating 'baddies' by force usually makes the victors into baddies too as many a regime change has proved.

Instead, he followed the way of the cross, of total self sacrifice for our sake. He demonstrated a love that goes beyond anything we could ever dream of. When evil was done to him, he never retaliated but instead forgave and blessed. Such is his love for each one of us that he gave his life. I wonder what that says to each one of us? He still holds out that hand of love to us at great cost to him. The way of the cross is a way that can change hearts for the better.

And in Jesus we have a King who doesn't need to be dug up because he was raised to life again. He is not buried but is alive for you and me today. His risen life again brings a change of heart in us.

We're continuing through Lent as you read this – trying to take in this greatest act of love there has ever been. Join in. What about trying the services of Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Day? Realise the wonder of this king and his love for each of us.

May God bless you this Eastertide.

YOUNGSTERS from Packington came up with a wheel-y good design which netted their school £150 in a competition. A team of pupils from Packington Primary School, in Mill Street, fought off schools from around Leicestershire to get their design of a rotation fairground wheel picked by the indees.

The entries were put on display at the Primary Design Challenge 2000 held at Leicester College. They were awarded marks for research into the history and construction of fairground wheels, the use of maths and IT skills, teamwork and design.

The 'Wednesday Wonder Wheel' was given top marks and the school was awarded a cash prize which will be spent on new goal posts or a digital camera.

Ken Davis, health and safety officer for con-struction and engineering at Leicester Col-lege, said: "This was a great opportunity for younger children to put into practice the skills that they have learnt in the classroom. "Everyone was very impressed with the effort and imagination that had obviously been put into the wheels."

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
