Dear All,

Saturday 29th June saw a contingent of us driving into Leicester to the Cathedral, not to see Richard III's bones, but to support our curate, Revd Linda Cox as she was ordained priest. In practical terms, this means that Linda can now celebrate Holy Communion, and give the blessing and absolution. It also means that when she finishes her curacy with us in 2 or 3 years' time, she can be in charge of a parish herself. However, I know that becoming a priest means much more than this to Linda – I leave you to speak to her about that when you see her in the village.

Anyway, it made me think back to my own ordination many moons ago now (23 years to be precise) and what it all means to me. It's easy as life rushes by to forget and simply go on from day to day. Ordination brings us into a very strange way of life - no set hours, on call 24/7 and little structure compared to most jobs these days. I can be rejoicing with a family one minute at the birth of a child and then next be mourning with someone who's had bad news; I can go from taking a school assembly to visiting an old people's home.

It's an enormous privilege to do this work. We are still invited into people's lives at crucial times; we get to meet a wide variety of people in different settings. And for me, the greatest privilege (and one that frightens me because of the responsibility) is to seek to bring God's love into a situation, when I know that I am a fallible human being like anyone else.

As I pondered at Linda's ordination, I remembered why I felt called into this role. And it was good to remember.

Firstly, all those years ago, I had become aware of God's love for me in Jesus: that figure on the cross who said, and says to me still, "I love you this much. Come to me and I will never drive you away. My word to you is always 'come' and never 'go' ". I wanted to follow him and his call on my life.

Secondly, as a solicitor, I had been seeing a client, who had come to me for her 3rd divorce. Listening to her, I sensed she was just looking for a love that worked. I longed to be part of helping the church, the Christian community, to demonstrate a love that works. At its best, that is what the church is here for (and I know we often fall short) and I long to be part of showing a love that truly works. For I think that most human beings are seeking that love that works.

Will you be part of helping to model a love that works along with me?

Throughout June, Years 5 and 6 at Packington C of E Primary School took part in a design project in conjunction with David Granger Architectural Design Ltd. Children in Mr Emery's 'Eagles' class spent a morning with Sophie Paul discussing what architecture is and the role of designers. They also learnt a little about the company, which was started by David Granger 28 years ago, the variety of buildings designed and some of the challenges faced by designers.

The children discovered that in order to become successful designers, they would need to work hard and develop their skills in Art and Design Technology, Maths, Science, English and ICT!

The Eagles class then had a go at measuring the dimensions of their classroom using professional survey equipment, including a laser measuring device. They were also shown how to draw a floor plan and had chance to try on some site clothing!

The children were invited to take part in the 'My Dream Design' competition, where they used their design skills to transform the classroom into a room of their dreams, submitting floor plans and a written description of the design.

David Granger was impressed with the standard of entries and is excited about the prospect of so many budding designers for the future! Choosing the winners was no easy task, with a wide variety of imaginative and unique entries being submitted: everything from swimming pools and go kart tracks to a sky diving centre, a theatre and even an indoor farm! The winners were presented with prizes and certificates in Achievement Assembly on Friday 28th June. > Marjorie Elinor Canner 1928 – 2013



Marjorie Canner was pretty unique from the word "go" – she was born on 27th January 1928 and was born in what was then the Reading

Room in Packington. Then, at only 6, she was chosen to switch on the lights when electricity was supplied to the village for the first time in 1934. She lived in, and was very much involved in, the village all her life and grew up to be a pillar of the community. She left school during the Second World War and went to help the war effort by working in the munitions factory Swadlincote where she earned the princely sum of 7/6d (37p in today's money). In 1947 Marjorie went on to work as a secretary at the National Coal Board, eventually running retirement courses there for miners, until in turn she herself retired

On 31st March 1951, she married Roy in Holy Rood Church – another spring with unpredictable weather – it snowed on their wedding day!



Marjorie and Roy started married life on Normanton Rd and Helen, their only daughter, was born in 1958. In 1959, they moved into the home in Hall Lane that they had had built on land originally part of Hall Farm. Helen grew up in the village and after school qualified as a nurse, training in Birmingham, and gave Roy and Marjorie two granddaughters - Catherine and Philippa.

But what of the essential Marjorie – her personality, her character?

Marjorie was a great character and showed glimpses of this and of a sharp sense of humour from an early age. On one occasion when she was quite young she went to visit the local baker in the village with her mother. After opening her mouth before she was spoken to (not done in those days) she was "punished" by the baker by being dumped into the flour bin - how times have changed! Yes, she was forthright but she was also someone of principle and integrity.

Marjorie's faith was important to her and she delivered the Parish Magazine, decorated Holy Rood with flowers and polished the brasses. She supported Roy in his duties as Choirmaster for many years and also encouraged and supported Helen who inherited her parents' musical abilities and performed with the Ysabel Choir and in the church choir.

She had an important role as local Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator which she took on in her later life. Marjorie was actually a member of the WI from the tender age of 15. Latterly, she attended the Luncheon Club in the village.

Underneath her sometimes forthright manner lav other precious things - the foundation stone of her marriage, her deep love of her family and also a great consideration for others which demonstrated itself in practical help. Behind the scenes Marjorie quietly carried on delivering many acts of kindness for friends and neighbours. She helped out senior members of the community by running errands or taking them shopping for their provisions.

Marjorie was unique and made her mark on life. She was a very special person to her family, her friends and to all the many people whose lives she touched for good. There is no doubt that Packington will be poorer for her passing. She will long be remembered.
