



News from the School

It has been an exciting and very positive start to the new term at Packington School with excellent news following an OFSTED inspection, a Health Check by the Teaching School Alliance and publication of the national league tables. Further to this we were delighted to receive a letter from the Rt. Hon. David Laws MP congratulating us on our excellent results and being one of the top performing schools in the country in 2013.

A month of inspection and evaluation delivers good news

In fact November was a busy month at the school as two different evaluations of the school took place. First, OFSTED visited and the inspection judged Packington to be an overall good school with the report identifying that:

The school provides a caring, safe environment for its pupils, in which they are nurtured as individuals. Pupils achieve well. Pupils are well-behaved. They are confident and articulate and develop good social skills.

The head teacher knows what needs to be done to improve the school further. She has built up a cohesive

staff team who work together effectively to make improvements.

Leaders and managers, including governors, evaluate the school's work closely. They have ensured good teaching and achievement have been maintained.

Then a further evaluation was carried out by an independent OFSTED consultant on behalf of the Forest Way Teaching School Alliance the school belongs to. The final report of this evaluation reports that for the overall effectiveness of the school:

"Packington CE Primary School is at least good and possibly outstanding."

Results put Packington in top 1% of primary schools in the country for the third year running

We were delighted to read the latest league tables published by the DFE. Our results have put us as the third best school in Leicestershire and in 76th place out of 16,189 schools in England and Wales for this year (that's actually in the top 0.5% of all schools). How fantastic is that?



Police News

Hello and Happy New Year to all residents of Packington.

Firstly, thank you to Barry Alldread who has kindly let me write a piece in the Packington Post.

I will probably look to write a quarterly report.

"PC Mark Arjoo has served Leicestershire Police for 22 years. As Beacon Officer with NW Leics policing unit for the past nine years, he is responsible for policing of Ashby centre and surrounding villages including Packington".

He writes The North West Leicestershire Local Policing Unit (LPU), is made up of an LPU Commander (Inspector Helena Bhakta), five Response Teams, and five Safer Neighbourhood Teams.

The Response Teams provide 24 hour cover to the whole LPU area and respond to Grade 1 (15 minute response), and Grade 2 (60 minute response) jobs.

The Safer Neighbourhood Teams (SNT) are divided into five beats, each consisting of a Sergeant, Beacon Officer, Police Constables, Special Constables, and PCSO's.

The SNT's investigate crime and Anti-Social Behaviour, and look at ways of solving problems on their particular area, which can be dealt with in slow time. We also deal with a multitude of community issues.

My message to you is simple - we the police and you the local community need to work together to help reduce crime and to keep the local area safe.

If you witness any activity that you think is suspicious, please ring 999 at the time. If it is something you think is a non-emergency but requires police attendance, telephone 101.

Neighbourhood Watch Schemes play an extremely important part in reducing crime, and in Packington, you have a number of schemes. Please take time to find out and get to know your NHW Co-ordinators.

Dear All,

"Labour will tell teachers to improve or face the sack". That was the headline taking up most of the front page of my newspaper. I was saddened to read them. What must it have felt like to be a teacher reading that? It lumps all teachers together. The teachers I know are hardworking and dedicated; it must be demoralising to see headlines and proposals like that.

There were all the complaints from politicians as well as the media about the length of time it took to reconnect power supplies after the flooding in the south-east. Yet there was footage of men working to do their best in difficult conditions.

We seem to have become very hard and demanding as a society.

Those of you who read my meanderings may recall that I can get hooked on words. I like words. My word of the moment is 'mercy': it has a lovely gentle sound to it. It speaks of compassion and clemency. It speaks of forgiveness towards someone who it is within one's power to harm or punish. It's about having a disposition to be kind and forgiving.

The 23rd psalm speaks of this 'surely goodness and loving mercy follow me all the days of my life'. There the psalmist is speaking of the Lord who is our shepherd. The Lord Jesus is our prime example of what it means to be merciful. Humanity is well deserving of punishment – the wars, the harming of the environment and much more – but the Lord is merciful. The Archbishop of Canterbury said at the time of the baptism of Prince George, that he wanted to say to all who've been

baptised, not just a future king, "For you Jesus Christ came into the world. For you he lived and showed God's love. For you he suffered the darkness of Calvary and cried at last 'It is finished'. For you he triumphed over death and rose to new life. For you he reigns at God's right hand. All this he did for you, though you do not know it yet." God would show us mercy.

Do we need to re-learn mercy in our dealings with each other as a society? I know I respond much more positively when I am in receipt of mercy rather than blame. If I'm blamed, then I can come out of my corner fighting (which gets no-one anywhere). Show me mercy and there can be a conversation.

Do we need to move away from finding someone to blame for everything to be mercifully accepting of each other? Do we need to be able to show mercy to ourselves?

I wonder how different the atmosphere would be if we could all learn the disposition of mercy?

The more I realise the forgiveness I receive from our Lord, the more I long to be merciful in my response to others and to myself. It's quite a learning curve! Could we all have a go at learning the gift and art of mercy during 2014?
