





## Daffodils and remembering the First World War.

When I was first looking for somewhere to live in this area I drove through Packington at the beginning of April and was immediately struck by the daffodils, all along the verge, near the bridge over the Gilwiskaw Brook. They captured that unchanging picture of a rural, idyllic, English spring so beautifully expressed, by the poets Wordsworth & Browning, over a century before.



That was 12 years ago. Daffodils don't last forever especially if they are cut down before the bulbs have had time to replenish themselves through the stems left after they have flowered. On verges and other mown areas this is not always possible. It occurred to me this year that, compared to other villages in the vicinity, the Packington daffodils are getting rather thin in places, and in need new stock. At about the same time somebody, at a meeting I was attending, queried how the village, as a community, could remember those who had left Packington to fight in the First World War and never returned.

I immediately thought of a passage I had recently read in "Now all Roads lead to France" a very moving biography of the poet Edward Thomas who tragically died on Easter Monday 1917 in the trenches at Arras in Northern France. Two years before, in 1915, a fellow poet Eleanor Farjeon had pressed Thomas on why precisely, at his age, with three children he had chosen to enlist. She reported that he paused, bent down and scooped up a handful of soil from around his shoe and said "Literally for this".

What better way to commemorate those who had fallen than to plant new life into the soil of England?

Why stop at daffodils? Why not plant some flowering trees at the several entrances to the village?

Perhaps a collection in August at the centenary of the start of World War 1 would raise enough to plant some bulbs and trees, later in the autumn. It would revitalise the work done by the Parish Council, inspired by Richard Roberts, at the beginning of this century, and be a fitting memorial 100 years on.

I shall contribute. I hope you will too?

## **Packington Open Gardens**




In May we held our PMG

#### **Andrew Brigden MP**

I have always been clear that a strong local economy is one of my top priorities as a Member of Parliament. As someone who has run a local business and employed many hundreds of local people, I know the value of employment. That is why I was delighted to host by own Jobs Fair at Snibston Discovery Park last month. It was great to be able to bring together employers and jobseekers and the feedback has been extremely encouraging, indeed some of the exhibitors have been in touch with me to report that they directly employed people from the fair which is a source of great satisfaction.

An issue that I will be pursuing in Parliament over the coming weeks is the sentencing of those who cause death by dangerous driving. A car is a lethal weapon and trust be treated as such. If you get into your car when you are over the drink drive limit or have taken drugs, you know your actions can result in injury to others. This currently carries a maximum sentence of 14 years although that sentence seems to be rarely handed out. It is my belief the maximum sentence should be increased if someone has wilfully claimed someone's life through dangerous driving. I will be looking to meet the Justice Secretary to discuss this in greater depth and I know from a debate on the issue earlier in the year which I spoke in, that there is a feeling amongst my colleagues that this matter needs addressing.

At the end of last month, I actively opposed the HS2 Hybrid Bill which would bring no benefit to North West Leicestershire. Unfortunately the project continues to attract cross party support but I and many colleagues will continue to fight against the scheme. I will also be tackling the County Council this month on the issue of Snibston Discovery Park, and requesting that they look seriously at the proposals being made to keep the centre open. Snibston is a great asset for our District and County and we must look at every way it can be retained.
