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The Results Are In !!! Continued Village Support For the Packington Post

The Packington Post team are always looking at ways of improving the services provided and in the September issue we published a "reader's survey" to get feedback from across the village. The survey was pretty extensive covering all of our printed, online and social media platforms. The results were pretty over-whelming with 95% of those that responded saying that they valued the Post and that the village should continue to produce a printed newsletter.

88% of respondents thought that the content was either "good" or "excellent" with photographic content also positively received. Very few sections received a "dislike" comment; although clearly some are more popular than others. 45% of replies actually stated that there was "nothing" they disliked. The

most popular sections of the Post as voted by you were the "what's on" articles, Group news and historical articles.

The village website also received positive feedback with 88% claiming they made use of it for reasons ranging from seeing what the latest events in the village are to checking the availability of the village hall. Email alerts were also commended with 70% of respondents already on the circulation list.

In an age when we seem to live in an increasingly "online" world, it was noted that the village was well represented here via the website, Twitter and Facebook accounts.

However, the printed word is not dead! We received a comments from residents who are not online or who do not own a computer. For these residents, the Packington Post in printed version continues to provide a valuable source of information of what's happening and gives them a link into the community.

Away from the numbers, we also received a number of comments

on improvements and additions to content. There were requests that we should cover planning applications and Parish Council activities more fully. Respondents also wanted to hear more about the successes of local people or people with interesting backgrounds or hobbies. Babies, weddings and anniversary news was also mentioned. People are also interested in village improvement ideas, local business or sporting successes, village history and gardening information. There were suggestions around a "viewpoint" section, letters to the editor and greater focus on "big issues" such as HS2. The Post team have committed to reviewing all comments and implementing ideas in the New Year.

The Packington Post remains a volunteer activity run by village residents for the benefit of the village so we thank everyone again for their ongoing support. The full results have been shared with Parish Council and are available to anyone on request.



Packington Parish Council

Over the last few months, a considerable amount of Councillors' time has been spent continuing their objection to the two big housing developments in the village. As many of you will already be aware, NWLDC planning committee passed the applications on 10th June but the parish council has been in continued and regular correspondence with NWL in an attempt to have these decisions reversed. The parish council were notified that it would be likely that the planning applications would be returned to the planning committee however, it seems this is no longer the case. The Chairman of the parish council voiced the opinion that all Councillors' efforts to reverse the planning decision have come to no effect and he feels that the parish council has been completely ignored.

The proposed HS2 development has recently been in the news once again and it is said that a new route for the East Midlands is being considered by HS2 Limited. The parish council will be receiving an update at the beginning of December from HS2 Limited which will hopefully include further information on the route.

Grass cutting in the village has been a particular concern to Councillors this year. LCC should have provided the village with seven cuts, but only four took place, despite numerous calls to LCC. In fact one particular area was only cut once! In an attempt to cut cost and to pass more responsibility for extra cuts on to the parish, LCC have advised that they are willing to only carry out five cuts in 2015. If any residents have a particular concern about this matter or wish to make their views known, please contact Cllr Nick Rushton at LCC who oversees this area of business.

Parish Councillors have recently agreed a contract with NWLDC who will carry out winter salting on some minor roads in the village which are known to be problematic in the cold winter months. NWLDC already carry out additional salting in the area and will now include Packington on their route. Councillors would like to remind residents that they are welcome to attend Parish Council meetings. The next meeting will be held in the meeting room at the Memorial Hall on Tuesday 16th December at 7pm. Packington Lunch Club

In the autumn of 2010 the Memorial Hall management committee started to look into the possibility of organising a village lunch club similar to those already operating in several Leicestershire villages.

The idea is to give older people, looking for opportunities to socialise in a friendly environment, the chance to enjoy a nutritious meal, and catch up with old friends, and meet new ones.

With a newly equipped kitchen, given a top rating by the Local Authority, the village hall premises were ideally suited to this type of function. Pauline Miles agreed to organise the overall running of the Lunch Club, including ordering the meals, ensuring there were enough volunteers to serve the food and keeping in touch with club members to ascertain how many would be arriving each month.

On 21 October 2010 the first 13 lunches were served. In the ensuing 4 years the Lunch Club has become a regular fixture in the Memorial Hall meeting room. By the time you read this over 700 meals will have been served and enjoyed by the members.

One of our founder members, Mary Evans, has written the following appreciation.....

"It is almost four years since the lunches for the elderly people of Packington started in the village hall. It is a lovely friendly get together for husbands, wives, and people living on their own.

On behalf of all who attend I would like to say a big "thank you" to the ladies and gents who voluntarily give their help to make it so welcoming. The tables are set beautifully and the meals are good.

Each month I am collected from Prior Park by Mike or Adrian. I enjoy talking to people who I used to see at W.I., the Church, the Post Office and Pete's shop. Letter to Editor

Dear Irresponsible Dog Owners of Packington.

Yes, you know who you are because the majority of Packington dog owners are responsible and clean up after their dogs. This is not only an act of courtesy to their neighbours and people who share their streets and services, but also because not picking up after your dog is AGAINST THE LAW!

Over 100 children pour in and out of the Packington school gates every day. Every single week there is dog mess left on the grass edges of the church walk path. Inevitably the dog mess is trodden in. Later to be discovered in the car, on the carpet or in the worst reported cases on their hands or clothing! Dog mess can spread harmful germs to children if ingested or cause damage to their eyes.



Church walk is not the only affected area. Grass verges all over the village are targeted. Little Lane is often referred to as "Dog Poo Alley". Offenders must assume that they can go unnoticed and that residents won't realise that a small minority are acting in this way. However, without being too graphic, we can all tell from its regular locations, colour and size that it is deposited by the same few dogs. Dogs are creatures of habit

None of our residents should have to put up with this irresponsible behaviour! It's disgusting and antisocial. Anyone who is not prepared to deal with their dog's poop, should not own a dog. There are products on the market to help with caring for your dog, such as long handled poop scoops and fragrant disposal bags, so there is no excuse. What would be your reaction to finding dog poo trodden though your home? Would you be disgusted if you witnessed your neighbour dropping litter in your street? Dog fouling is no different.

One regularly targeted area is now monitored by CCTV, from a nearby home. If you are spotted walking away from your dog's mess, you will be reported – with evidence!

It is important to note that I regularly see Packington's responsible dog owners carrying their little bags of doggy doo on their walks and I am so grateful to them for caring for our village and its inhabitants. They tell me that they feel embarrassed on your behalf and are concerned that you are giving them a bad name. That's not fair either.

Please pick up after your dog! It's your responsibility!

A group of teachers from Leicestershire set off to forge links with schools in Rwanda. After a gruelling journey of some 51 hours they finally reached their destination and found facilities very basic. Nevertheless the welcome they received everywhere they went was sincere and heart-warming.



Teaching methods are very different with classes of 60 children. Half the pupils arrive for the morning session and change in the afternoon when it is the older children's turn.

Time was found for some sightseeing and other adventures including Mrs Price dressing up for a two hour motor bike taxi ride!

After their return, a party of teachers from Rwanda came to Leicestershire and visited schools including Packington and Newbold.

The Memorial Hall is now equipped with a large screen and projector capable for showing quality pictures and films. Linked to the sound system this produces a very good all round effect. A group of regular hall users came to a demonstration last month and were suitably impressed. Some groups have already used the equipment with a laptop to project power point presentations. This can be done without a licence as there are no infringement of copyright.

However, to show a film whether to a paying or non-paying audience using a DVD or Bluray requires a licence at a cost of about £100.



Remembering the Fallen



Packington Neighbourhood watch Christmas Message

As Christmas comes nearer people up and down the country are starting to think about doing their Christmas shopping and stocking up on supplies. However, criminals are no different in that respect and at this time of year there can be rich pickings to be found by taking advantage of the unwary. Make sure you are aware of some commonsense precautions against getting burgled during the festive season.



Keep presents both wrapped and unwrapped out of view – make sure they're not visible from any windows.

Don't put gift packaging out for recycling or leave it sticking out of your bin – thieves will notice boxes for branded products like laptops, TVs or even accessories that could indicate there's an expensive piece of kit somewhere in the house.

Leave a light on and draw the curtains when you go out at night.

Mark your valuables with a UV pen or property marking service. You can register your property with http://www.immobilise.com/ which is endorsed by a number of police forces and which also sells property marking products.

If you're going away, ask a trusted neighbour to pop in every now and then and turn the lights on and off, draw the curtains, collect the mail and generally make the house look occupied. And it goes without saying, make sure everything is properly locked up before you leave and the burglar alarm – if you have one – is set. Cancel your newspapers, magazines and milk deliveries.

Don't forget to look out for your neighbours' properties too! You can report anything suspicious to the police on 999 (emergencies), 101



(non-emergencies) or anonymously to Crime stoppers on 0800 555 111.

Remember that thieves will also have their eye on cars – don't leave valuables in the car if you can avoid it, or lock them in the boot if you can't take them with you. Don't leave anything on show in the car, not even a coat or an empty carrier bag. Park somewhere well-lit and secure if you can, and of course take care of your keys at all times.

With the dark evenings drawing in as early as 4 o'clock, remember to be careful when out and about. Keep your wallet, phone, keys and other valuables secure in your pocket or bag – try to use a chain if possible. Be careful when taking money out of cash machines – put it away before you leave the machine – and don't take out too much cash at one time. Be aware of what's going on around you and avoid getting things like phones or music players out on quiet streets.

Please pass this advice on to your friends and neighbours.



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Record Number Attend Packington Bonfire Night

Another a great event. A record year!! Highest attendance 350 to 400 people; Biggest ever surplus financially!!! Tallest flame!!! Was it the biggest bonfire?? The greatest number of favourable comments on face-book and twitter.

With perfect weather conditions, the bonfire constructed by long time expert Bob Plant roared away at 7.00pm. Within seconds the flames were a splendid sight. At their peak the flames were estimated at a record 35 meters high and were warming the crowd. A well organised team in the refreshment tent started serving early arrivals at 6.30pm and I am told that despite facing the fireworks again this year, they hardly had a moment to appreciate the display. The queue for food was amazing and people were still being served after the display. Needless to say the food tent sold out.

The first half of the fireworks display began at about 7.20pm and saw a continuous barrage of noise and colour accompanied by some exciting and suitable music which hopefully enhanced the excitement and wonder. 

Packington Blind Horse – Chapter 2

We left Chapter 1 in the last issue of the Post with questions being asked about the true origins of the Shire horse



A NOBLE BEGINNING

The history of the Shire horse is hard to pin down. The year 1068 seems to be a good starting point when tracing its background. The terms 'War Horse' or 'Great Horse' come to mind when speaking of the Shire. It was then mentioned as being used as a pack animal. It is believed, by many, to be the breed that carried knights into battle. Most Shire people accept that today's horse is indeed descended from the heavy cob type of about 15.2 hands used in the armies of King Henry II.

It stands to reason that for horses to carry a fully armoured knight weighing in excess of four hundred pounds into battle, an animal with great strength and yet a calm temperament would be required These two characteristics are not lost on today's Shire.

Whether for use as a 'Cart Horse', as they were also known during this period in history, or as a 'War Horse', 'a hundred stallions of large stature' were imported to England from the lowlands of Flanders, Holland, and the banks of the Elbe, from 1199 to 1216. It is from this blending, over seven hundred years ago, of these animals with the English breed, that some strains, at least, of our heavy draught horses must be said to date their origin.

It was during the reign of Henry VIII that acts to prohibit the breeding of horses under 15 hands were passed, and that the name 'shire' as applied to the horse was first used in these statutes. The name came from the Saxon word 'schyran' which means to shear, or divide, hence the name shire, which is synonymous with County. It is the Counties, or 'Shires', of the Midlands in England, namely Derbyshire, Leicestershire, and Staffordshire, that the horse hails
