Dear All,

I recently came across a story from the life of Gandhi. It goes like this. One day, as Gandhi got on a train, one of his shoes slipped off and landed on the track. He couldn't retrieve it. To the amazement of his friends, he reached down and took off the other shoe. As the train moved forward, he threw it back along the track to land close to the first one. A friend asked him why he had done that. Gandhi smiled 'A poor man who finds a shoe lying on the track will now have a pair he can use.' Gandhi was a very remarkable man with an amazing ability to think in a different way from most other people, and to put thoughts of others before himself.

Jesus tells us: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength; and love your neighbour as yourself'. Jesus lived this out in his own life - giving his all for us. One of his best loved parables illustrates it and that is the parable of the Good Samaritan. The Samaritan, who would have been considered an outsider, is the one to help the man lying battered and bruised, close to death. He binds up his wounds and takes him on to a hotel where he will be taken care of. He leaves him in the care of the people there with an open cheque that he will cover all costs. That is the level of loving to which Jesus challenges us.

If, like me, you become increasingly disturbed at the level of hatred and violence, we might ponder the law of love. What can we do, where we are, to show love to others? Do we need to ponder sometimes how we use words that hurt others? Are we showing love to others or are we more bothered about ourselves? These might be only tiny seeds in the context of the world's issues but the seeds of love have great power to grow and spread. And, as Jesus will show on the cross at Easter, love is, at the end of the day, the only counter to the cycle of violence and

One of the oldest "Packingtonians" is to move on.

The village is about to say goodbye to one of the oldest "Packingtonians" as Miss Mary Albutt prepares to move closer to family members. Mary was born and brought up in the village attending Packington School and later Broomleys Central School in Coalville during the four years of the Second World War she remembers cycling to school with satchel on one shoulder and gas mask on the other.

After school Mary learned shorthand and audio/typing and worked for the National Coal Board for thirty years. Working mostly at the beautiful Coleorton Hall in various departments. This was some of the happiest days of her life. Mary took early retirement to look after

elderly parents. Mary used to play the organ at the Methodist Chapel until it closed in 2009, then becoming a regular at Holy Rood with occasional visits to Ashby Methodist church. She joined in many village activities including WI, Singles, the Ladies Group and the Luncheon Club among them.

Many people will miss her as she was often seen walking up the High Street to and from Peter's shop and stopping to chat on the way. Mary will miss this very much as she always enjoyed Peter's fun and jokes. As Mary looks forward to a new chapter in her life many friends and neighbours have said they will visit her. "I do hope they don't all come at once".



Big Breakfast

Join the Big Charity Breakfast and raise funds for Harry Culwick. Harry lives with mum and dad. Sam and Alastair and twin brother Luke in Hall Lane. The twins were born prematurely and while after a while Luke developed normally, Harry was diagnosed with daytonic Cerebal Palsy and he is also profoundly deaf. He is unable to sit. stand, walk, talk or barely even to hold his head up and is completely dependent on others for all his needs. However in spite of his difficulties Harry is a very happy vibrant little boy who never stops laughing and smiling.

His parents have discovered ABR which is a type of physio which creates volume in the tissue to support the muscles. ABR takes 2-3 hours every day at home by his parents. They have completed the first year and are seeing noticeable improvements in Harry. They are now looking for funds to have an ABR machine at home that will deliver an additional 10 hours treatment at night while he is asleep. The cost is 3300 euros a year.



Construction well under way with the majority of posts to support 55,000 panels in place.

Despite objections to using Babelake Street as the access route for construction traffic, planning permission was granted. The inevitable has happened as illustrated by the letter below sent to James Ricketts the construction project manager.

- ·It now appears that despite assurances to the contrary it is clear that restrictions on the contractor to avoid school hours is being completely ignored with consequent serious risk to school crossing patrol man, mothers, children and others in a location where footpaths are virtually nonexistent.
- ·Residents also report that the HGV vehicles are travelling at an unsafe speed for the conditions.
- ·The situation described in the email below where a resident was forced to reverse down the lane by 6 contractors vehicles in the dark into a gateway(there are no formal passing places!!) is completely unacceptable.
- ·Also a recent articulated lorry found it impossible to turn into Babelake Street without several reversing manoeuvres down Mill street and mounting kerbs and verges.

The information has been passed on to County Councillor Nick Rushton and NWLD Councillor Nigel Smith with a request to involve the appropriate highways and planning officials.

Hopefully they will make it clear to the contractors that this behaviour and vehicle management is not acceptable and take appropriate

action and whatever sanctions are available to stop it.

It is feared that it is only a matter of time before an "incident" occurs with possible damage to people and/or property and if this happens those involved and responsible for creating this situation should certainly be held to account.

Email to James Ricketts, construction manager from resident and mother, name and address supplied:-

"Good Afternoon James

Apologies for the delay in getting back to you.

The nature of my telephone call to you on Thursday 15th January was again to alert you to the fact that lorries are still using Babelake Street during school drop off and pick up times. When we initially spoke about this matter back in the beginning of December, you assured me that this would stop.

After our initial conversation, the situation did improve slightly with only a couple during that week passing through, albeit a couple too many. I did not contact you again regarding these as I was hopeful they were one offs and it would be rectified. However, since the children have been back at school, there have been lorries using the road at unpermitted times nearly every day. One of which was a huge articulated lorry one morning which I was told, had incredible difficulty turning into Babelake Street, both because of his size and the parked vehicles he had to manoeuvre round.

As you will appreciate, our Crossing Patrol, John, has a difficult job as it is without having to worry about lorries reversing and mounting kerbs. I actually spoke to one lorry driver on Thursday, who had left your site and was down at the corner at only just 3:25pm. This is not acceptable and is not a one off. As I said before, the school bell rings at 3:15pm to let the children

out of class. By the time they've got bags, coats etc, it is at least 3:20 before they leave the playground. There are only footpaths a small way up Babelake Street and the grass verges have been made into mud baths from lorries to site using them as passing points.

The other point I rose with you was the way in which a resident was made to reverse down the lane, in the dark with a young child in the car, as members of your workforce (6 vehicles) decided that they would keep on coming, regardless of the fact that they had seen the car and could've waited to let it pass. I find this appalling behaviour and the person involved was very upset by it but unsure of what to do. which is why I am bringing it to your attention.

We were prepared to have increased heavy traffic down our lane and respectful of the fact that it wouldnt be for long but we are not prepared to be intimidated or have the safety of our children compromised. It is bad enough that we are putting up with all the mud, another reason we have to walk in the middle of the road) without having to put up with this.

I trust you will take prompt action to resolve this immediately and I look forward to hearing from you.
