cares for me when I'm asleep and can't fend for myself or control anything. I thought how fascinating that we were designed to need sleep to restore us, rather than being 24/7 creatures. How would you answer the question? What element of creation could you ponder on?

Perhaps think of a time when you've experienced the wonder of aliveness and beauty – what did it say to you of God? And let's give thanks for the wonder of nature, our world and life itself?

Is this the end of the "Packington Post"?

On 2nd June 2015 at 7.15pm the Parish Council will meet in the Memorial Hall. Among the items on their agenda will be consideration of the annual grant to fund the PCG and the Packington Post.

At their last meeting in May one of the Councillors proposed that the annual grant made by the Parish Council to the Packington Post should be cut from the £2,100 requested per annum to £150. Should this proposal be agreed by the Council the Packington Post's funds will run out, and the Packington Post will cease after 2 more issues (i.e. by September).

Is this what you want? How has this situation come about?

Let's go back to the very beginning! What prompted the first issue of the "Post"?

- In 2002 the Packington Village Appraisal was published after a prodigious amount of work by a committee of 12 volunteers from the village called "The Appraisal Steering Group".
- They had been formed following a public meeting called by the Parish Council in 2000. At this meeting it was agreed that the residents of Packington should be canvassed on a wide range of local issues which would help local councillors plan to maintain and improve village life.
- Questionnaires were circulated to all 312 households in the village. The Steering Group achieved an amazing 80% response rate with 140,000 tick box responses, and over 7,000 written comments. These were collated by the committee and published in a report.
- In the "Information & Communication" part of the Appraisal (Section 3. 16) the question asked is "Would you like an independently produced village newsletter/magazine covering all aspects of village news/information?"
- There were 390 responses to this question. "Yes" 273 "No" 117 (or in percentage terms- 70% in favour 30% against).

Following the publication of this report the Parish Council acted swiftly and the PCG was formed and the first issue of "Packington Post" came out in summer 2003. From the beginning it was agreed that abiding, fully inclusive and cost efficient principles were that each issue should go to each household in the village free at point of receipt but paid for out of the Parish Precept. Non-residents could pay for a copy if they wished to keep in touch with village community activities.

The Precept is your money paid to the Parish Council via the Council Tax and amounts to an average £60 per household, a total of £19,000 per year to the Parish Council to disperse as they see fit.

For 13 years and 72 issues supported by grants of £2,000-2,300 per year from the Parish Council plus a small advertising revenue, this has continued. Over the 12 years this figure has changed little despite the ever widening scope of activities undertaken.

In addition the PCG has:

- Set up and manages the village web site www.packington.info now receiving several hundred views per
- Set up and run the village Facebook page www.facebook.com/PackingtonPost to appeal to younger residents again receiving several hundred views per week
- Since 2009 has sent out 325 email alerts to over half the village signed up on matters large and small affecting the village
- Produced a comprehensive "Welcome Pack" to give to new residents

The PCG is run, like the Parish Council by unpaid volunteers who, as well as actively collecting village news items, formulate each issue of the "Post", and distribute it to each household.

Currently Packington Communications Group consists of:-

- The Editor of the "Post", plus an editorial team of ten (men & women residents),
- A team of 6 distributors to deliver the Post to every house in the village

The PCG treasurer, Peter Wozywoda, asked over a year ago in March 2014 what information the Council required to consider the grant from 2015.

The PCG has complied with the various requests including:-

- Submitting a grant request for £2,100 equivalent to £6.50 per household from the precept
- Conducting a survey which gave a 95% favourable response to the continuance of the Post
- 5 months later we are still awaiting a decision with a suggestion from one councillor that the grant be reduced to £150. The funding is now due to be discussed by the Parish Council on June 2nd

The question posed at the beginning of this article was "Is this the end of the PCG and the Packington Post? The answer is - it's up to you.

In issue 47 in February 2011 the then secretary of the Memorial Hall wrote:-

"Packington Post has kept everyone in the village, and some beyond, informed of local community activities since the summer of 2003 and its existence and reports showing a vibrant and active village were a vital part in the success of the Memorial Hall's lottery bid for £250,000."

He was told by lottery officials that the Post copies that they received, made the Packington Memorial Hall lottery application stand out amongst 2,100 applications and played a significant part in the bid being successful.

If you have views on the future of the Packington Post please make them known to ourselves(contact details back page) or to one of the Parish Councillors also listed on front page, either verbally or in writing.

In the summer of 2012 an article by the Chairman of the Parish Council announcing the foundation of the orchard appeared in the Packington Post. It asked for donations to purchase fruit trees trees. This was gratifyingly successful, and in November 2012 a group of volunteers planted some three dozen trees, including apples, pears, plums, damsons and cherries. The following year a further 20 or so apple trees were planted. Last winter the National Forest erected a wooden plaque to designate the orchard. This winter it is hoped to plant some heritage fruit trees which are known to have originated from this part of Leicestershire such as "Queen Caroline" from Measham, "Packington Apple" recently located in Tonge, and "Dumelow Seedling" from Shackerstone.

Communication **Group PCG**

In response to the e-mail alert concerning the future of the PCG and Packington Post(NB editorial note also the front page article). I would absolutely support the continuation of communication by the PCG.

With technological, political and economic progression, local communities have no doubt suffered. However, there is huge value in a local community - raised moral standards, constant care, sense of belonging, economic benefits. 'No man is an island'. Fundamental to a local community is communication. In a research paper by Adedokun, MO et al. (The Impact of Communication on Community Development. J Communication, 1(2): 101-105 (2010)), the authors concluded that 'communication is important in community development [the process of helping a community to strengthen itself and develop towards its full potential] and that it must be fostered for people to participate actively in the process of community development.

Communication activities can help people to share information and exchange ideas positively and productively. It enables the empowerment of communities, through motivated people actively engaged in making a difference to the places they live within. Residents need to know how they can get involved, and Councils need to know how to help them achieve this.

With village communities changing, there may be less opportunity to find out information by 'word of mouth'. It is essential for community spirit, to maintain cohesive communities and ensure everyone has a sense of belonging.

It has an essential role in ensuring residents know where to access local services and what

To The Packington | opportunities they can source locally reducing the need to travel further afield.

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Efficient communication is needed to respond to emergencies. It is also a pre-requisite for managing change and for effective responses to important issues such as consultations, as well as enabling the promotion of events and charity fund raising.

Within busy societies, it is hugely important that communication channels operate effectively within local communities. I think the Packington Post contributes to this. As the PCG, my only other comment would be (and it may already have been done) to conduct a review and with this analysis, formulate an action plan for the most effective and efficient communications plan. For the vast majority of Packington residents, this may very well be through the Packington Post.

Relevant 'Planning' objections are things such

- the sites are outside of the village boundary in open countryside and the developments will harm the rural setting of the village
- the two schemes will increase the size of the village by approx 23% and would be too many houses in one place
- The District no longer needs this amount of new houses in small villages
