





London Marathon, Ironman UK and the White Rose Ultra Marathon I have always been into sport of one kind or another. My first triathlon was around 12 months ago, after being inspired watching the Brownlee brothers triumph in the Olympics. I thought this was the kind of sport I'd like to try, little did I know I would set off on the this epic advantage of becoming an IRONMAN.

The Course

Swim: 3.8 km (2.4miles) – two laps anti-clockwise with a mass start in the water. Athletes exit from the water after first lap to commence the second lap. Water temperature of 16-19C.

Bike: 180km (112miles) – the course begins with a 14 mile point to point cycle from Pennington Flash to join a new two lap circuit at Adlington. Travelling anti-clockwise on the loops and taking in 1270m (4166ft) of climbing.

Run: 42km (26.2miles) – a full marathon.

Race day

After many months of training I found myself being awaken at 3am by the alarm clock. It was time to get up. I was sure I'd only just gone to sleep!, the race was due to start at 6:00am so I needed to be up, fed, watered and out of the hotel by 3:30am. The forecast for the day was terrible, heavy rain and wind. I located my bike — which had been racked there the day before — and proceeded to place my bottles and food on it. With the bike all set, all I needed was a final toilet break before putting my wetsuit on.



The Swim

I was soon in another queue heading for the water with 2,000 other clones wearing wetsuits and blue swim caps. I stood there looking at the faces of the people close by. Most looked nervous and a little unsure of what the "washing machine" swim start had in store for them. After two laps I had done the swim. I was feeling very comfortable and didn't have any traumas to report. Running over the timing mat I clocked 1hr 20mins which I was happy with. After a quick change it was then off on the bike leg.

The Bike



I had a race plan and so far so good. It was a long day and pace was key. There was no point doing two disciplines fast then having nothing left for the third. The bike is my weakest discipline; the plan was to maintain 16mph which would give me a 7hr split and still have legs to run. Nightmare struck! At mile 25 a spoke snapped on my rear wheel - game over I thought! Standing at the side of the road full of mixed emotions thinking I've let all my family and friends down who had supported me all the way on this journey. Remembering when this happened before I cut the rear brake cable, removed the rear brake pads and climbed back on the bike to see how far I could go. 87 miles to go with a bike that wouldn't free wheel was a big ask for any body, cycling down hill still meant pedalling. It was a good route, I finished in 7 hours 50 minutes, heading into the Macron (Reebok) Stadium feeling tired,

I still had the run to go. I located my running bag, changed into my trainers and off I went for the final 26.2 miles on foot to finish in Bolton.

The Run

The weather had been dull until part way through the bike but into the run I could feel the sun starting to burn. The great support from the mass of spectators on the course I found myself passing family and friends who had made the trip up North, one last big group hug and off I went to collect my red and final band for the last 5km to the finish. Filling with emotion the tears started. Supporters and other runners now congratulating me, you're almost there - YOUR GOING TO BE AN IRONMAN VERY SOON! Running back into town in the knowledge of only 5km to go I found extra speed in my running. I was soon turning off for the finishing shoot (which they cruelly make you pass three times on previous laps). Running down the carpet with the finishing line in sight was a fantastic feeling. And with the words "Barry you are an Ironman!" being shouted down the microphone by the wife was amazing! I crossed the line. 14 hours 35 minutes after the start.

The Finish

I'm no sports star but on Sunday 18th July I got a taste of what that must be like. The number of spectators at Pennington Flash... all the people on the bike route... the entire run route in Bolton finishing in the Square. Everyone made it a day to remember for all the competitors. No time for resting, my final event takes place on Sunday 1st November, a 60 mile cross country

Ashby's Original Flashback Band At The Bull & Lion.....

Well, it's over thirty years since The Flashback Band used to tread the boards weekly at local venues, so a one off reunion gig has been arranged at Packington's Bull and Lion for Saturday 17th October.

Although this line-up once played at a private house party in Mill Street we never played the pub although it remains within a few minutes' walk for three of the band.

Back then the Flashback Band were one of few local "go to" bands for revived 50s and 60s music and apart from numerous local pub and club gigs, the band had a residency at The Royal Hotel playing alternate weeks for many months at a time at packed, mostly Friday night, gigs.

Packington Village Hall also figured in the early 80s Flashback Band's gig list on many occasions, for special parties and events.

The Village Historical Society have a copy of a photo taken at a "Cockney" evening in 1983 organized by the late Ray Connelly, landlord of The Bull and Lion at that time, showing us on stage dressed as "barrow boys", (some people will do anything for money).

The band hasn't played together since the early eighties but far from being lonely rock and roll Miss Havishams, fondly turning the faded pages of their press cuttings scrapbook wearing ever more ill-fitting and threadbare stage suits, the individual original members are all still rockers but hidden behind respectable looking doors.



Next Packington Parish Council Meeting
Tuesday 6th October Starting 7pm

There have been four monthly meetings since the new council was formed and discussion and resolutions have been made on a number of important issues. Firstly, the proposed building of a considerable number of homes outside the development boundary of Packington was an issue that the previous Council had opposed strongly. A residents action group did manage to quash the applications by threatening a Judicial Review. However the applications were brought back to the planning authority in June and despite both sites being outside the limits for development, the slightly smaller application was granted permission. The Parish Council feels that the local planning committee was not consistent in its judgement and have lodged a complaint that the proceedings at the Planning Committee were of a poor quality and inconsistent.

We have also looked into the provision of a grant for the Packington Post. This grant has been awarded in the past over a four year term in line with the Council's term of office. In the past twelve years approximately £25,000 has been awarded. The annual amount has been approximately 12% of the Parish precept. The previous Council and present Councillors have been in dialogue with the Packington Post team looking into ways of reducing this amount and have awarded a grant for the year of £1,800 thereby reducing the precept figure by approximately 2%. The Council feels that the Packington post is an excellent magazine run by a dedicated band of people and urge residents to support their work by volunteering to perhaps fund raise, produce articles and use the Post to advertise.

The Parish Council will soon be looking at the proposed new "Local Plan" produced by North West Leics District Council. This Plan, if approved by the Government Inspectorate, will be a blue print for development for our area for the

next 25years. NWLDC has not had a plan in existence since the "Core Strategy" did not receive approval in 2012/3. The idea for a "Core Strategy" was set up in 2006 and is now being used a basis for the new Local Plan. The Parish Council will let you know of the proposals and inform you how your voice can be heard.

Other matters which have taken our time.

1. Grass verges within the village boundary.

To our knowledge we have had three cuts performed by Leics County Council Highways Dept. so far this year. The village is scheduled for just five cuts this year. Many of you could not wait for the first cut which was on May 28th and started doing the mowing yourselves. Because you did so you have remained in charge of that mowing producing a better job than those paid to do it! Well done! As a Parish Council, which is unable to give you this service, we are appalled at the standard and frequency of the verges cut by the County Council. We have complained but with little or no effect. We urge you to ring up Leics County Council to complain about the poor service and get them to log your complaint.

- 2. There is also a similar LCC highways issue re the overgrown trees in Mill St. The Parish Council has raised severe safety issues regarding children coming out of Little Lane who cannot see the traffic in the road and traffic coming on to Mill St from Hall lane. We have met an LCC representative on site and they say they will do it soon. That was two months ago and we have sent in another request for action. If the trees have not been sorted by the time you read this please ring LCC Highways and get your complaint logged.
- 3. The damaged speed sign on Ashby Rd which you, through the precept, paid for, has been repaired by LCC Highways. We did hear that the person who knocked it

down is being asked for the money to replace the sign.

Good News For Packington Community Benefit Fund

Speeding in the Village

the illuminated sign the car ended
up over the hedge in the field.
Fortunately no one was injured but
speed was the cause. The second
was in Hall Lane when a vehicle
turned in too fast and struck a
parked car which has had to be
written off

There is no doubt that too many drivers ignore the 30 mph speed limit through the village. The Police did have a speed trap in Ashby Rd on one day but at the wrong time to catch the real and regular offenders.

We can all play our part by observing the limit ourselves as we drive in and out of Packington.


