Planning issues.

The Parish Council have considered a number of plans in their monthly meetings of Oct and Nov. The most significant of these has been the proposal to build another Solar Farm on land near Hill Farm, Spring Lane and a proposal to build three dwellings on the Poultry Farm off Coleorton Lane. Whilst the Council had some reservations concerning the Solar Farm they accept that alternative energy creation can be best done on sites that are hidden and therefore did not oppose the application. I point out however that Councillor Martin recorded his opposition to Solar farms. The Council felt, in relation to the Poultry farm application, that the site was classed as an Agricultural development and exists outside the development limits of Packington. It also has significant access issues. It was agreed that the Parish Council would oppose the application and ask District Councillor Smith to call the application before the District Planning Committee.

This is a statement from Spring Lane Residents

Following the refusal of planning permission in June for the 42 houses proposed for Spring Lane, the developers have regrouped and are now proposing a smaller development, Residents in Spring Lane have received details from the developer of a sketch scheme for 8 large houses on the paddock nearest to the junction of Spring Lane with Normanton Road. The application is about to be submitted to the Council and residents views will be sought as part of the consultation process. If residents have any views they should be made in writing to the Council once the application has been given a reference number. A decision is likely to be made in February or March of next year.

To stop the seasonal peak, the police are urging home owners to leave lights on, lock windows and doors and make sure it looks as though someone is home even if the house is unoccupied. From October 12th, a team of officers will be dedicated to preventing and investigating burglaries in hot spot areas in a bid to prevent the seasonal increase. If anyone is burgled they will be visited by officers from their Dedicated Neighbourhood Team who will deliver 'cocooning' packs to them and their neighbours which offer support and crime prevention advice. They will also 'leaflet' the rest of the street warning residents that a burglary has taken place and asking them if they have any

information.

There were 2 incidents in October of car break-ins and number plate thefts. Both were in Mill Street. Mark Arjoo advised that Coalville Tyres and Exhausts on Central road in Hugglescote provide a service for fitting anti-theft screws. I spoke with the garage and they informed me that this service is in liaison with the local police, and that the screws are fitted on a free of charge basis.

About Hospice Hope

Hospice Hope was formed following the closure of the Sue Ryder Hospice at Staunton Harold in 2002, which provided palliative care to adults living in North West Leicestershire. A group of committed individuals felt that this closure came at a heavy cost to their local community, with alternative palliative care being some considerable distance away with little or no NHS support in the area.



Hospice Hope was therefore formed as a registered charity to provide support to local people with life limiting illnesses and their carers / immediate family members. Its objectives are to run a network of local Support groups (called Cafés) to provide free 'dropin' support on a weekly basis in North West Leicestershire and to open a Day Care Centre, to operate up to 5 days a week. Presently the charity runs three weekly support Cafés in Ashby de la Zouch, Coalville and Ibstock, and is actively searching for either land or suitable premises to locate a Day Care Centre.

Ollie Bassett debut for Yeovil Town FC

Saturday 19th September 2015 local boy Ollie Bassett from Mill Street recently made his professional football debut for Yeovil Town FC, when they played away at Crawley Town. On doing so he became the youngest ever player to play for the club. The following week he made his 'Home' debut and at the time of writing he has featured in the first team squad ever since.

Ollie was scouted by Aston Villa at a summer tournament in Burton and subsequently signed for the Premiership's Academy. He remained there from U8 until he was unfortunately released at U16.

However Ollie showed strength of character, still keen to pursue his dream, he left home at 16 to move and live in the beautiful city of Bath where he earned himself a scholarship place with the Southampton FC Second Chance programme. At the end of his first year the scholarship squad was incorporated into Yeovil Town Youth Team for the 2015/16

Ollie had impressed the Youth team manager who reported back to Paul Sturrock, the first team manager, and was subsequently promoted him into the First Team, giving him the break he had only ever dreamed of!

It is still very early days for Ollie, who knows he still has a long way to go to fulfill his ambition. However the longest journey starts with the first step, which he has well and truly taken.





Cycling

The Editor has asked me to write "a few lines about cycling" for the Packington Post, which would seem to be a straight forward enough exercise but the more I have thought about it the more complicated it has become. So where do we begin? I have cycled for as long as I can remember. I have been cycling for over 50 years and still cycle regularly today. My first experience with the cycling club, at age of 14, was regular Sunday club runs covering distances of 30 to 130 miles in the day. During the summer months rides of 70 to 80 miles were the norm. Then there were the Youth Hostel holidays to various parts of the country. Finally there was the competitive side of the pastime on the road, track and in fields (cyclo-cross). We are very fortunate living in Packington having easy access to very pleasant, generally quiet country lanes with fairly flat terrain. If you're uneasy about cycling on the road there are excellent off road cycle tracks at Hicks Lodge, between Moira and Donisthorpe, where you can gain the necessary confidence to venture on to the road.

Cycling is a pastime that can be undertaken as an individual or in a group. Group riding can be very rewarding, mixing with people with a similar outlook and discovering more about the local countryside. Today, cycling is very popular mainly due to Olympic and Tour de France success and I understand it has been classed as the "New Golf" for young businessmen and

There are two groups that organise rides locally for catering for all abilities:

The Charnwood Section of the Cyclists Touring Club (CTC). As their title suggests they cater for touring and non competitive cycling and have runs every Sunday from Ashby, Heather Measham and Coalville. They also organise Wednesday runs. Details can be found on their Facebook Page.


