A New Footpath

In 2012 I was standing in Packington Wood, on the proposed site of Packington Community Orchard, with Chris Miles, Chairman of the Parish Council. We realised that this beautiful recreational area was almost inaccessible to pedestrians walking from Packington. The reason being that the existing footpath from Babelake Street came out onto Measham Road, opposite the Sewage Farm, on a dangerous bend. Pedestrians had to walk for fifty yards along this road, or attempt a very uneven verge to get to the safety of Normandy Wood. "If only", I said," there was a footpath through the narrow field (50 yards wide) from the existing footpath to Normandy Wood". I knew that creating or altering existing footpaths can take many years and involve an enormous amount of work. Undeterred Chris contacted the owner of the said

field who very generously gave his consent for a permissive footpath.

He then approached the District Council, and the National Forest for their support. He wrote to The Church Commissioners, (and many times to their solicitors) the owners of the contiguous (glebe land) field, to make an entrance to the proposed path.

Finally four years later, after much correspondence, and work, the path is in place. The cost of the new stock proof fence, and gates, has been shared between the Parish & District councils. Packington Wood is now accessible on foot, via Normandy Wood, and if you are looking for a 30/45 minute walk from Packington there is a pleasant path around the perimeter of Packington Wood which can be included.

You can now walk, or jog, all the way to "Springs Hydro" from Babelake Street without going on a public road, and you can carry on to Measham on footpaths if you cross Gallows Lane.

For a longer walk you can turn left at Gallows Lane there is another footpath which zigzags in an easterly direction to Normanton Lane, where you can return to Packington along Red Burrow Lane.

When walking from Babelake Street with a dog it may be advisable to keep it on a lead until you reach Normandy Wood as crops are grown in the first field and livestock kept in the field adjoining the new footpath.

RURAL WATCH

On Tuesday 23rd February, Leicestershire Police launched a new scheme to help tackle rural



Rural Watch

Rural Watch has been set up to create a network of villagers, farmers, churches and businesses that can work together to address local policing issues, share information and combat crime. It brings together several existing schemes, including Horse Watch, Church Watch and Farm Watch, which have been operating across the force area, to create a bigger network and to help ensure everyone has access to advice and information.

The scheme was officially launched at Melton Cattle Market by Deputy Chief Constable Roger Bannister.

Residents can join the scheme by signing up to receive text or email alerts about incidents and crime in their local area. In return we encourage members to actively report suspicious people, vehicles and activity to us by calling 101. By encouraging them to report suspicious activity to us quickly, we can respond more effectively and work with them to make their communities even safer.

We are also increasing our visibility in rural areas by holding more targeted crime prevention events such as barn meets, tack marking days and community contact activities, where people can get crime prevention advice assessments from a local police officer or specific support and advice.

The scheme has received backing from the National Farmers Union and NFU Mutual. Tim Price, Rural Affairs Specialist at NFU Mutual said: "The Rural Watch scheme is a great opportunity for people to find out more about crime prevention. Rural communities should remain vigilant and put security at the forefront of their minds."

Police and Crime Commissioner, Sir Clive Loader, said; "Rural communities often tell us that they feel exposed to rural crime and events like this confirm our commitment to keeping them safe and helping them keep themselves safe."

Rural Watch is open to anyone who lives, works or visits rural locations in Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland. For more information about the

Thank you from the Family of Eve Brocklehurst

Eve Brocklehurst, a resident of Packington for nearly 50 years, passed away on December 18th 2015 aged 92. Born in Kingston upon Hull in the East Riding of Yorkshire, she was the youngest within a large family and, with a strong determination which never left her, as those who knew her well can attest to. she wanted to get on in life. She married Hedley Brocklehurst, a young infantry officer, during the war. During this period whilst Hedley was away in Europe, Eve joined the Land Army helping to keep the farms of Yorkshire going. In 2014 she was awarded a special commemorative medal for her work by Prime Minister David Cameron.

After the war Hedley worked in the dairy business, moving to become Manager of Ivanhoe Dairies in Ashby in the 1960's. Hedley and Eve settled at Highfield's Close in Ashby where the family home for Roger, Jane and Jill was created. In 1970 the family moved to The Ginnel, 43 Babelake St. Packington, renovating the old cottage into a warm and cosy family home. Eve was a great hostess, opening her garden up for charity garden parties and hosting dinners for Hedley and his Rotary Club colleagues. Eve was diagnosed with Breast cancer and through quick intervention it was arrested. However she was always aware of the stress illness caused and she always had an open door for anyone who was troubled or suffering. Sadly Eve's life was terribly shocked when Jill, her youngest daughter, died very suddenly on the day of Packington Carnival on 22 June 1996. Jill left three children: Katie 6, Harry 4 and Jack 2. The family tragedies continued as Hedley died in



hospital the next year from complication with heart surgery, and Roger passed away the following year from mouth cancer. Eve handled these tragedies with stoicism and courage throwing herself into village school life, helping children to learn to read. With her patience there are many local 18-20 year olds who benefited from her encouragement whilst at Packington School.

During her life Eve affected many people. She died aged 92 having lived a fulfilled life. She will be remember as a character. Her determination and directness were balanced by a kind heart and an open ear to anyone who was trouble. She will be fondly remembered by many people. Her funeral service on 5 Jan 2016 was intended to be a celebration of Eve's life; and with over two hundred people attending. daughter Jane Bryan, on behalf of the family, is appreciative of the kindness and good wishes shown expressed by Eve's many friends and acquaintances who helped celebrate her long and fulfilled life. The family hope that the pink roses (called 'Heaven') that were distributed at the funeral reception, which reflected Eve's favourite colour, acted as a small memento of her humour, friendship and humanity towards others. Your very generous donations in memory of Eve raised over £220 for Measham Medical Unit and over £280 for RNLI with a further £100 for Mission Aviation Fellowship – Thank You

A New Walk

Residents of Packington can now have a new picnic outing with the family this summer without using the car. Walk from Packington School down Babelake Street until you come to a footpath sign on the right (opposite the sign saying "No foot way for ¾ of a mile"). Take this path (which crosses an "L" shaped field diagonally towards Measham Road) following the direction indicated by the sign. When you get to the far corner of this field look for the yellow post you will see the new path to Normandy Wood.



Go through the two new gates and continue in the same direction to the next yellow post. Bear left through Normandy Wood and go through a stile and into Packington Wood. Bear to the left and walk up to the "Notice Board". Here it tells you that you are about to cross the Roman Road "Via Devana" which went from Colchester to Chester. It's probably a good idea to reassure any accompanying small children at this point that you aren't intending to walk to either of these destinations today, and "Yes we are nearly there.'

Use the diagonal footpath to the top right hand corner of the wood. This will take you through our Community Orchard (note the sign). Before you reach the stile in the hedge bear left up to the single large tree, where an oak picnic table has been carefully positioned by the National Forest to enjoy the beautiful views to the north and east. The rather less attractive A42 and new solar farm in the distance to the west will become less visible as the trees around the picnic table grow taller. This year, on 3rd March, I watched a pair of lapwings

give an amazing flying display in the adjacent field after hearing their very individual "peewit" cries. In June you can be almost guaranteed to hear Larks singing all around you. Some of the trees, just below the picnic site, planted by former pupils of Packington School are now over 8 metres tall. You can just see Holy Rood Church in the distance from the picnic table as you eat your picnic. Bon Appetit!

Return home along the path which goes around the perimeter of Packington Wood and then from Normandy Wood back across the fields to Babelake Street.

The whole picnic walk starting and ending at Packington School should take a child of 8 about 45 minutes. Parents carrying the picnic hamper and the discarded coats may take a little longer.
