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# Bonfire Party Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> November 6-45pm

We hope to repeat the success of previous Bonfire Parties and as you can see we are keeping to the traditional date again this year.

There is a need to build a safe bonfire, so we are asking those of you who bring material to burn to check the contents before you take it to the site with Chris Miles. Over the last few years the bonfires have been terrific because we have built it from pallets and fencing etc. Smoke was limited because we did not have green material.

Anyone who has any easily combustible wood such as old fence panels, pallets and old sheds, can bring them to the bonfire site or make arrangements for collection by calling the contact numbers below. We hope to start accepting wood from Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> October. The Bonfire Party will be run on similar lines to previous years. The bonfire will be lit as near to 7pm as possible and there will be two sessions of Display Fireworks. In the interval there will be a sparkler session for youngsters accompanied by an adult and this will be free of charge. The event itself is free but we shall ask you for a donation which can be gift aided and will help the charity to pursue its aims.

Entry to the Recreation Ground will be via the top entrance to the Plav-area in Vicarage Lane. Anyone parking in the Recreation Ground car-park will be asked to walk up Vicarage Lane to this entrance as it is a safer access in the dark. Hot doas, burgers, punch and drinks can be purchased and we hope you all have an enjoyable time. Please come and support this event no matter what the weather. There will be over £400 of display fireworks and as the charity has had to pay a hefty £400 insurance premium to stage this bonfire, we need to see the whole of Packington on the Recreation Ground. Please Do Not bring any of your own fireworks to this event. This includes sparklers. It is a condition of the insurance that only authorised fireworks are displayed in a safe and secure environment. The money raised at last year's bonfire night has been spent on maintenance and repair of the jungle apparatus.

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Ange Hardy & Lukas Drinkwater in Concert 7<sup>th</sup> October @ 7.30





#### **The Churchyard**

Many thanks to all those who give of their time to maintain Holy Rood Churchyard in good order. All the help is voluntary and much appreciated. More help is always welcome so do contact Revd Vivien Elphick (01530 270354) if you are willing to join regularly or at one of the working parties.

The churchyard has a long history. The original churchyard immediately surrounded the church. This is a medieval (or earlier) churchyard and is probably what I call a triple decker (i.e. they were quite happy to 'bury over' in the old days. There weren't headstones (too expensive) and often people were buried in shrouds.

In 1893 a further 1/3<sup>rd</sup> acre was added on the south side of the church. The land belonged to the Earl of Loudon. When he paid for a new school on Mill Street in 1893, he gave the land to the church because the churchyard had become insufficient for current use. It was consecrated by the Bishop of Peterborough on July 10<sup>th</sup> 1893.

The new burial ground (across Vicarage Lane) was added in 1974 and consecrated on 9th December of that year. It is this part of the churchyard that is currently in use. Pete and Terry have worked hard over the last 12 months to get the burial ground looking as good as it does. This tidy up was more to generally have it looking good as there would be visitors to the village on Bank Holiday Monday. Pete and Terry have maintained it for a while now and with additional help from Clive and Colin to cut the hedges.

#### Awards for All Lottery Grant

We are delighted to announce that the Packington School Association has been successful in a bid for an Awards for All Lottery Grant. The funding will enable us to continue our toddler keep fit club (Tiny Tots) and will also be used to pay for a lunch time club, an after school club and several free holiday play schemes for pupils at the school.

#### **Tiny Tots**

Our Tiny Tots club is a free parent and toddler group held in our hall on Tuesdays, 2:30-3:15pm during term time. All children are welcome to attend, regardless of whether they have siblings in school. The sessions are run by a NGB Level 2 qualified coach and will give pre-school children a great opportunity to develop their motor skills, co-ordination, agility and balance. This term we have introduced friendship groups within our houses. We have organised the hall so that during collective worship the children sit in their houses and with their friendship groups. #### Life Education Bus

As always there will also be an opportunity for parents to participate in a presentation to find out what it's all about.

#### **Cross Country**

The Unity Schools Cross Country event in Packington has been given a provisional date to take place on Saturday 29th October give villagers prior notification of our plans. The event involves up to 20 schools and we appreciate your support in making the day a great success and putting Packington on the map.



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#### Your Parish Council have been working hard on your behalf on a number of issues, some having successful outcomes, others have proved difficult to gain a satisfactory conclusion. Firstly, the Parish Council has a new website www.packingtonpc.org.uk

The County Council had previously hosted this but that contract ended for all parish councils on 31st August. Working with the Parish Council's local Association, a new provider was identified who could support links with NWLDC and meet freedom of information objectives. The website has only been up and running for a few days, but is worth a visit. You can view planning applications with just a few clicks, agendas and minutes of the parish council. The initial set up cost with training provision was £650.00. The new website provides the parish council with much more functionality than before and is more interactive for its users. Annual running cost for this service and an email account will be £425.00. Planning issues. Even though the Local Planning Authority have a healthy five year land supply for housing and have said that there is no need to build and plan for more housing (see NWLDC LOCAL PLAN). Packington seems to be a hotbed for new builds despite the recent

influx of over 38 new homes passed for Packington in 2015. With the approval of a

#### single house in a pony paddock on Babelake Street, it seems that Packington may be on its way to a new home boom. The Parish Council has been consistent in sticking to the policy that any application to build outside Packington's Development Boundary should be opposed. However, the controlling NWLDC Planning Committee does not uphold this Planning Policy and regularly give permissions. The Parish Council also debated the application for B1 use and alterations and improvements to farm buildings near to the Recreation Ground. It is understood that the farm is diversifying and has already got a new entrance planned from Measham Rd. The council could see no reasons to object to this proposal but made observations with regard to possible traffic hazards.

Our Clerk Victoria Roe has been with us for four years and because she recently became Clerk at Kegworth Parish and has been offered increased hours, she feels that she can no longer devote the time necessary to be Clerk at Packington. We therefore have a vacancy for that post and ask anyone who thinks they have the necessary communication and IT skills to contact the Clerk to get an application form. It may well be found on our new website. We had a Police report at our

meeting on the 6<sup>th</sup> Sept and it is a little disturbing to note that the criminal incidents

which have occurred in Packington over the last two months are the worst I can recall since joining the Council in the 90's. One that really made me wonder was theft of dog out walking with owner when car stopped grabbed dog and raced off'. The other of course was the lead theft at the Church, and after all that hard work by the Open Gardens Team. Finally, may I take this opportunity to remind those households who border onto roadways, footpaths, Little Lane, etc that it is their responsibility to cut back obstructing trees, hedges and vegetation. Failure to do so will mean that the LCC highways will do the job and send you the invoice. Chris Miles (Chairman) **Contact 414378**

#### Memorial Hall News.

The summer holiday "quiet" period has enabled the management committee to arrange for a specialist firm to "clean" the cooker in the kitchen, and have the dishwasher and glasswashers serviced. In addition the new sound system has been installed ready for the first Film Club Show of the autumn season. On the 2nd August the "Big Lottery Fund" emailed the Chairman requesting a visit to the Memorial Hall that week to check that the Hall was meeting its funding grant obligations. On Friday 5th August the Chairman and Secretary of the management committee met 2 representatives of the Lottery at the Hall.

They were shown around the premises and given a verbal report by the Chairman on new equipment and fittings acquired since the 2009 refurbishment, and details of new groups using the Hall on a regular basis. The Secretary backed this up with a written report detailing the increase in individual hirers using the Hall, and supplied recent copies of the

"Packington Post" showing photos of the "Big Breakfast" in February, and other Packington groups using the Hall over the last 12 months.

The following day the Chairman received an email from the Big Lottery Fund thanking us for showing them around "your fabulous Memorial Hall" and wishing us all continued success in the future. #### Lead Theft from Holy Rood

Between 10 past midnight and 3:40am in the early hours of this morning (Wednesday 31st August) Holy Rood Church on Vicarage Lane, Packington, was the victim of a lead theft. A quantity of lead was stolen from the roof.
