



that it was the District Council's responsibility to stop development in open countryside outside the limits of development.

The Parish Council also considered an application for a Large House, Stabling and other support buildings for a Horse Stud. The proposed site was the corner of a field bordered by Redburrow Lane and Normanton Road. The Council felt this was again another development outside the development boundary and decided to oppose the application.

The Parish Council has a new Web site and it has links to all sorts of local information. Have a look at it and see if you want to have an input by contacting the Clerk who will be administering this site.

Planning Update from the Spring Lane Area

The following currently known Planning Applications for housing in the lower Normanton Road/ Spring Lane area are listed. The thirty house development off Normanton Road is obviously in progress so let's look at the others lodged with NWLDC, as this part of the Village seems to attract multiple green field applications running at any one time.

14/00109/OUT – four large houses off the lower part of Normanton Road at the back of Spring Lane –remaining as outline permission at the moment.

15/01064/OUT – three large houses, Spring Lane – this is lodged with NWLDC and no update is available.

16/00888/OUT – a large house, garage and stable block, corner of Normanton Road and Redburrow Lane. This would sit at the end of the present thirty dwelling development. Currently out for consultation.

Two separate applications 15/01051/OUT – eight large houses and 16/00925/FUL – four large houses on the same land on the corner of Spring Lane and Normanton Road. At a very recent NWLDC full Planning Committee meeting attended by Parish Councillors and various local residents these were refused planning permission.
