## Packington Joins Action Against HS2 Re-route



Firstly what a great response from Packington people to the short notice call for this meeting. The Memorial Hall was packed with over 120 attending. As we all know the new proposed route for the HS2 will now be even closer to more people than the previous announced.

The Chairman, Chris Miles explained what had happened since the announcement of the changes by HS2 on the 15th Nov. He mentioned that Measham was greatly affected and had already called a wellsupported, meeting in St Laurence's Church and had set up an Action Group. The Measham group would like all local villages who are in the same position to work together and whilst having their own submission to the consultation process, use it as part of a collective approach as well.

The Villages of Measham, Appleby, Packington and Austrey have formed a group called MAPA.

Hello to all residents of Packington.

2016 saw myself and my colleagues from the Dedicated Neighbourhood Team working closely again with both Packington Parish Council and Neighbourhood Watch.

It has been recently been highlighted about the amount of crime committed in the village. In an ideal world, there would be no crime but sadly the world we live in means that we are going to have victims of crime.

I think that the most important thing to remember is that we work together to try and keep crime levels to a minimum, reduce them, and make the area a safe place to live.

This means taking a number of measures including putting your own simple and inexpensive crime reduction processes in place, and reporting any suspicious incidents to the police at the time. Also, please take time to find out who your Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator is.If you are unfortunate enough to become a victim of crime, firstly report it to the police, and then secondly to your NHW coordinator. They will then cascade the information via e-mail, social media, etc, in order to keep other local residents informed. To look at what incidents of

"The crunch has finally come. People want to use them (village halls) but they don't want to commit to running them"

Talking to friends, from rural communities all across the country, over the last few months, it is clear that everywhere there are growing problems finding volunteers to help run village groups, or community activities.

#### **Ageing Volunteers**

Volunteers who are active in their communities are frequently carrying on (in some cases well into their 80s) until they become incapable through illness, or even sometimes die in post. In some cases, these volunteers, because they are willing volunteers, find themselves taking on more and more roles. They inadvertently, from selfless reasons, make themselves indispensable.

When they finally depart no one else knows how to run the organisations they have been faithfully keeping going for the last "many years". In one village I heard about they had to try and find 5 volunteers to do the work one elderly lady had managed on her own for many years.

#### **Defined Period**

One solution to this growing problem is to limit the time anyone can spend fulfilling one specific role. This has a number of advantages:

- 1. It enhances the chance of finding volunteers if they know there is a specific time limit to the role e.g. 2 years, 5 years, or, maybe, in some exceptional cases 10 years.
- 2. It rotates willing volunteers so that they can work in different areas and build up more expertise, and provide temporary cover for previous roles they have experienced, where necessary
- **3.** It helps bring forward new ideas and solutions, and new energy to help deal with previously insoluble problems.

It has one obvious disadvantage. Unless new volunteers can be found village activities will in due course cease when those currently bearing the burden give up their tenure. In Packington, in the last few months, we have lost 2 groups (Girl Guides, and W.I.) that have each been running for 40+ years. I am confident that there are people in the village who care enough about the wellbeing of their community to ensure the continuity of their Memorial Hall

#### Secretary now required

I will have completed 10 very rewarding years as secretary of the Memorial Hall Management committee in March. I thought it would be a good time to remind those who attended last year's AGM that I agreed, at that meeting, to stand as Secretary for one last year which will end on March 21st 2017 at the next AGM. Over the last two months the Parish Council have been extremely busy. With the announcement of the change of route of HS2 some Councillors have attended two meetings held in Measham and as many you know Packington held a public meeting in the Memorial Hall at very short notice which resulted in the setting up of a group to object to the HS2 proposal. (see separate article). Councillors and clerk also attended a Parish Liason meeting with NWLDC. We then had a presentation from the ASHBY 20 Road Race Committee. The event this year will be on Sunday, March 19th. Details of road closures and timings were given. In broad terms, the route which runs anti clockwise from Ashby road, Mill St, Measham Rd, Gallows Lane. Heather. Normanton Rd, Heather Lane, High St will be closed on the left side from approximately 9am to 4pm. Ivanhoe runners will be doing a litter pick before and after the event along the route. It is hoped that Packington volunteers could add to this activity on the day. Many will recall we collected a vast amount of rubbish one Saturday morning three years ago. The Police report was presented by PC Mark Arjoo and Councillors were amazed at the number of quite serious incidents which were reported. This was replicated at the January meeting and concern by the Council has been growing for

some time. At the 7th February Parish Council Meeting, an invitation for a senior officer to address the Council Meeting has been accepted. There are a number of things you can do to help stop these crimes. 1 Lock all doors. 2 Make it difficult to enter your property from the side and the back. 3 Do not leave keys visible in your house. 4 do not leave any valuables on view in your car. 5. Report any suspicious vans, people and events to the police. The police are under resourced and may not attend but they will take note of your concerns. This item was concluded with a motion. "The police report to be published on the Council's web site within a week of the meeting". This was unanimously supported. The Council then discussed the tendering process for the maintenance of the Churchyard and the Recreation Ground. It was also noted that the poor quality of verge grass cutting last year and Councillors thought that Packington had not had the number of statutory cuts. Following an inquiry with LCC which said we did, we wonder whether they can count to six. A number of planning applications were discussed and the proposal for a development of three houses was objected to on the grounds that it was outside Packington's Development Boundary. No objections were made to

the more minor proposals for

the other planning applications. The second meeting by Parish Council was held on Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> Jan. Minutes for this meeting await ratification. However the main points of discussion were; Police report, again quite a lengthy list of offences; Budget requirement for the year 2017/18 including the Packington Post grant award; an HS2 report on the public meeting held at the Memorial Hall 6<sup>th</sup> Jan. and the first HS2 action group meeting held on the Mon 9th January; Chris Miles Chairman **New Clerk to Parish**

## Proposed 50mph speed limit



Five Lanes End is where Gallows lane, Willesley Woodside and Packington Road join Ashby Road, Measham and Measham Road, Ashby all in close proximity to each other. Due to the number of accidents on the approaches to this junction it is proposed that on Ashby Road, Measham and Measham Road, Ashby the existing national speed limit is reduced to 50mph. This will effectively join the 50mph speed limits as you approach Measham and Ashby giving a continuous speed limit of 50mph between Ashby and Measham

On Gallows Lane it is proposed that a section of the road that is currently national speed limit is made 50mph as you approach the junction. On Measham Road, Packington the proposal is to make the length of road from the current 30mph terminal signs to Five Lanes End all 50mph.

The proposals are shown in plan TM4441/1/2016 and are being made in the interests of road safety.

#### Willesley Wood

Willesley Wood is 57Ha of woodland, grassland and open water created on a former mining site in the heart of The National Forest. Owned and created by the Woodland Trust, this site is where the first tree of the new National Forest was planted in 1991 by Michael Heseltine.

In addition to the planting of fifty five thousand new trees, two areas of semi-mature woodland include wetter areas, which support native black poplar trees. Both areas have ancient woodland species, such as pendulous sedge, bluebell and dog mercurv.

Most of the existing paths and rides on the site are unsuitable for battery powered scooters, wheelchairs, buggies, pushchairs and mobility impaired user groups.

The Woodland Trust has received planning permission for the creation of new aggregate footpaths and upgrades to the existing paths, which will, when complete, allow every visitor to follow a one and a quarter mile route around the lake. This was followed with a screen presentation and an explanation of the exact new route proposal. Questions were asked and answers were given where possible and members of the public who had obviously researched this topic also provided answers and information.

Despite the short notice call of the meeting five Parish Councillors were present along with Nigel Smith our District Councillor and Andrew Bridgen our MP. After many had spoken of the vast expense, the waste of resources, the lack of reality. and the determination all main political parties to go ahead with this scheme, Mr Andrew Bridgen was asked to speak. He was most forthright in saying that he agreed with the reasons that many had given to reject the whole of HS2. He had always voted against it and apart from twenty-eight other MPs who have also spoken against the project, it seems that it is going ahead. He did say that there were a number of MP's who had misgivings on HS2 but were not prepared to speak out against the project.

To sum up this debate would be to say that everyone felt HS2 was a complete waste of money and would bring little benefit to the country and particularly to North West Leics. The Chairman then proposed a motion that a working party be formed to respond on behalf of Packington and MAPA to the HS2 consultation. Following a short debate regarding the exact instruction to the working party a motion was formed and passed unanimously.

Volunteers for the working party were then asked for and eleven Packington residents stepped up the plate for which we thank them.
