At the meeting on the 9th October we looked at the questionnaire that had been circulated and as a result we made a list of suggestions received. The following list is in no particular order of merit. Walking labyrinth; baby and toddler apparatus; disabled equipment; gym stations; multi surface sports area; Skatepark; new goals with nets; Zip wire; team swing; outdoor draughts and chess board; flood lighting. Since that meeting further suggestions have been made and include; provision of water and electricty with a base for easy erection of tent/cover for events: make a more suitable hardcore roadway to get onto the field. At the conclusion of our first meeting it was decided that lines of enquiry will be opened to explore the following areas.

- Multi Sports Play Area.
- All-Age Gym Fitness Station
- Zip Wire providers
- Team swing (an inclusive piece of apparatus).

At the 3rd October meeting of the Parish Council only two incidents were reported on by the police. One was antisocial behaviour (loud party) on Measham Rd, the other was a road traffic collision on Coleorton Lane. However. in the month of October and early November, Packington was a hot spot for police related incidents. It was also a bad month for traffic accidents. In all, thirteen cases were reported to the Council by the Police. Further details can be found on the Parish Council web site.

Under separate items the Council discussed an update concerning HS2 and a request by District Council as to whether Packington will be making any preparations to celebrate the 100 years anniversary of the end of WW1. This will be the weekend of November 10th and 11th 2018. It was agreed that something will be arranged and be an agenda item for the foreseeable future.

For some time, Councillors have expressed dissatisfaction with some of the surface and access of footpaths, pavements and roads within Packington and as a result, a list of all the areas of concern was made. At our November meeting a representative of County Highways was present to address the issues with Councillors. Together with the support of the Chairman of LCC and Valley Ward

Councillor representative, Nick Rushton and the dogged determination of Councillor Martin to get things done, many of our concerns had been recently addressed with others shown to be on the repair programme within the next few months.

During the November meeting Councillors addressed the issue of the Council Budget for 2018/19 and during discussions it was agreed to award the Packington Post a grant of £2000 to assist with the cost of printing. The final budget for the New Year will be announced and verified at the December Parish Council Meeting.

As many of you know the village has a Solar Farm Community Fund and funding requests are determined following an application. The Council agreed at their November meeting to award the **Packington Communications** Group a grant of £300 to assist with the production and printing of the Packington Welcome Pack. This pack is distributed to newcomers to our village and if you are awaiting a pack or are new to the village, please contact the Packington Post team and in particular, Becky Taylor who has now taken over the role of co-ordinator for the Welcome Pack. (If you need one call Becky 411027)

The November meeting concluded with a number of planning applications being discussed. The final-outcome for planning issues are the responsibility of NWLDC Planning Committee, however the Parish Council has made an objection to a new build on Redburrow Lane.

This application is outside the limits to development and is detrimental to the countryside.

Bakery Project

There are some people you could listen to all evening and still want to hear more; Eugene Schellenberg was just such a person. We sat enthralled as he recounted coming to England from Switzerland, getting married, working with kitchen equipment and eventually with his wife, visiting his son working in a tropical diseases unit in Tanzania.

He then went on to explain how they became involved in equipping a bakery in a wing of a convent 200 miles away from the nearest bakery! It was enthralling. This unassuming couple attempt to raise £30,000 each year, to keep the free bakery going, by doing regular talks such as this one. They take no expenses so all donations are given to the Ifakara Bakery Project and Free Bread Funds.



Ladies Group donated £50 and separate donations swelled the total to £133 which, in his letter he explains, 'Thank you very much. You may like to know that your gifts will enable us to fund 532 loaves of bread for those in Ifakara who have so little but much appreciate their daily bread.' The Gift Aid donations will provide a further 40 loaves.

Eugene goes on to say, 'It is very difficult to put into words how grateful the people are who now receive their daily bread. During our recent visit we were asked again and again to ensure that everybody who is helping us to maintain the bread funds should know how much of a life-line it is for them. We saw how much good the regular supply of nutritious bread does to so many'

Flu vaccination for children Just a reminder to parents and carers that we now have plenty of stock of the nasal flu vaccination for children aged 2-4 (excluding children in Reception who will be immunised at school). It's just a quick squirt up each nostril for children and will protect them against the really unpleasant effects of flu. Please book with reception now if you would like your child to have this vaccination.

It's coming to that time of year again when coughs, colds, sneezing and sore throats are abundant. These are all the signs of the common cold. If you have any of the following symptoms raised temperature (39-40°), sweating, overwhelming tiredness, chesty cough and sneezing these are signs that you may have flu. Most healthy adults do not need to see a doctor for colds or flu. You should rest your body; drink plenty of nonalcoholic fluids; ask your local pharmacist for advice AND remember antibiotics will not help colds, flu or sore throats. Children or adults with chronic health conditions, very high temperature or severe pain should seek medical advice. Contact 414131

The Memorial Hall is probably one of the most used village community buildings in the county and much of the credit for this is down to the hard working, voluntary contributions made by the Trustees. I am happy to report that our new booking secretary, Sally, is preparing to take over from Joan who is retiring having done all the ground work for our online booking system. The Hall has streamlined its booking procedures and we hope it will make it easier to hire the Hall. We have recently had two volunteers to manage the secretary's role and in Hilary and Debbie I feel the Hall will receive excellent service. At the last two meetings there were talks on setting up a Short Mat Bowls group and to make the Table Tennis Tables more accessible. At present four tables are stored in the container at the rear of the Hall. The Trustees are exploring the possibility of an extra storage room at the rear of the Hall which can be accessed by double doors to the side of the stage. We are at the design stage and we await instruction from David Granger Architectural Design Ltd who are currently drawing up plans. During the year the Memorial Hall Committee have been reviewing their policy statements for health and safety, social inclusion, fire risk assessment etc. We hope to have them all sorted by early next year.

The Hall has been busy at weekends over the past few months. We hosted the ever popular Packington Horticultural Show; a local wedding where the Hall was superbly decorated; a 50th birthday; a 70th birthday; a Christening;

A Choir Concert; a Folk Concert Night; plus numerous children's birthday parties.

Many people who attend events and functions often remark to me. "What a fantastic venue. It's so bright and clean and so well equipped." This leads me to say thank you to the cleaning staff who often go unnoticed when they are cleaning floors and toilets at 1am in the morning so that the Hall is ready for a 9am booking the next day.

Sheep Killed

Over the days around Thursday 9th-Friday 10th November, a sheep was attacked and died in Plummer's Wood. Evidence on the body indicated an attack by an animal leading to the death of the sheep. Death is not necessarily caused by the actual physical injury, but the animal is literally "frightened" to death if harassed and chased. A second sheep showed evidence of being attacked but survived. Given the size of the sheep it is highly unlikely to have been a fox and a more likely culprit is a dog. Another great day for Packington! Though damp underfoot, the weather conditions were perfect for over 500 people to enjoy this Party. With clear skies and a crisp cold feel in the air, the bonfire was lit by Packington's expert bonfire builder Bob Plant. At precisely 7-00 pm the damp fence panels, pallets, wooden sheds, posts and all things easily burnable were a-light in seconds. The bonfire, thirty metres in circumference and nearly eight metres tall, displayed flames as tall as the surrounding trees. A brilliant sight, and all spectators felt the warmth even though they were nearly fifty metres away.

A well organised team in the refreshment tent started serving early arrivals at 6-30pm and with the barbeque working flat out I am told the food team were kept busy throughout the evening.

The first half of the fireworks

display began at about 7-20 pm and saw a continuous barrage of noise and colour. At about 7-35 pm there was a lull in proceedings whilst the firework team were setting up for the finale. 

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Following my letter in the September edition of the Post a dialogue has been had with the Civil aviation Authority(CAA) and East Midlands Airport (EMA). A summary of the response and position is as follows; A complaint has been officially logged and acknowledged with the CAA. There is an official mechanism to lobby to have air corridors reviewed and moved. As to be expected, it is a long and tortuous route and will take time but it is possible.

The current air corridor from EMA to the west is a 3km swathe which was set in 2001. This was long before the current volume of flights from the airport and before the significant expansion of Ashby and surrounding district thus affecting more people now and in the future. The eastern line of the corridor goes straight over the middle of Ashby and Packington.

The western edge is the western edge of Ashby and east of Measham

The diagram shows all the tracks for a 14 day period in August 2017 and a similar profile also applies to July. (Green indicates flights above 6000ft, Yellow 5-6000ft Red 2-5000ft)

As can be seen from the diagram, the bulk of the aircraft, which are on their way to Europe, are taking the shortest route as they turn south biased towards the eastern edge of the corridor over the middle of Ashby and Packington

From 1st October the schedules have changed and the traffic is significantly reduced but will return from Spring 2018

EMA have provide the charts showing the traffic and proved sympathetic. We have an invitation to visit them to discuss the issue and possible ways of addressing it.

It is not acceptable that the aircraft are flying directly over the densest population in the area west of the airport when we are surrounded by open countryside.

The situation is only going to get worse.

Clearly whatever the outcome somebody will be adversely affected but the objective must be to minimise the number whereas at the moment the maximum seem to be affected.
