Green Light for £46k upgrade for village play area

The recreation ground charity has now finalised the upgrading of the play area in Packington. The facility upgrade has been brought about by a legally binding 106 agreement between the new Peveril Homes development and NWLDC, which states that the money can only be used on the children's play area on Measham Road. Following the views and recommendations of the residents of Packington, We are pleased to announce that over the course of the next few months we will be installing outdoor fitness equipment, a zip wire and a disabled accessible rotational swing for the older children outside but alongside the existing play area. There we will also be adding a spinner and a disabled accessible roundabout to enhance the younger children's play area.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all residents that took part in the surveys and helped shape the decision on what new equipment was required and we look forward to you all enjoying the upgraded facilities during the summer holidays and in the future.

Principles of Community Safety

Crime reduction is all about onions, writes **Paul Collett**, Community Safety Team leader
from North West Leicestershire District

Council. Keeping yourself, your family and
your home safe is all about building layers of
protection – like those in an onion – and this
article hopes to explain how you can reduce
the risk of being a victim of crime, but also how
you contribute to making Packington a safer
village.

Nothing is ever risk free. Good community safety is all about reducing the risk and pushing the criminal away. Leicestershire Police play a key role in this, but at the heart of this is you and by securing your home and property, the core of the 'onion' is strong. By supporting your neighbours, you push the criminal away from you. By getting together as a street, such as joining neighbourhood watch, you push the criminal further away. By working as a community, such as the village's new CCTV Scheme, you make it harder for criminals, again pushing them even further away. Working with Safer North West Leicestershire Partnership we can make the district safer, pushing the crime out of North West Leicestershire and if all districts work together we can make Leicestershire safer, but at the heart of all this is you.

So how do you make your home safe? Well, Leicestershire police has an excellent website where you can find all the advice to help keep you safe.

But again, the onion principle applies, this time however it starts from the outside. For example, to keep your home safe, start on your boundary. Look at your home as a criminal would. Does it look safe? Is there an alarm? Is the gate open, can a criminal be seen from the road? Then consider your external security. Do you have good locks? Is the window frame rotten? Are any warning signs/ alarms present? Then consider the inside. Are your car keys left out? Are

expensive items on display, such as iPads left on the coffee table?

The same applies to your online security. Layering your security such as securing your router and firewall builds your perimeter. Good anti-virus software on all devices is the next layer and good passwords are the next. Building the layers of your online 'onion'.

All these layers build your security to reduce your risk, most of which are low cost or even free to implement. To support this work Packington is joining our Supported Parish Scheme. This scheme funded by North west Leicestershire Council will train up a Crime Prevention Champion for the village and supply a security item box to help victims of crime and the vulnerable members of the community improve their personal security.

The Crime Prevention Champion will store the security item box and distribute the contents to people in the community. Training will be provided by North West Leicestershire District Council.



What's your connection to Packington? I have lived in the village since I was 4 years old, went to Packington Primary School and have lived here ever since.

Tell me about your homelife?

I live with my parents on Nethercroft Drive, have no siblings and have always been a keen cricketer. Then around 8 years ago, I got into golfing and kept building up my expertise and started working part-time at Willesley Park Golf Club.
