parish council

This will be my final report for the Packington Post, after which a new Parish Council will be formed following the May 2nd District and Parish elections.

It has been a busy month once again, overseeing the work on the Recreation Ground, two general meetings and preparations for replacing our Clerk, Karen Edwards.

Karen has been a hard working and dedicated clerk to Packington, one who has often gone that extra mile to get the job done. She will be greatly missed, as her experience in the field as a Parish clerk is excellent. She is leaving to continue her role, with increased hours, as deputy clerk for Ashby Town Council. We wish her well.

As I write this report, we have shortlisted five candidates from a field of seventeen applicants and will be interviewing on the 12th March.

The Parish Council held their statutory Parish Meeting at the start of the March General Meeting. I, as chairman, gave an overview report of the last twelve months and the Clerk gave a summary of the financial status of the Council. Both these reports will be found on the Parish council Website.

At the March meeting a Police report mentioned a situation which occurred on the Recreation Ground. A disturbed female teenager was threatening users on the play area and women walking their dogs. She was brandishing a knife and she had obviously self-harmed. A digger driver who was working on site was notified of the situation and phoned for the police. The ladies were told to run away and the family using the play area were contained in the JCB. The situation was concluded when the police arrived, with paramedics who took this disturbed young lady to a safe and secure place. It seems that these days everyone must be on their guard and needless to say, I thanked the digger driver for his efforts in containing the incident.

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There was a disappointing response to our call for prospective Parish Councillors to attend a drop-in session at the start of our February meeting. Can I say that I urge anyone who wants to play a part in the well-being of Packington to make a stand and apply to become a Councillor. I would welcome a democratic outcome as to who becomes a Parish councillor and for that to happen we need at least seven nominations. A Nomination Pack can be obtained from the North West Leicestershire Council Offices.

She's off again...! The continuing story......

In the last edition of Packington Post, I talked about the challenges that I have set myself for this year: 4 marathons and a double marathon, starting in April with the first marathon in Vienna. Then it's on to London in May for the Moonwalk overnight, then the double 'Over the Moon – 52.4 miles overnight in Edinburgh in June. Then a couple of months off (ha, ha!!!!) until the Shine Marathon for Cancer Research in London in September, and finally the York Marathon in October. I am not a Mo Farah or Paula Radcliffe but in my mid-fifties and certainly no serious athlete, but I wanted to do this to raise money for cancer research and challenge my own fitness and see what I can do. Training is relentless – an average of 47 powerwalking miles per week, plus strength training in the gym. But the most important thing is raising support for the cause. Rather than ask for sponsorship, there are a couple of ideas that I have come up with.



The first might appeal to all you runners and cyclists out there: recycling your trainers as bird houses! I am building frames for nesting/shelter boxes that you simply hook your old trainers into,

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providing a cosy nesting nook particularly for robins, wrens, wagtails and flycatchers. It's a win-win – a nesting home plus an eco-friendly use for old trainers. Cost is $\pounds 15$ per bird house (and they come in almost any colour that you would like) with all proceeds going to breast cancer causes and research.



Then, as an amateur blacksmith, with an interest in restoration of heritage metal, I have undertaken a couple of projects to restore front door furniture to its former glory, bringing up old tarnished brass to a lovely glowing shine! Your front entrance is one of your most important assets, so if you feel that your Knockers and Knobs are in need of a good shine to bring them back to their former glory, then please get in touch! Postman Gaz

A familiar and reassuring sight in Packington is Gaz with his red Royal Mail van. Gaz hails from Ashby and has been a postman for thirty years, firstly in Ashby and, for the last twelve years, in our village.



Family life for him is wife Lisa, daughter Nicole and Labrador, George. Gaz loves delivering the post here because the villagers are so friendly and laid back, just like him.

Gaz likes to relax in the evenings by watching sport or a film, or listening to music and, as if he doesn't get enough exercise on his daily rounds, George gets long walks too. He finds time to play snooker in both the Leicester and Burton on Trent leagues and is an avid supporter of Leeds United. You might have seen him off duty at the village fete a few years ago or at a social occasion in the village hall.

Even with the advent of instant communication via the internet, his job is busier than ever, and he is thankful that he is made to feel a part of our local community. Although he has seen changes over the years, he has never had a cross word with anyone, thinks we are a great bunch and deems it a pleasure to deliver our post.

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Eric Carter, the oldest person in Packington, has died, aged 98.



Eric was a journalist all his working life. Born in December 1920, he started as a reporter on his home town paper, the *Bideford Gazette*, before being called up during the Second World War, serving in India and Burma.

Upon demobilisation, he picked up his journalistic career working for local weekly and daily papers in Kent and Devon before heading to Fleet Street. In London, he worked on various national papers including the Daily Express, Daily Sketch and Sunday Pictorial, as well as for a number of magazines such as London Life and the Telegraph Magazine. He was assistant editor of TV Times when he decided to return to Devon and run his own newspaper.

He bought the *Dawlish Gazette* in 1972 and he and wife Betty – with reporting help from son Nick – ran the paper for ten years before selling up and moving to Tunbridge Wells in Kent. Here, both worked on the *Kent and Sussex Courier*, the paper where they met in 1946 before marrying in 1948: the couple celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary last July.

Upon retirement Betty and Eric moved to Packington to be near Nick and his family.

The revamp of Holy Rood Church.

Work is actually starting – the builders come on site on Monday 1st April, so the back of church will be disrupted while work is going on. We are not sure in what order the builder will be working, but as it involves taking out the present WC to replace with the disabled one, the revamp of the vestry and the removal of 2 back pews, it is likely that we will not be able to leave the church open for the duration.

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However we will be holding services as normal (though the organ may be out of action as it needs to be covered for protection) and we will still be available for funerals, as the builder will work round such occasions.

Some meetings which normally happen in church in the week will move venue – see diary for changes.

The work is expected to take about 3 months so we will try to keep you updated on what is going on.

We are delighted to have been awarded grants by both Leicester Historic Churches Trust, and the Solar Farm Community Grant scheme. We are very grateful to the trustees of these two trusts for their support.

trees & birds

The redevelopment of the "Hall Farm" site moves on at a pace. Living in a property adjacent to the site, I have witnessed huge changes in the year since work began in earnest. Last February most of the mature trees at the bottom of the site were felled. This resulted in greatly increased hours of sunlight falling on my greenhouse, and back garden, which was a very positive result for my plants.



For every positive there is usually a negative. This winter the variety of wild birds visiting my garden has fallen dramatically. No woodpeckers, nuthatches, coal tits or blackcaps have yet been spotted. It made me realise how dependent wild birds are on mature trees, in close proximity, to give them cover.

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One of the features of Packington is the number of trees it contains and yet every year the sound of chain saws, felling more of our village trees, appears to increase - trees which may have taken over 100 years to reach their full height. They don't all appear to be being replaced. Perhaps if the Parish Council decided to plant one tree, somewhere in the village, for every two new houses granted planning permission, the current numerical decline could be arrested.



Does anyone else agree more action is needed to preserve our small village paradise? If so, speak to one of our prospective Parish Councillors when they canvass your vote at the forthcoming election.

HS2 update



The team would like to thank all those villagers who attended the Residents HS2 open morning in the Village Hall in early December and submitted a response to HS2 Ltd. to the Working Draft Environmental and Equality Statements, which were out for consultation.

We understand HS2 Ltd. received over 40,000 responses both from individuals and organisations across the route, and are currently reviewing these.

We will meet with HS2 Ltd. in May to keep the issues that directly impact Packington on the Agenda. One of the issues is the noise impact. Some of you may have read in the media that there are concerns that the train could exceed the European and World Health Organisation noise limits. If this is the case, then HS2 could be forced to reduce its speed and or mitigate noise impacts along the route. We have put a number of practical proposals to HS2 Ltd. that would reduce the noise and visual impact on our village and will continue to raise these with them.

Some of you may have also seen in the media recently that a number of MPs are now questioning the spiralling cost of HS2, calling for it to be scrapped. This may all sound optimistic, but we must not get complacent. There will be many MPs within parliament who will support HS2. Therefore, we must assume that HS2 will proceed.

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Local Pensioner gets his first play published

When pensioner Terry Hammond from Mill Street, Packington, retired, he felt he needed to have a hobby. So he decided to have a bash at writing a play. Terry told the Packington Post that he got the idea from a friend who told him a funny story about how a new allotment holder had upset the old timers on his allotment. He thought this had the making of a comedy so he started to work on a plot.

Terry, who was then living in Hampshire, worked on the play for a couple of years and when he finally finished it and showed it to his wife and friends, he was encouraged when they said he should try and get it published. A neighbour had contact with a local publisher. They asked for a script and he was amazed when they rang back within days to say they really liked it and would publish it.

The play "Ten Rods" was premiered at a local amateur dramatic society in Hampshire and received glowing reviews. When Terry moved to Packington three years ago he submitted Ten Rods to Ashby Dramatic Society, who run the Venture Theatre, in Ashby. They were very quick to see its potential and agreed to put on the play.
