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## duck race

Well! I'm really lost for words, as I think I said it all last year! What another Great evening!!! The Annual Duck Race on August Bank Holiday was again a fantastic, successful event. The weather was hot, hot, hot, all day and only slightly cooler during the races. Perfect!

The spectators and pundits arrived as if by magic at 5.30pm and tickets were being snapped up. Despite few ticket sales prior to the event, all ducks were sold in time for their race, a fantastic effort by those selling and recording entrants.

The customised duck race was even more popular this year, with a record entry of 66 paddlers. Official Duck "Nudger", David Dring, started the first race at just gone 6.00pm and, with him having a lesson in persuading the lazy ducks to keep going, was teenager Henry Miller. Henry then donned the official Duck "Nudger" hat to take control of the rest of the evening's races. Well done Henry nice to see the younger age group taking responsibility!



Despite the lack of rainwater in August the Gilawiskaw flowed at a reasonable speed and races took on average about 10 to 12mins to complete. For the second year running, Zac Holden aged 12, proved very adept at catching the ducks after each race and assisted the Duck Race Steward in confirming the first three winning ducks, especially when many of the races were decided by a photo finish. During the evening, the Bar-B-Q was doing a brisk trade and in fact sold out of burgers and hot dogs after only the second race! The Memorial Hall Committee, who organised the event, would like to thank all the volunteers who make this event run smoothly..

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The final race was the hotly contested **Customised Race**. This, the highlight of the racing calendar, saw a World Record entry of 66 customised ducks. After a photo shoot of all entrants and owners, an enthusiastic dash to the start by contestants ranging in age from babes in arms to 70 plus took place.



Chief Duck Steward Chris Miles briefed participants at the start of the race. On the word Go!! ducks of all descriptions were hurled into the water. Children and bigger 'children' dashed to the other side of Hall bridge to see if their duck emerged in first place.. After a highly contested race, with the lead duck changing constantly, one duck emerged triumphant. 'Multi Coloured Flower Duck belonging to duck race fanatic Joy Gravestock took the coveted yellow jersey. Joy came second last year and so it looks as though persistence pays off. Well done Joy and to all of you who played the game. Fantastic! Oh! By the way did you see Big Feathery Black Duck with a duckling riding on its back. What a great sight and it won the prize for the best decorated duck. What a work of art! Over 500 people visited the 30<sup>th</sup> Packington Open Gardens on August Bank Holiday Monday. The 13 gardens ranged from a few square metres to several acres and included a Zen inspired Japanese garden, a working farm and mature tree garden, as well as more traditional layouts.



Visitors enjoyed a range of refreshments and cream teas, with the glorious weather leading to record sales of ice cream.

Other items of interest included a display featuring village history by the Packington Village History Group, musical entertainment by the Goldfinch Quartet, a display of paintings by local artists and a bee keeping stand complete with live bees.



In all, the event raised a total of £3,800 towards the maintenance of the grade II\* listed local village church building and in particular the provision of a disabled access toilet and servery.

## parish council

The Parish Council and parishioners have been concerned with speeding motorists on our village streets for years. The Council set up a Speed Watch fortnight and we want to thank publicly those volunteers who made this happen. The separate article will show that it is a problem and even more so when volunteers in high viz jackets, pointing a speed gun, are not present anymore. The Council has asked for a 20mph restriction on High St. but this has been turned down. All of the other speed controls we have asked for on other roads have also been turned down by LCC Highways. As a small council it would be impossible to go it alone financially on any proposed calming scheme. The costs would involve design, surveys, materials, labour, maintenance and liability. Even a small scheme would be in the hundreds of thousand pounds. Crime in the village over the past two months has been low. August saw no reported crime and in July suspicious vehicles were reported but no action taken. The Council is looking at restoring the village pump on Measham Road. Whilst drinking the water is not recommended, it is a village asset which may come into its own with increasing climate change. We have also undertaken a visual survey on the Round House and are in the process of obtaining the services of the County Buildings Preservation Officer to give us guidance on possible repairs. Council was pleased to hear of the review and 5 year delay on the HS2 project. We can only hope that this is the "beginning of the end" for this ill thought out scheme. In this regard the Council is writing to our MP, Andrew Bridgen, to congratulate him on his

opposition to HS2 and to ask him to question vigorously the reasoning behind having an Ex HS2 Chairman leading an impartial review.

Mill St. has had a makeover. At least the nettles and undergrowth have been strimmed and you can actually see the Gilwiskaw which has shown signs of fish and aquatic life. A kingfisher has also been seen. The Council hope to maintain the

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current visual aspect of this delightful part of Packington.

#### Speedwatch

For a 2 week period from 6th July, residents from Packington and the surrounding area volunteered on 'Speedwatch'! After training they took to the streets armed with a speed gun, high-viz jackets and a clip board, to record the speeds of motorists through our village at four locations. On Monday 8th and from then on, each team saw a succession of speeding motorists – on one particular session the team recorded 30 motorists in just 90 Each person recorded as having minutes! exceeded the required speed limit will receive a letter from Leicestershire Police – letting them know that they were recorded as speeding – but be warned, it's 3 strikes and you're out....or at least you'd wish you were, as anyone caught speeding 3 times or more over the space of the 2 weeks can look forward to visit from their local constabulary.

However, at the outset, the team was keen to see this activity turn into something more productive/practical than a warning letter and, having seen the data, they are more certain than ever that action now needs to be taken.

## 57% 36 - 39 mph 41% 40 and 49 mph 1% 50 and 59mph 1% over 60mph

Having recorded 144 speeding vehicles in total, some exceeding 50 and even <u>60 mph</u> through our village, the team is now crying out for traffic calming measures and is seeking the support of the village residents and Parish Council to help us achieve this! We know that the Parish Council has thrown its support behind the initiative, so we are sure that it will continue to push for the right outcome for the village.

As a final reminder we would ask that everyone remembers that the speed limit through this village, and most others, is 30mph, stick to this as a maximum and set a good example.

## letters

As a volunteer with the Community Speed Watch team I was interested to read Adrian Mongredien's timely article about road safety in the village. He rightly says that speeding through the village is not a new problem. The Illuminated signs and mock gates at the village entrances have limited effect on the behaviour of drivers, and significant numbers of motorists were recorded well above the speed limit during the two-week campaign.

However, since the Community Speed Watch Zone signs have been displayed, I have observed some motorists slowing down to or below the 30 limit on approaching the signs. All the volunteers have noticed the impact that a hivis jacket has, with driving speeds reducing appreciably if we have been spotted in the distance. The third factor in reducing speed has been randomly parked cars and vans, either at the roadside or partly on the pavement, causing a bottle neck effect.

I agree with Adrian's conclusion that only physical impediments in the roadway will achieve

long-term reductions in speed within the village. Most of the neighbouring villages have some form of physical barriers to speed, be it humps or narrowed sections of road with one direction having priority over the other. We need this in Packington!

I do feel strongly that our elected

representatives should take this issue seriously. They need to eliminate spending on more frivolous items and prioritise resources, be it the Parish precept or the Solar Panel Fund, towards addressing the traffic problem. They should also strongly lobby the County Council for additional financial support.

All of the volunteers that I have spoken to joined the scheme in order to hasten changes that would effectively reduce speed through Packington. Should HS2 be built in the future the village roads will become an even more popular rat run. Let's do something now before we are faced with a tragic accident.

Having been a Packington resident for more than 30 years, I would like to respond to recent suggestions for traffic calming. Speeding traffic, particularly large HGV's are certainly a problem in Packington and I fear for my grandchildren, who also live in the village, but I agree with said Parish Counsellor that speed bumps create other problems, i.e., they must have a detrimental effect on sufferers with back problems. I recently had a major operation and

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found travelling over speed bumps excruciating. Noise levels increase when a large empty trailer travels over the bump. A colleague living in Ravenstone insisted a speed bump be moved from outside her home because of the noise. Not to mention damage to vehicles constantly driving over bumps. As a regular driver, I find villages with the Chicane method of traffic calming effective, but maybe the council will argue that this method is too expensive. The solar panels which give drivers actual speeds they are travelling and saying 'thank you' when they are driving within the limit, are more helpful, although I have not seen these in Leicestershire.

Whatever method, something must be done about Packington being used as a rat run, before someone is seriously hurt or worse. Janet Dixon

After reading the Packington Email would it be better to maybe have a speed camera? The fines would benefit the Local Authority and would deter speeders. Speed bumps whilst effective, do not lessen speed of vans and lorries, who can drive over them with ease. Just a thought. Michelle Rock

Although traffic speed is an issue in Packington, as it is on many roads, I would question speed bumps or physical barriers to create a narrowing of roads.

Anyone travelling into Coalville will see the unsightly impact the road narrowing/ barrier design has. It also creates 'road rage' situations when those who should give way at the narrowest sections fail to do so. This method of slowing traffic also significantly increases air pollution for those living nearby.

As drivers approach Packington along Measham Road there is 50 mile sign a couple of meters from the 30 mile sign. This suggests drivers are fine to approach right to the edge of the village at 50 miles & are expected to immediately slow to 30. If the signage could be altered to take the speed to 40 as it approaches the village this provides drivers with an advance warning to start slowing down. This has been effectively introduced on the approach roads to villages such as Donisthorp and Moira.

I completely support a move to slow traffic down through the village but hope we can find solutions that aren't at the detriment of the appearance of the village or result increased traffic pollution for residents. Sharon Bond

### hs2

Residents will have seen the Government announcement in August that Boris Johnson has requested a Review of HS2 to be submitted by the Autumn. Although the reporting of this in the press has tended to take the view this could result in HS2 being scrapped, the construction press has taken the opposite view. With the appointment of Doug Oakervee to chair the Review, a former Chairman of HS2 who is also an 'old pal' of Boris Johnson who goes way back working with him including when Boris was mayor of London and instrumental in keeping the Crossrail project alive. The view from inside the industry is that HS2 will go ahead. In addition to the Government review above, HS2 Ltd has also been carrying out its own review. The summary findings of which are; the project will take longer to deliver & cost more than they originally led Parliament to believe or, to be more precise, 5 years longer to deliver and £30b more, at the last count, further increasing the burden on the taxpayer and the timescale of uncertainty with construction delays for those living close to the route. Residents who wish again to voice their concern about HS2, and question the independence of the review chaired by Doug Oakervee, may want to email our MP, Andrew.bridgen.mp@parliament.uk

The Review provides an opportunity for MP's to call for HS2 to be scrapped.

The Residents Team continues while the outcome of the Review isn't certain. Natural England has agreed to a meeting with the Team in Packington, to discuss the impact on the local landscape, particularly the issue of the viaduct, as set out in last month's update. We see their agreement to come to the village, and see the landscape and impact on the village for themselves, as positive.

We have responded to the latest HS2 consultation on 6<sup>th</sup> September. We set out again in the response our proposals to minimise the visual and noise disruption on residents and the local landscape. 
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#### Thanks Daybreak

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#### Parish Councillor Writes a £23K 'Mont Blanc' Cheque for Children in Need

In September Clare Beynon and 4 of her colleagues from Enterprise Rent A Car, Nottingham have raised over £23,000 for Children in Need by completing a 55km trek around Mont Blanc through France, Switzerland and Italy.



The challenge forms part of the company's bid to raise at least £250K for Children in Need in 2019 as part of the company's 25<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration in UK.

The trail, known as the Tour du Mont Blanc, is one of the most popular long-distance hiking trails in Europe. Including difficult terrain and several tricky ascents and descents, the trail is designed only for experienced walkers able to adapt to highly variable weather conditions. Clare has been training for the trek over the summer and was happy to complete it in 3 days, covering 55km and 89,000 steps

"The trek was definitely a challenge. The terrain and elevation changes meant it was three days of hard and careful hiking. We are absolutely delighted to have completed the challenge given how little trekking experience we have, and of course to have raised such a great amount of money for an amazing charity. ## Please help to look after our hedgehogs!!!!



This lovely mammal is in serious decline, partly due to loss of habitat but also roads, new buildings that carve up routes, fences that block their normal feeding routes and of course, cars. During my morning training runs I was really disturbed to see 3 dead hedgehogs within the last month on the roads in and close to Packington. I know they are not exactly street wise, but perhaps this is even more reason to ask people to consider the speed limits in the village. If you see what looks like a spiky tennis ball in the road then please slow down.... Now we have another danger: bonfire night. The British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) is urging people to build bonfires on the day that they are to be lit to save hedgehogs and other wildlife from appalling suffering. If a bonfire needs to be built in advance, the BHPS has some guidelines on how to make bonfires as 'hedgehog friendly' as possible. Hedgehogs are a gardeners friend - they munch no end of slugs and snails (YESSSSS!) but appreciate a bit of tinned dog food, hedgehog nibbles but never bread and milk! ## aircraft noise

## Should we really be concerned about the noise of aircraft?

Being partially deaf in one ear and brought up in the noisy streets of South London, I never really thought too much about the aircraft noise emanating from East Midlands Airport (EMA), until my Grandson asked me over breakfast one morning, "**Grandad why do airplanes keep waking me up at night**". It was then that I began to reflect that perhaps, this is an issue. So, armed with the internet and free from jobs for the afternoon, I decided to trawl the internet; what I found was a real eye-opener.

In an article in the British Medical Journey in 2018, entitled: '**The harm to health caused by aviation noise requires urgent action'** it highlighted the very serious impact aircraft noise is having on children, especially their ability to learn and on their overall long-term mental health. The World Health Organisation also confirmed that noise above 40 decibels at night and 45 decibels during the day can be harmful to health, (a Packington resident has recorded aircraft creating over 80 decibels - twice the recommended levels).

I also discovered, 'Sleep Deprivation' caused by night flights, is a major issue which can lead to cognitive defects with children and adults and can also trigger mental illness. Many experts from around the globe are calling for governments to take urgent action to reduce aircraft noise.

It took me just a couple of hours surfing the net to realise that noise from EMA is an issue we can't afford to ignore, particularly with the huge industrial expansion taking place around EMA -Amazon, DHL and UPS to name a few.

Communities around the globe and up and down the country are beginning to challenge airports and Governments. A small community action group in the US managed to stop a major airport expansion, in the UK, challenges have been made to airport expansions in Bristol, Stansted, Southend and many others.



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So, the answer is yes, we can, and I would argue, must do something to reduce the noise from EMA for the sake of every ones health.

But what can we do? The Packington Aircraft Noise Action Group (PANAG), which I have now joined, has linked up with Ashby and Melbourne to explore ways of working with EMA to reduce aircraft noise. This includes ensuring EMA flight paths avoid built up areas such as Ashby and Packington - something EMA have a duty to do under the Civil Aviation Authority rules and something they appear not to be complying with. Stop allowing aircraft operators using noisy old aircraft, and campaign to stop the expansion of night flights, which EMA are intending to do, especially as the planning authority have allowed EMA a virtual free hand!
