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Congratulations and very many thanks go to all those who have contributed in any way to ensure that our village magazine has reached every household in the village 100 times. The number (and names) of those who have given help over the years, by writing, editing, financing, advertising, collating, printing, packing and distributing is legion, for they are many, certainly too many to publish a full list here. And then of course there are our readers, the essential factor in the success of any publication, whose feedback, and contributions, have been, and always will be, welcome.

How did it all begin? When did it all start? Lifelong residents of Packington may know the answers to these questions, but, it is a fact, that almost 70% of the current inhabitants of our village will have arrived since the first edition of the Packington Post was published. These "newcomers" (hopefully all regular readers!) may be wondering when, and how, it all started? So.... "Let's start at the very beginning, a very good place to start" as Julie Andrews once sang....

On 3<sup>rd</sup> May 2000, to be precise, the ball started rolling! The Parish Council called a public meeting at the old Memorial Hall on High Street to consult villagers on future village plans. The consensus view at that meeting was "that residents of Packington should be canvassed on a wide range of local issues which would help local councillors plan how to maintain and improve village life." A committee, called The Appraisal Steering Group, was set up. This wasn't one of those committees we've all come across, defined by an American comedian as: "a group of people who individually can do nothing but as a group decide that nothing can be done". This was an all action group!

A questionnaire was sent to all 312 households in the village (there are nearly 390 now and we should reach 400 by next year). An 80% response rate was achieved

after volunteers personally collected the completed forms from each household. Nearly 150,000 items of information were collated by the 12 strong Steering Group set up to produce a report, which was published in 2002. Section 3, Part 3 on "information and communication" revealed a large majority (273 in favour, 117 against) wanting an independently produced village newsletter. 88% of these wanted it produced "quarterly or more often".

The report recommended that a working party be set up, including representatives of the "Parish News", to consult with the Parish Council on the way forward, but, even before the Village Appraisal was published, the Parish Council had agreed in principle, to give the go ahead to a new village magazine. The Council also agreed to fund the whole bill for the first 8 issues of the new magazine and edition 1 of the Packington Post duly arrived in every Packington letter box in the summer of 2003.

Since then the village Post Office has gone the Memorial Hall has been extended and completely refurbished, the Methodist Chapel has gone, the village pillar box disappeared, but later returned on the other side of the road, an old stone bridge over the Gilwiskaw Brook was dismantled to be replaced by a new single span wooden bridge, the Recreation Ground has been transformed, the future of the Bull and Lion has hung in the balance several times and Hall Farm will soon be "legally" occupied again. The rest is history. The future will be reported to you in upcoming editions of your Packington Post!

Two questions for all our readers twenty years on.

- 1. Do we need another Village Appraisal?
- 2. Would the item causing most concern in Packington still be "traffic speeding through our village"? ...... as it was in the first Village Appraisal all those years ago!

## nature and wildlife in packington

The state of wildlife in our gardens is a great indicator of the health of local wildlife. There certainly are indications that wildlife is thriving locally (I regularly see Yellow Hammers and Goldfinches on the run towards Springs past Babelake Street), but it would be interesting to delve a little deeper (and have some fun with all the family) and start by looking at what bird life there is in and around Packington. Do we have kingfishers on the Gilwiskaw? How many Fieldfares have you seen this year? Spotted Lapwings in the fields? Well, here's a start: the RSPB (Royal Society for the Protection of Birds) Big Garden Birdwatch 2020. Birdwatch is the largest wildlife survey and one of the greatest pieces of citizen science that's been done. It's simple:

#### Watch birds for one hour

Choose an hour between 25 and 27 January to watch birds in your garden, the local wood, by the brook...you choose!

Count the most birds that land at once only count those landing, not flying over.

Offering food helps...!

#### Report what you see

Every count is important – so submit your results to rspb.org.uk/birdwatch from 25 January until 16 February.

Why is this important? For over 40 years, the RSPB have asked people to help count birds in the garden. It is an indicator of bird numbers across the UK and a general indicator of environmental and wildlife health. For four decades, the Big Garden Birdwatch has highlighted the winners and losers in the garden bird world and it was one of the first surveys to alert the RSPB to the decline in the number of song thrushes in gardens. With the increasing concern about the state of the environment and for wildlife in general this sort of research is desperately needed. Plus, it gives you a chance to spend an hour outside, with a cuppa (and a biscuit!), or inside, watching

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your birdfeeder and enjoying the beauty of our village and its gardens. So, when you see an odd person in wellies sitting half in the brook on 25 January – that's me hoping to catch sight of a kingfisher.

#### **The Packington Corner**

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#### **Doug Pratt - Remembering Packington**

Doug and Nora moved to Packington with his father and family from London in 1956. He was a member of the Leicestershire Special Constabulary for 32 years, and during his time, 16 village residents also became member of the Special Constabulary, looking after the Packington Community. Doug has seen many, many changes since he first came to the village - many of Doug's family have been, or still are, in the police force, so the calling runs in the blood!

One of Doug's early experiences was of being on duty for events at the village hall. The hall was opened in 1958, funded by contributions and support from the village. In addition to funds people from the village contributed items including chairs and other furniture. The venue was a huge success from early on, becoming a focal point for people, including from outside Packington, for dances and social evenings especially on Friday and Saturday nights.

As a Special Constable, Doug was often on duty looking making sure that things stayed in control. As he says, 'things could get a little lively once people had a bit of jungle juice inside of them, but a few words more often than not calmed things down. People had a different level of respect for authority and the constabulary back then'.

The difference between crime now and then is whilst the odd punch might have been thrown, there was nothing like the sort of violent crime, particularly today's rise in knife crime. 'Yes, of course there were still burglaries, but it was nothing like the level that we see now.



"But', says Doug, "the village of Packington is still great and the community spirit is wonderful". One of his funniest memories is walking around the Church and into Mill Street on patrol when he thought he felt a hairy hand land on his shoulder.... It turned out to be a kitten that had jumped off a wall on to him, but it gave him a bit of a shock and made him jump nonetheless! The experience was not helped by the fact that Mill Street is said to be haunted....

Doug is still very active, walking regularly and tending the garden, he was a member of the Packington History Group but his hidden talent is painting and the walls of his and his wife Nora's home are adorned with many lovely pictures of the village and surrounding landscapes.

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Crime in the village over the past two months has been relatively low although burglaries were reported at several locations. Parked vans were also targeted, and tools were stolen. The Parish Council urge all residents to be on their guard and report any suspicious activity to the police.

The Council discussed the recent flooding in a number of places and as County Councillor Nick Rushton was at the meeting, he was able to give us an up to date response of the County Councils involvement. He said that the lead authority for flooding issues were the County Council, but it was the riparian owner of the land who was responsible for smaller watercourses including ditches. In regard to Babelake St, which was difficult to drive through for over four weeks, the County Council had performed a one-off culvert clean and that the land owner had now been traced. With regard to the road water at Normandy Wood, which has only just cleared naturally after approximately six weeks, and will be back as soon as heavy rain appears again, the County are aware of the situation and hope to resolve the issue soon. How soon Councillor Rushton couldn't say.

Following the Flood on Mill St, the worst in over fifty years, the Packington action Group FLOAT has had several meetings to date. They have convened a meeting with all authorities connected to water issues including the Environment Agency, Severn Trent, LCC, Nwldc, Highways England (A 42) and other agencies, to try to find improvements/mitigation to the flooding issues in Packington.

The Parish Council are looking into possibly celebrating the anniversary of VE Day. The Chairman has mentioned this to a number of groups and contacts who all think it a good idea. To this end a meeting has been arranged on January 27<sup>th</sup> at 7-15pm in the meeting room at the Memorial Hall. If you can't make that evening and would

The Packington CCTV scheme is now running into it's final year of free funding and Councillors were informed that Wes Ewing, (Chair of Packington Neighbourhood Watch) was working on the running/future costs. Further work is necessary on this aspect and decisions will have to be made later in the year.

Council approved the budget for the coming year and as a result there will be no increase in Household precept for the next financial year. However, we were informed that a 2.95% increase will be levied by LCC. The Council has been informed of the County Council's wish to join all Local Authorities into one Authority. (Unitary Authority) The Parish Council has discussed these proposals and finds them unacceptable. Big is not always beautiful and the feeling was that the smaller settlements like Packington would not be heard and access to services and assistance would be difficult. If you have a view on this subject, then find the necessary information on LCC website and let the County Councillors know what you think. As far as we know consultation on Unitary Authority has not gone to every household or whether LCC intend to do so. We do know that nearly all Local Authorities and Parish Councils appose, the scheme. Finally, the issue of planning permission for five houses to be built off the Drum and Monkey Lane, which is a footpath, was discussed. The Council has objected on the grounds of ecology deprivation, surface and foul water issues, over intensification of the site, highways and safety concerns and more.

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#### Speeding in the Village

The main thrust of this report concerns speeding traffic in Packington. In recent editions of the Post there have been a number of conversations on this topic, some of which implied criticism of the Parish Council. Others urged the Council to do more. I am, therefore, answering those points on behalf of the Parish Council.

Firstly, speeding traffic is the domain of the police, whilst traffic calming measures are under the control of the County Council. The Parish Council has always regarded highway issues as a priority and in the past spent nearly £30,000 in a joint scheme with the County, providing gateways road markings and VAS (Vehicle Activated Signs). At that time, about ten years ago, this was all we were allowed to do. As these measures did not solve the problem of speeding motorists, this topic has been high on the agenda of the Parish Meetings nearly every month. We have pursued local District and County Councillors. We have had conversations with the County Council Highways and quizzed the police when they attend regularly at our Parish Council meetings. What has been the outcome? Firstly, I remember the Chairman of Leicestershire County Council, at an open forum at County Hall, replying to my question of "why can't the village of Packington have traffic calming measures.?" saying. "Have you had any deaths on the roads in your village?!"

Secondly, the Parish Council has organised two Volunteer Speed-watch Surveys in the last six years, the second took place in the summer of this year. This as you may know is an educating exercise and no penalties can be given to speeding motorists but they do receive an official warning letter.

Thirdly we have asked the Leicestershire Highways Dept if we can put up our own speed cameras. We did get a comprehensive reply which you can read in full on the Parish Council's Web site. In it, it gave details of the covert speed-watch programme that they undertook recently.

(Remember the double black rubber tubing across the roads?) These gave readings which said the worst entrance or exit to the village had a mean speed of just 34mph. The other seven entrances and exits were all lower mean speeds! This communique also stated that Packington had had only one reported personal injury in a traffic accident in the last five years and this was not speed related. These findings mean that we do not meet the criteria for any further calming measures and safety cameras are "only located where there is a recent history of reported injury accidents."

Whilst the Parish Council will always be vigilant on this matter and ask the police to spend more time with cameras and showing more presence on speed enforcement, there is very little more that we can do. We do however urge residents to take note of speeding motorist number plates and report the time and location of these incidents directly to the police.

Whilst we are not recommending the following, the Council has observed that traffic has slowed at the following locations:-parked cars on the highway which act as a chicane and which is working well on Ashby road during the day, and sometimes on Normanton Rd.

## Message of Thanks from Peter at Daybreak Services


