Trees- our underappreciated saviours

Now I know I'm no Greta Thunberg, but I do know of the current, spiralling climate crisis and I'm sure you do too. Whether you accept it or not, we are slowly descending into a state from which we won't be able to return and the future, for my generation and others to come, isn't a bright one. Rather than looking for someone or something to point the finger at and blame, it's about time we started looking for ways in which we can help.

Whether you want to contribute in a way that will help on a smaller scale or a larger one, planting trees covers all areas of the spectrum. Not only are trees essential in allowing us to breathe (it's a given really), trees also create extensive wildlife habitats. They help respiratory health within communities and they ultimately hinder climate change through the sequestration of carbon, reducing the overall amount of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere. Their benefits are not entirely environmental however, as trees equally aid the aesthetics of an area; greenery is associated with peace and tranquillity.



With the cost remaining relatively low, it appears the pros outweigh the cons, and Packington would benefit greatly with a little more greenery around. Who'd turn down cleaner air, extended wildlife diversity and, of course, the final chance at saving the planet we have consciously exploited, before it inevitably falls into the pit of imminent *doom*?

Trees- what can we do?

The Packington Post has for some time been looking for contributions from local people born in the current century, and now we have a first, thought provoking article from Molly Brammall. How can we in Packington respond to the points Molly makes on the need to plant more trees if we are to help save our planet?

First and foremost, we could all plant at least one tree in our own garden. There are trees of all shapes and sizes so we don't need to plant an oak tree each, although that would make a long-term impact. This endeavour would result in an extra 400 trees in our village. Some of us may be too physically frail to plant a tree ourselves but I'm sure some young tree planting volunteers could be found who would be happy to help out. We, ourselves can only plant trees on our own land but what about other land in the village. A quick walk around the village indicates some areas where owners may be prepared to allow planting of varying sizes of tree.

There are gaps in the planting alongside the Gilwiskaw Brook which could be filled with small flowering trees. There may be spaces in the Churchyard where one or two trees could be added. The Recreation ground has a hedge but no trees on the boundary fronting the road. There is room for a row of trees which would not impinge on the access roadway but may, in time, reduce the crosswinds on the playing fields

The visual aspect of the site on the corner of Babelake Street next to the brook could be considerably enhanced with the addition of a few trees, as could the site of the "Bull and Lion" without blocking sight lines. There are other patches of land on the entrances to the village which would benefit visually from one or two specimen trees welcoming us back to "Packington in the heart of the National Forest".

The Woodland Trust is currently offering free native tree packs (from 15 to 420 trees) to Schools and "Community Groups". I'm sure the editor, and the Chairman of the Parish Council, would join me in ceremoniously planting the first tree, if only to confirm the old Greek Proverb: - "A society grows great when old men plant trees in whose shade they know they shall never sit".

Crime in the village over the past two months has been disappointingly high. A burglary on Measham Rd and a car theft from the Paddocks Estate have resulted in arrests being made. However, no charges have been made to date. The Parish Council urges all residents to be on their guard and report any suspicious activity as quickly as possible to the police. Emergency 999 or 112. Non-emergency 101.



Flooding again was a major issue when the recent February deluges resulted in the Gilawhiskaw brook overflowing to a new high for the last fifty plus years. There is still flooding on Babelake St and this Council has filed a recorded report to the Highways Authority saying that this issue, which has been present for over three months, needs to be resolved urgently. The Council is also in the process of sending a letter to Severn Trent Water Co. for an explanation as to why raw sewage and debris was released into the river, and why did heavy concrete inspection covers lift off, also depositing raw sewage and waste products all over private land.

The Council wishes to express its gratitude to FLOAT for organising a successful meeting at NWLDC involving agencies involved with Flooding and Flood Risk. Whilst there is no quick fix for the river overflowing, all agencies are aware that measures need to be taken to reduce the risk.

As you know from the last Council report, a Celebration of VE day was being planned. This is now a certainty and we would like you to sign up for this celebration and make it one to remember. Please see the special article and book your table. It might be a nice idea to have a table especially booked for your street so please e-mail or phone Chris. Details attached to the main poster/article.

The Parish Clerk and Chairman attended a fact-finding meeting at District Council Offices concerning Neighbourhood Plans. The topic will be discussed at the next Council meeting. The Village Pump on Measham Road has now been repaired and the Round House repairs put out to tender.

A match funded grant was awarded to Packington School from the Solar Community Fund for IT products.

Finally, the issue of planning permission for five houses to be built off the Drum and Monkey Lane, is still on going and officers from the District Council have yet to form a view on the application.

Fly Tipping

Residents of Packington who walk or drive the outlying areas of our village such as Redburrow Lane and Measham Road may have noted a spate of fly tipping recently. A large quantity of this consists mainly of garden rubbish, including bits of timber fencing or sheds and prunings of conifer or other hedging material, with the occasional bicycle tyre or child's scooter thrown in for good measure. It is a fairly simple act to reverse into a field gateway, open the back door and dispose quickly of rubbish whilst unobserved; even in broad daylight.

The Parish Council requests that villagers check, when choosing a garden contractor, their usual method of disposal of garden rubbish. The mere fact of asking the question about disposal of garden rubbish may deter the jobbing man and van, who might appear on the doorstep asking for work. Registered garden contractors will have a waste management policy, but as Spring approaches and garden preparation begins, the itinerant groundsperson will more than likely make an appearance in the village.

It is our village and the residents take a pride in keeping the village approaches clean and tidy. Please help to ensure that it is not your garden rubbish dumped in the lanes and causing an eyesore.



Alistair James

Secret craft talent in Packington –Upholstery

There are many skilled crafts that are highly underestimated – traditional upholstery is one of them. Alistair James says he stumbled into the profession at the age of 17, fell in love with the craft and never looked back. He started his business in Melbourne but moved to Packington when he met his lovely wife nearly 8 years ago and his business is now based in village.



As an art college student, Alistair began an apprenticeship with a furniture design company and worked for prestigious companies and clients including Viscount Linley, Harrods and Heals. The apprenticeship meant that he was earning whilst learning as well as enjoying the work. Alistair has also worked on the interior furnishings for many top restaurants and bars, including for Marco Pierre White amongst others.

Training for this profession takes time – three years just to feel comfortable, then, as Alistair said, ‘another couple of years to gain that extra degree of confidence to be able to go ahead on your own’. At times during the training, Alistair says, there are feelings of self-doubt, but then it just ‘clicks’.

But even now, after so many years there are always new learning experiences and each piece that Alistair works on is a different and offers a new challenge.

The most interesting and fulfilling piece that Alistair has worked on was a chair based on the shape of an Aston Martin, for Viscount Linley – this design is now selling (if you can find one!) for thousands of pounds. Some restoration pieces can prove challenging. Often materials used in original construction need to be replaced with fibres that meet current regulations, and shapes, for example from the 1960s, are more complex than many would imagine to reupholster.

Most people do appreciate that quality work and the many hours that go into it will cost money – but it is quality and craftsmanship that will last for many more years than mass produced products. 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Rural Crime Team Event

Saturday 28 March 13.00 to 16.30
Hill Farm, Packington

Rural Crime has a significant impact on our area and the police are aware that the rural and village communities feel very targeted. In response, NW Leicestershire Police have formed a Rural Crime Team. The team consists of PC 237 Emma Holmes and PCSO 6517 Tony Gallaher with line management from Lindsey Booth, PS 4300.



The aim for the team is to oversee all rural crime investigations, increase community confidence and develop intelligence working alongside neighbouring counties. The team will be taking more Victim Personal Statements concerning the huge impact some crimes are having on rural communities and particularly farmers. To date, the team has visited a number of farms within the area, to introduce themselves and offer crime prevention advice.

The team plans to expand on this and increase awareness to other staff members around animal and machinery handling with the assistance of the NFU within Leicestershire.

Meetings are scheduled with adjoining police forces to share ideas on tackling rural crime and organise joint operations to target areas where criminals are causing most harm. But tackling crime successfully requires feedback and involvement from the community. Without this information the police are not aware of what is going on and when. Providing information enables the police to target resources to those areas where criminals are causing most harm. Packington already has great initiatives in place to support the community in tackling crime, with the WhatsApp Group and Neighbourhood Watch, and the valuable information from these initiatives will help the police combat crime

All in Packington are invited to come along to the **Interactive Rural Event on Saturday 28th March from 13.00 – 16.30 at Hill Farm, Spring Lane, Packington organised by the North West Leicestershire Rural Crime Team**. This will give the opportunity to meet the rural team and network with a number of organisations of interest including NFU, the British Horse Society, Trading Standards, Land Rover Security, Selecta Marc, ATVTrac and others. This is your opportunity to meet the team and raise issues, concerns and ask questions about how the police work, what constraints they face and how they can help you and the wider community to stay safe.

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
Aircraft Noise

East Midlands Airport plans to increase night flights by 30%

A report from PANAG (The Packington Aircraft Noise Action Group)

If night flights don't bother you now, there is every chance that disturbed sleep could become an increasing problem for you and your family in the future if EMA go ahead with their planned 30% increase in flights.

The September edition of the Packington Post highlighted the serious impact sleep deprivation was having on people's health, especially children.



Some will say, "Well, what can you do, big business has got to make a living and besides they create lots of local jobs". That's true, but there has to come a point when you cannot allow big business to continue to steamroller over the environment and the health of local communities. PANAG has joined forces with a number of local communities and politicians to try and work with EMA to address this very serious issue.

Unless the airport can give assurances to local communities that children's mental health will not be affected by increased night flights then I believe they should not proceed with their plans. Incidentally, did you know that EMA is the only airport in the whole of the country which operates regular commercial night flights?

HS2

On the 11th February, following months of uncertainty, the Prime Minister announced the go-ahead for the total route of HS2, including section 2b – West Midlands to Leeds; which is the section affecting Packington and the surrounding area.

HS2 Ltd was originally due to deliver the whole project but there is now ambiguity as to whether HS2 will purely deliver phase 1 (London to Birmingham) with North of Birmingham being delivered under another operational structure or whether HS2 Ltd will deliver phase 1 & 2a (London to Crewe). What does appear is that our section, phase 2b Birmingham to Leeds, will be tied in with "Northern Power House Rail". Our phase of 'HS2' is due to be completed between 2035 to 2040, further putting back the already delayed 2033.

While the Review was underway, we were unable to meet with HS2. One of the challenges we now face is who will be making the decisions on 2b. There are many questions that now need answers.

Is the 2b section route design going back to consultation?

Will a different team be engaging with residents? Do we have to re-raise issues we have already covered with the HS2 engagement and design teams?

We will be talking to the District and Country Council to understand their approach, in the light of the announcement in February, to establish a way forward, to raise concerns and present our mitigation proposals.

The Residents' team met with Natural England in the Autumn to discuss the viaduct as it crosses the Gilwiskaw. Natural England's remit isn't focused on protecting the general landscape and views. They are specifically looking to protect the natural flow of the Giwiskaw and the species living in it. Which for Packington means they see the viaduct as a solution to protecting the Gilwiskaw. CCTV

As you will be aware we have a CCTV system operating in the village to help deter and reduce crime. Evidence from the cameras recently led to the arrest of a suspect after a break-in on Measham Road. Also previously helped with a conviction after a crime and on many occasions was able to supply images to the police after village incidents which can help with further arrests.



Camera data is only provided to the Police after an incident and while arrests/conviction are not always immediate the images provided to the Police do provide valuable information that can assist with identifying suspects. CCTV locations remain confidential, and we are continually looking at plans to upgrade. We thank Adam Berry and Initsys for their investment in our village CCTV and their continued ongoing support.

What to do in the event of a crime or suspicious behaviour

It remains important that all events are reported to the Police 101/999, your local street co-ordinator as well as Wes Ewing our village NHW coordinator.

We should not try to solve incidents by contacting those suspected of being connected as this can give offenders the chance to dispose of evidence and cover tracks. The police also advise against public commenting, discussing names and addresses and breaching confidentiality on social media and other communication methods.

We would like to thank Mark Arjoo, our local Police officer for his continuous support and especially for his professionalism in dealing with the last incident on Measham Road. He was extremely responsive, compassionate and helped with collecting all the information which led to the arrest. We look forward to his continued support for the village and to us supporting him. Our Packington Watch Whatsapp Group Golden Rules

1. Always keep to the purpose of our group and don't share irrelevant messages about other topics.
2. Post your message in one single chunk of text, don't post every word or sentence in a new message.
3. Do not have one-on-one conversations in the group. Switch to private messages.
4. Avoid posting in the Packington Watch group between 21:00 and 07:00 unless it is an emergency. By emergency, we mean the "ongoing crime, floods" type of emergency.
5. If someone asks a question and you don't know the answer don't respond with "I don't know". Just wait for someone who knows the answer to reply.
6. Again please don't send in a hundred "thank you" messages. If you feel gratitude towards someone – tell them in a private message.
7. If someone asks a question of a personal nature (like asking for advice) don't respond if someone else has already answered, or else respond to the person directly in a private message.
8. The group is not a political platform. No arguing, no heated opinions, no fear mongering, no hyped up drama, no fake news. Check your sources before you share.
9. Never EVER use the group to berate someone else or air grievances. If you have an issue address it one on one with the relevant person.
10. Don't ask for random people or those outside Packington and Normanton to be added to the group.
11. Don't send data-insensitive messages. No-one wants their last 3GB used up on uninvited memes.
12. Hit "Mute" on your Whatsapp group. This can be a sanity saver. You will still receive all the messages, but your phone won't buzz or make a noise for every one of them.
13. If you are not sure, ask yourself these three questions before you post:
 - a. Is this relevant?
 - b. Is this necessary?
 - c. Is this a good time to post?
