Parish Council News

Parish Council

Two Zoom general meetings have taken place since the last issue of the Packington Post. It was resolved to have a memorial seat in memory of Ian Dring, who served the Parish as a Councillor for many years. This seat will replace the one which is positioned at the Ashby Rd and High St junction. The seat in memory of Wesley Ewing will be erected in Mill St. We hope both will be in place by the end of this month. A number of highways, drain and flooding issues raised with the County Council have been addressed and the Vehicle Activated Sign on Ashby Rd is now working following many requests, over a twelve-month period, to service it.

The Parish has received another update from LCC Highways regarding traffic speed in Packington.

The average speeds recorded on our roads are also not high enough to warrant speed cameras. Even if the Parish had the money to purchase cameras, the regulations state that the average speed data recorded for Packington would not support their use and therefore we would be prohibited from erecting speed cameras. The update also included reasons which allowed other towns and parishes to have extra speed reducing measures and they cited: historic injury or fatalities on certain stretches of road: third party funding because of large residential development; finally, measures taken when funding was available when the County had a larger budget for traffic calming.

Towards the end of last year, it was resolved to try and brighten up the entrances to the village. To this end a village sign was proposed and a competition for design was mentioned in the Packington Post. There was however only a small interest in this project. Having resourced prices and permission for erecting village signs, the Council resolved to suspend the conversation on this topic and revisit it at a later date. In the meantime the council is hoping to erect some planters at the gated entrances.

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During the cold snap in January the Clerk was contacted by residents regarding Grit Bins. We have been asked about this before in hard winters and the Parish had an understanding that the NWLDC gritting team would place grit on the sloping streets of Mill St, Hall Lane. Homecroft Drive, and Nethercroft Drive. This agreement has now been taken off the table by NWLDC so we need to solve the problem ourselves. We have contacted the LCC highways who say the Parish Council would have to fund this operation and sort out the rules and regulations attached to installing Grit Bins. (Twenty pages of instructions!!) Among them is a 1.5m corridor around the Grit Bins for pedestrian and traffic safety; permission by all residents near to the proposed installation site and all costs met by the Parish. The discussion will resume at the next General meeting and a solution hopefully will be forthcoming for next year.

At the February meeting the future of the Village CCTV was discussed in private session. It was resolved to fund this system for the next year and review its effectiveness at the end of the year. The Council is committed to helping anyone who needs assistance at this time of Lockdown. We all know how difficult it has been. If anyone has any problems or needs help, please speak up. Ring me or contact the Clerk. There are people in place who will assist you whatever the reason. As the vaccines roll out, we hope the elderly in the village will be protected and that some normality will return. Please keep safe. The organising team are working with NWLD officials to work out the earliest possible date for this village "event".



Councillor Robert Martin – a career and lifetime dedicated to public service.



Councillor Robert Martin has spent a lifetime devoted to public service and supporting others. A Packington resident since 1967, he has served on the Parish Council for 14 years. Robert plans to continue to work on future challenges and serve the local community.

For over 32 years Robert chaired a North West Leicestershire homeless project which helped single homeless people, working with those who had been left unsupported by the system. The project was set up by a small group that put in the initial funding which then received support with grants from NW Leicestershire, Lottery Funding and others. Sadly, as is so often the case, the funding came to an end, but there was a silver lining in that there was some funding left to help remaining applicants and, better still, as a result of the success of the project, there were considerably fewer people coming forward needing support at the end. As If this role was not challenging enough, Robert also the chaired a women's refuge project in NW Leics.

Robert has always enjoyed the work with the Parish Council in supporting the community, but he recognises that Packington faces some

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significant challenges, the biggest of which are the proposals for HS2.

As Robert said, 'This will be a major issue for the village, not only in terms of the damage to homes, but also to areas of natural beauty. It will create chaos in terms of access in and out of the village'. Robert is pushing for a 'disturbance allowance' to help residents if HS2 does go ahead. He adds, "Consider that the cost of the first moon landing in 1969, a massive technological feat, was \$25 billion and compare this with an estimated budget of £108 billion to travel just 140 miles – the project does not make economic sense."

On other pressing issues for the future of Packington village, like many other residents, Robert feels that traffic and speeding are ones that need to be addressed. There are many options to consider in trying to calm traffic, but he does feel that making the entrances to the village more attractive may help to encourage drivers to treat the village with more respect and slow down.

In terms of what has changed over the years in Packington, there used to be a post office, a local milkman, baker and two shops in the village which are missed. But on the positive side, the community spirit, which has really come out during lockdown, is very strong and there are so many initiatives and events that, once lockdown is lifted, will make a welcome return, including the Big Breakfast, Duck Race and others. Packington is also fortunate in having thriving ladies' and men's groups that keep the community together.

Also, not to be ignored is the collective effort behind Neighbourhood Watch of which Robert is the representative for Ashby Road. The problem is that Packington is in a vulnerable position and encouraging the community to work together to look after one another is essential. Robert was also instrumental in campaigning to get the streetlights turned back on at night which acts as another deterrent.

Outside of work, Robert is a keen golfer and was previously Chairman and President of the Willesley Golf Club.

His work and commitment to Packington is greatly appreciated.



"The group we have is made up of six male ducks (with a curly feather on the top of their tail) and three female ducks. The oldest duck is the white one - he has a small black spot in his feathers - so we call him Spot. The other ducks are all one 'family' who came to us last spring. The small black duck is the mum and even though not all the other ducks were from her eggs, she fostered them all when they were a few days old.



"We do try to get them to come home to bed every night to keep them safe from foxes, but they sometimes ignore us especially when they have had loads to eat during the day!"

They certainly have become familiar faces in the village, so if you've not seen them yet be sure to head on down to Mill Street to meet them. Please be sure to keep your dog under control when you meet the ducks.

History Group
