Parish Council

June saw the Council's first face to face meeting in fourteen months. It was held in the main hall of the Memorial Hall. There were five members of the public present and Councillor Smith, Packington's District Councillor, also attended. Councillor Powell, a newly elected Parish Councillor was welcomed to the meeting.

At the start of the meeting there is a public question time. This is a chance to raise questions of concern and, if the Council is able, for them to respond. The main question from a member of the public was concerning the illegal encampment along Coleorton Lane. The question was, "what are the Parish and District Council doing about it." The Chairman responded by saying that the site had been monitored by the Parish for a long time and they had given many warnings of pending occupation to the District Council. The Chairman also said that the Parish had no powers to intervene and that the District Council were the authority who had the power to enforce planning law. At this juncture Councillor Smith asked to speak. He re-affirmed that the District Council had the enforcement powers and had already served a stop notice on the site. He also said that the power to uphold the law was by due process with the District Council and the courts. He assured the meeting that the District Council were going to do all in their power for the site to be restored to its original state and that money was no object in achieving this goal.

Agenda items were then taken and amongst the many updates including; Flooding, Highways issues, and Financial statements, was the issue of proposed grit bins for roads where the slope makes it exceedingly difficult to access. A few sites have been mentioned by residents and Councillors will walk the affected roads to finally decide on whether there can be provision made.



Community Orchard

Packington Community Orchard

a short history: by Adrian Mongredien

The idea of a local Community Orchard goes back to 2007/8 when a Packington Memorial Hall Management sub-committee (of which I was a member) was trying to obtain a Grant of £250,000 from the Big Lottery Fund for a complete rebuild and expansion of our Village Hall. Faced with an application form of great complexity and length the sub-committee was requested to suggest, amongst many other things, plausible new intergenerational activities which could take place in our proposed new building. One of the ideas we came up with was: an annual multi-generational COOKING event.

A timely article in the local "Rural Communities Council" magazine had detailed one Leicestershire village which had a Community Orchard. Every October the villagers would pick the fruit and join in a weekend of communal cooking at the Village Hall with older experienced cooks helping younger novices make their own first fruit pies etc. Prizes were awarded to those whose offerings were deemed the most consumable. Nearly everyone in this village joined in the weekend festivities which ended with a party/social in the Village Hall.

This sounded perfect. The Big Lottery Fund eventually agreed to help fund our new Memorial Hall and it reopened in December 2009.

In April 2011 I wrote an article for the Packington Post proposing a Community Orchard in Packington which, as well as featuring well-known varieties of fruit, could perhaps preserve some of the rarer local varieties of apple such as "Queen Caroline" first propagated in 1820 (hence its name) in Measham.

An open village meeting in September 2011, organised by Packington Parish Council led by Chris Miles, endorsed the idea of a local Community Orchard. The Parish Council set up a sub-committee to look into the possibility of planting fruit trees on National Forest Land.

After several meetings the National Forest agreed to our planting some 60 or so trees on ground behind Normandy Wood on Measham Road.

An article in the September 2012 Packington Post by Chris asked for sponsors to fund the purchase of fruit trees. The response was overwhelming with more than £1500 being pledged in a few weeks.

At first light on 24th November 2012 a group of hardy local volunteers set off across the frozen ground, up the hill, on the ancient Saxon footpath towards Measham carrying spades and fruit trees. The mist lifted, the sun came out, the frost vanished and a few hours of digging and planting, on either side of the footpath ensued.



The following year another 30 trees were planted. In 2014 the National Forest put up a carved sign to proclaim our orchard. A count this May revealed 54 fruit trees still flourishing, some are more than three times the size they were when planted. Over the next ten years they should become more productive and with good management, and husbandry, could produce sufficient fruit to make the idea of a late autumn village cooking/social event a possibility.

A knowledgeable volunteer this winter with a pruning saw and a good pair of secateurs would be useful to this long-term project. If the National Forest agreed to a few more trees being planted as a screen from the prevailing wind, the orchard might be transformed.



Meanwhile Mike Coke's annual early spring "Big Breakfast" concept has surpassed all the ideas we had back in 2007 (when a new Memorial Hall was a distant dream) of an intergenerational "cooking" event. I look forward to next March when Covid permitting the "Big Breakfast" can resume its primary role in our village communal activities. Maybe, one day a late-autumn fruit cooking festival will take place in our village as well. The Hall's excellent cooking facilities are on standby!

Community Orchard Visit

Saturday June 19th saw nine Packington residents take a walk into Normandy Wood to check out the current condition of the Community Orchard.

Luckily most of the orchard has survived the rigours of the British weather since they were planted in 2012 and 2014 and the trees were identified using a map made when the Orchard was first planted. It was evident that this year's fruit isn't going to be a bumper crop as the many late frosts in April have taken its toll on the early blossom.

However, the group surveying the orchard, quickly saw the orchard's potential and in a brief meeting, held in the carpark at the end visit, it was decided to step up the actions to make the community orchard work for the village. Cider making was mentioned! So was apple pie baking and a family fruit day.

We are looking to the future and hoping to expand this group, so come to a public meeting and make a difference by getting involved. It would be a great group for whole families to join, as well as new or seasoned gardeners. With a group set up, funding can be arranged, and with the links already established with the National Forest the Packington Community Orchard will thrive and generations of Packingtonians can benefit from this green living investment in the future.

Village in Bloom

You may have noticed the beautiful new floral planters at the main entrances to the village, but where have they come from?

The Parish Council have installed the new planters as a way of supporting the appearance of the village, while offering a bright and colourful welcome to our village entrances.

Following research into suppliers of the planters it was decided to have them made locally and a recommendation was given for them to be made by a young village resident, Zac Holden.

A keen gardener and woodworker, 14-yearold Zac, made six planters in total.

Zac's mum Rachael said: "He feels really proud to see his planters on display in the village and has had some lovely comments from people about them."

Councillor Martin was given responsibility for recruiting a team of volunteers to help plant, water and carry out the necessary maintenance of the planters.

He told us: "It was agreed at the Parish Council meeting to approve the budget for the purchase of plants, soil, compost and the planters. When we saw a prototype planter that Zac had made everyone was on board with getting them made locally and of course it was better value for money.

"There has been a lot of good feedback from residents about the planters and the only criticism is that there should be more, which I will be requesting in due course.

"I must say a big thank you to all the volunteers who are working hard, and it is hard work, firstly delivering all the soil and compost around each site and those looking after them and keeping the surrounding areas tidy."

You can see the six planters at the main village entrances – there are two on Ashby Road, two on Measham Road, one on Normanton Road and one on Heather Lane.

Unearthing Hidden Gems

You may have noticed there is a new addition to Vicarage Lane – the beautiful church wall!



Having been overgrown and hidden away for many years, the wall has now been cleared of all the brambles, ivy and weeds and restored to its former glory.

And its all been completed voluntarily by local couple Rachel and Steven Roe, who live at the end of Vicarage Lane.

Rachel and Steve have lived in the village for six years and having recently retired were spending more and more time taking care of their stunning garden. Back in the spring they noticed a few spring flowers hiding amongst the weeds and brambles. After clearing a small section they not only revealed the pretty flowers but also the wonderful church wall beneath.

Rachel told us: "We spoke to one of the church wardens when we first discovered the beauty of the wall and discussed the option of clearing the whole section. So they gave us their permission to take on the task.

"We had regular visits from the church warden who expressed their delight at each stage and on completing the project told us how grateful the church are for our efforts."

Steve said: "We initially committed about a day a week and the whole project took about 12 weeks when we eventually finished in early July.

Interview

Carol Price

Head of Packington Church of England Primary School for 16 years.



After 16 years as Headteacher of Packington Church of England Primary School, Carol Price leaves in July. Carol took up the post at the school in April 2005 after working in large, inner city, multi-cultural schools, so Packington was a big change. The previous schools that Carol worked in had up to 700 pupils, whilst here in Packington there are just over 100 pupils. Packington CofE School is very popular and has a full intake of pupils every year. Carol says that the size of the school means that you get to know the families of the pupils well and involve them in activities and events.

Before Covid, there was a 'grandparents reading team' and there used to be a 'grandparents afternoon tea', where pupils take on the role of waiters and waitresses. Carol says that she used to see a lot of the grandparents who would get involved whilst parents were often at work. Other fun and unusual activities for the children also include den building for the children!

Of course, Covid has had an impact on these activities and the situation has undoubtedly presented challenges and meant finding different ways of doing things. But there have been some useful lessons taken from it, for example, realising that it is possible to do Headteachers meetings via zoom rather than taking the time to travel into Leicester for them, freeing up time for other tasks and activities.

Packington School naturally has a Christian vision: 'together we can flourish with Jesus as our guiding light' and the core values are: Thankfulness, Peace, Forgiveness, Endurance, Justice, Friendship, Trust, Compassion. Worship time is on Friday, and again, parents and families used to be involved, but again this has temporarily had to become a virtual event.

The aim of the school is to provide children with confidence and become well rounded good citizens. They have their own version of the Duke of Edinburgh award – the Citizens Award. The criteria for this award are not academic, but 'softer' skills, such as fundraising for a cause, helping at home, litter picking, joining a sports club or opening a first bank account.

One of the major changes over the 16 years has been the rise in social media, which can be damaging particularly to young people. The school does talk to pupils about the subject and try to educate them about 'e-safety' as access to media is happening at a younger and younger age and content as we know, is sometimes very inappropriate, sometimes even dangerous.

Carol says that she will be sad to leave but hopes that all the school's pupils over the years will go out to fly the flag as good citizens, reflecting the core values of the school as young people.
