## Parish Council/Memorial Hall

### **Packington Parish Council**

Again, the Council has been very active over the last two months. We have had face to face talks with the Local Authority planning and enforcement team and because much of the discussions concerned the illegal traveller's encampment on Coleorton Lane, there is little to report because of its sensitive nature. However, Parish Councillors are encouraged that the Local Planning Authority is doing all it can.

The Council has been offered a parcel of land in New Packington to use as allotments. If anyone is interested in looking to cultivate this land, please request further details from the Parish Clerk: <u>clerk@packington.org.uk</u>

Councillors and residents have erected poppies and Tommies to commemorate Armistice Day.

A planning application for a caravan placement on a field in the countryside on Babelake Street was discussed. An objection was approved on the grounds of need and being outside the development boundary. A planning application for stables and tractor store next to 30 Ashby Road was also objected to on the grounds that; it would have a negative impact on the village entrance; did not display planning notices; would have access issues making the main road less safe. Also, it was deemed to be a very similar application to the original application for a stable and tractor shed on Coleorton Lane.

### Bell Ringing is Back!

Have you heard the sound of bells ringing throughout the village recently? Well, that is because a dedicated team of villagers have come together to get our church bells ringing again.

Packington has been without its own bell ringing team for many years, with the bells only being rung more recently for weddings, which involved teams coming from far and wide to perform the task.

Caroline Andrews, who's grandmother was previously the tower master at the church, has been keen to try and get a team of bell ringers up and running again. Overwhelmed with the interest from villagers wanting to learn there are now six adults five young people (from 9-14yrs old) learning the skill.

She tells us: "All the learners have been doing really well, the children have all picked it up so quickly and the adults aren't far behind!



"We've been so lucky to have an amazing teacher, Moira Johnson, who has so kindly given up lots of her spare time to come and teach us - she's even encouraged me to take the teaching course! She's had some help from Adam who rings with her and he's also an amazing instructor.

"We even found our very own experienced ringer in Dave Gammon who hadn't rung for around 20 years but is now very much involved with teaching and practicing at other towers! We hope to be able to join him around some local churches and hopefully other teams will come to Holy Rood to practice too."



Remembrance Sunday was the first time the new bell ringing team performed together for an occasion and they hope to also be ringing them on Christmas morning.

Caroline said: "It's great to think that the sound of the church bells ringing will be more of a regular occurrence in our village. We'll be able to ring them for weddings and official occasions ourselves and will definitely look at any special requests!

"So far all feedback we have received has been positive. Generally, people seem to love hearing the bells ring - even while we are learning and it doesn't sound particularly pleasant, but it will sound much better very soon! We'd love to also be able to raise some money for our church. Personally, I think the sound of the bells helps breathe life back into our church and hope it encourages more people to come and have a go and get more involved with village life."

The team would welcome anyone new, from 7/8yrs onwards, to come and have a go and are hoping their weekly practices get busy!

### Packington Village History Group


The Group is pleased to announce its latest publication, "A Way of Life That Has Gone," based on oral histories taken by Group members.

Between 1988 and 2001 members of the Group conducted a series of interviews with people who had grown up in the village decades earlier. The aim was to record memories of village life in the first part of the twentieth century. The result was a collection of cassettes and manuscripts which were stored and largely forgotten for a considerable time. Robin Boucher has now selected material from the interviews and edited them with a focus on the years between the world wars, giving vivid insights into life in Packington during those years.

"A Way of Life That Has Gone" will be available by late November, at a price of £5 per copy. The Group acknowledges a grant from Packington Parish Council's Solar Fund which has assisted with publication costs.
