Parish Council & CPR Training

Packington Parish Council

Much of the Council's time over the past months has been spent on planning issues within the Parish and the Village boundary. The on-going development of the Traveller site on Coleorton Lane and the eleven-house development off Ashby Road has been a big part of the Council's concern.

Following a six-month decision process and strong objections by the Parish and parishioners, it was noted that the NWLDC Planning Authority have robustly rejected and refused permission for the twelve caravans and twelve touring caravan application on Coleorton Lane. Because this site is still subject to an appeal to a court order to vacate the site, it may be some time before we see any evidence that this site is being returned to its status as countryside and agricultural land.

The Ashby Road development was objected by the Parish Council for various reasons. It was thought that in principle, some housing would inevitably be difficult to appose and therefore objections to the application were; too many houses on the site; service road on the wrong side of site bringing more congestion near a busy village crossroads; bungalows instead of two/three storey houses; detrimental effect on the Conservation Area status of the surrounding area; loss of trees and hedgerow; foul and surface water drainage concerns. Above all it was felt that the Developer had not listened to the public at the drop in consultation evening and had not taken any suggestions seriously. The Parish precept for 2022 and 2023 had to be resolved in the January meeting and it was decided not to change the Council Tax Precept for the Parish this coming financial year. However, the Clerk, our financial officer, did hint that it may be necessary for it to be increased next year.

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CPR Training

National Forest Community First Responders (CFRs) provided a free Resuscitation (CPR) and Defibrillator (AED) training session on Sunday 9th January at the Village Hall. It started with a presentation covering the basics of heart function, to help explain what an AED does and when it can be useful. This was followed with a practical session on specialist dummies helping guide people on where and how much physical effort is required to perform effective chest compressions. The training session also covered the guidance on how to perform CPR in the current covid situation.

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HOSPICE HOPE GET GREEN LIGHT FOR NEW DAY CENTRE IN NORTH WEST LEICESTERSHIRE



A fantastic early Christmas Present was delivered to local charity Hospice Hope on the 22nd of December with planning permission being granted for the construction of their brand-new Day Centre in Swannington. The centre is being built at no cost to the Charity on land provided on a peppercorn lease by North West Leicestershire District Council. The new building will provide a home for services for the charity which supports people across North West Leicestershire with life limiting conditions or who have been diagnosed with a condition that reduces their quality of life and their carers. Offering a wide range of services across the community, including counselling, befriending, support cafés, complimentary therapies and online groups, the new Centre will give the charity a home for offering day care for guests and their carers, in a purpose-built facility.

A TRULY COLLABORATIVE PROJECT

The project will be built on land provided by North West Leicestershire District Council and will be constructed by local housebuilder Bloor Homes. The two organisations have worked with Hospice Hope to create a truly collaborative community project which will provide services within the community for many years to come. Charity Manager, Jim Vickrage said "Our trustees and staff are all looking forward to this year's exciting plans and work beginning on our new Day Centre and Charity headquarters in January 2022, with completion planned for the end of this year. After the events of the last couple of years, we are delighted to be able to announce some positive news for the community and this project will help us to provide our services to even more people in our own Centre. We are incredibly grateful for the support from North West Leicestershire District Council and Bloor Homes, whose generosity will make a difference for many years to come."

The New Day Centre is to be called 'Bright Hope House' which will be a part of the plan for the charity to re-brand to its new name—'Bright Hope' during 2022. The charity is planning a busy year of fundraising for its new Centre, and would welcome enquires from groups, individuals and companies who would like to get involved with the new project and help the charity with its ambitious plans. We would also like to thank the village as a whole, and village organisations for the tremendous support for Hospice Hope in the past that has enabled us to make this great step forward.

Village Library Bus

You may, or may not, be aware that Leicestershire County Council's (LCC) mobile library vehicle visits Packington on the first Thursday of each month, with our next visit being on 3rd February.

You'll find the vehicle parked at 40 High Street from 2.15pm to 3.00pm.



Anyone who is a member of any LCC library may use the service almost exactly the same as they would any town or village library. If you are not yet a member you can easily apply on line at www.leicestershire.gov.uk and search 'join the library' or you can sign up on the vehicle itself. You will need proof of ID to do this.

Welcome New Headteacher

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Ruth Burton interview by Amy Powell

New Head of Packington Church of England Primary School



Ruth Burton has been in her new position for a full term now and is settling in well. She tells us: "All the staff, children and parents have welcomed me with open arms. Along with support from the governors, it has all been a really nice process."

Ruth lives in south Leicestershire with her husband and two children, Oliver (11) and William (9).

After completing a four-year degree in primary education, she has previously worked in two large double entry form schools in Leicestershire – Water Leys in Wigston and Highcliffe in Birstall. Ruth then spent seven years as Head of School at the small rural Church of England school of St Andrews in North Kilworth before taking up her new role as Headteacher at Packington CofE School.

Ruth has taught every year group within the primary phase and her career has led her to be an Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) leader, Phase leader, Senior Teacher, Head of School and now Headteacher. During her time at St Andrews, Ruth led the successful village primary school which achieved results in the top 3% of the country. About her move to Packington School, Ruth said: "I chose Packington as it was a very similar school to the one I had come from, and I wanted to join somewhere with the same ethos. A family school is so important to me where I can be part of the community. I really feel it's important to be in a school where I can make a difference not only to the children but their families as well.

"Packington is full of traditions and full of children who want to take the lead, already I have seen children who have taken the lead in fundraising activities."

Ruth has already started making an impact at the school and implementing projects, particularly around reading and writing. She tells us: "We have already been looking at reading for pleasure – concentrating on giving every child a love of books and a lifelong love of reading. We held a book fair to raise money to help increase our school library so that we can get up to date books that our children want to read, as well as a range of authors the children may not have heard of before.

"This term we are starting a new way of teaching writing called 'the write stuff'. As a school we want to teach children to think carefully about their writing so they concentrate on quality."

Ruth is keen to ensure that every child is supported to be the best that they can be. Telling us of her ambitions for the future, she says: "I want to ensure that the children of Packington have a love of learning and have the opportunities to have some amazing learning experiences, both academically but also within foundation subjects as well. I want all children to be given opportunities in sports, the arts, music and languages to really get them ready for secondary school and beyond."

It's undoubtedly been a tough couple of years and Ruth has joined during a still difficult time. However, as a school they have been looking at what the best things about Packington are and which of these they could keep moving forward, so it will be nice to see some positives coming out after the last couple of years of lockdowns!

We wish Ruth a warm Packington welcome to both the school and the village!

Sadly, this will be the final time I write in the Packington Post. I officially retire from Leicestershire Police on 17th February, after completing 30 years' service. I have spent 17 years of those, as the Neighbourhood Officer for the Ashby beat, which encompasses the village of Packington.



Like any other job, it's had its highs and lows, good and bad times, lots of memorable moments, and some that I'd like to forget.

There have been many highlights in my career, including policing the G8 Summits in Birmingham 1998 and Gleneagles, Scotland in 2005; the Olympic Torch Relay through Leicester in 2012; the fantastic street party in Market Street to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee also in 2012; Leicester City FC Champions League matches in 2016/17; HRH and Prince Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh's visit to Leicester on Maundy Thursday in 2017 (and actually seeing them in person); and the many Ashby Remembrance Day Parades (my final one being in 2021, when I had the honour of laying a wreath).

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I was also very proud to have received my Long Service and Good Conduct medal in 2012, and be nominated for the Leicestershire Beat Bobby of the Year in 2014.

It's been a pleasure to have worked with and met some fantastic people, both colleagues and members of the local community, many who have become good friends.

I would like to give my heartfelt thanks to the following organisations and people for all the help and support they have given me over the years:

The members of staff and councillors at Ashby Town Council, NWLDC, and Packington Parish Council, the local businesses, schools, churches, sports groups, licensees, community and voluntary groups, Ashby Street Pastors, and the local community as a whole. There are others, but far too many to mention.

I'd like to think that during the time I've worked in the local area, I've done the job to the best of my ability, and worked with the community to help make a positive difference.

I also hope that I've been professional, approachable, only used my authority as a last resort, and at the same time, gone about my business with a smile on my face and a sense of humour!

Once I have finished, I plan to have a spring and summer sabbatical during which I aim to get all my jobs done at home, attend a caravan course, purchase a caravan, visit various places in the UK that I have never been to, go walking more, start open water swimming, continue with my Rotary Club work, and get to watch more cricket (which will hopefully include England actually winning a test match!!).

By September/October, I want to have found another job, but what that is, I don't yet know, and I suppose it depends on who wants to employ a 50-year-old, cynical, ex-copper! It's been a privilege to have worked in Ashby and Packington.

You have a fantastic community, one that is the envy of many other areas. Please never forget that, and carry on the great work that you do to make this possible.







RICHARD GREGORY

interviewed by Adrian Mongredien.

By the time you read this Richard Gregory, a long term resident of Packington (42 years in the village) will have moved to a smaller property in nearby Ashby de la Zouch.



Richard was born in Cheltenham and went to school in Gloucestershire. After completing his degree there he took up a teaching post in Leicester. Looking for a more rural situation to bring up an impending family (and after spending a pleasant evening with his school's Head of Design who lived in Packington) he, and his then wife Sharon, purchased 31 High Street Packington, in 1979, from Dorothy Dapp, a former Land lady of the "Bull & Lion" (before Ray Conolly & Eve).

A couple of years later, now with two small children, Tom and Joanna, the Gregory family moved to a larger house at the bottom of Hall Lane.

I asked Richard what it was like when they arrived in Hall Lane. He replied "No gas, coal fires only, no street lamps, pipistrelle bats in the bedroom", but, on the plus side, the rural sounds of sheep & cows by day, and owls hooting at night, and his children could play relatively safely in the lane.

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His cherished memories of Packington include, Christmas Brownie Pantomimes at the Village Hall with Ken & Pam English for which he designed and constructed the scenery, the Annual Summer Carnival through the 1980s, and 90s in which he played a part collecting "white goods" for their stall, and, the highlight of being involved in the organisation of the Carnival Procession which was made up of floats, built on tractor trailers and flat-bed lorries from Sumnall's farm. The floats processed from the Pub up High Street, down Normanton Road, and then along "millionaires row" and into Mill Street. Richard is still convinced that the "Captain Pugwash" float that he helped construct one year, from discarded wooden panels at school, should have easily won First Prize but for the apparent bias towards more "amateur" floats by the chief "judge"! But he is not bitter! - Well, only a little bit!

Richard remembers constructing a "Youth Club" float for one Carnival featuring "Cleopatra & the Egyptians" which included two pyramids. He thinks they won that year but others might remember differently.

Richard also became involved in the running of the Tuesday evening "youth club" at the Village Hall after Ray Connolly and Eve, who had started it a couple of years earlier, decided to concentrate their efforts on running the "Bull & Lion". With help from others including Ray Coxon they organised games, Table Tennis matches, and Charity Walks. Richard remembers leading a group of about a dozen teenagers on an all-night walk in the Peak District and arriving at their destination to find Ray Coxon had a cooked breakfast waiting for them. Happy days! No space to write about his role at Ravenstone Football Club but others will remember how valuable his contribution was to their success.

Richard is rightly proud that the prize-winning logo you see on the top of each copy of Packington Post was designed by one of his 12 year-old pupils at Ivanhoe College as a design task he set for his students.

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He was also on the Editorial Team of the Packington Post for its first 23 issues, and was a member of the "Village Steering Group" which oversaw the ground-breaking "2002 Village Appraisal" from which so many village improvements have ensued

Richard told me he will look back with great pleasure on his years in Packington which saw his children grow up here, become involved in a great community, and both get married in Packington Church. I asked him what he will miss most on leaving Packington? He replied: "long standing friends, the stream, and the peace!"

I'm sure we would all like to thank him for his huge contribution to our village community over the last forty plus years and wish him well in Western Close.
