The menu has essentially been designed by regular customers who overwhelmingly requested a range of good quality, traditional pub dishes.

Keeping things local, Daybreak Services will be providing the majority of the produce, along with Taylors Butchers who will be supplying the meat. A special thank you goes to Pete and his team at Daybreak.

A new website with an online booking system and an events calendar are in the process of being created and Tracey added: "We would like to hear from our customers about what events they would like to see on a regular basis at the pub. So far, we have been asked if there will be a guiz night, and any special food nights; such as pie nights.

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Your Packington Post:

At the last meeting of the Packington Post committee (which usually meets six times a year, shortly before the printing stage of each issue) it was noted by one of the attendees, with some amusement, that the average age of the four members present that evening was over 80. Our younger members had other calls upon their time on that occasion but this meeting did indicate a need for an infusion of fresh blood in the near future.

My wife Kate and I have been looking after the distribution of boxes of Packington Posts for a number of years. We collect them from our printers (Context) and distribute them to our (currently) 10 volunteer deliverers around the village. The "deliverers" are the key people who put the Packington Post through your letterbox every two months - thanks to all of them from the editorial committee for their efforts through all four seasons.

At least one of these 10 volunteers has been delivering your Packington Posts from issue 1 in the summer of 2003 to this edition; number 114, so many thanks to Ronna Dring of Babelake Street. Two other longterm deliverers, Susan Smith of High Street, and Judith Wilson of Homecroft Drive, also deserve a special mention for their efforts. I decided to call it a day as far as the distribution is concerned, on reaching the age of 80, and Martin Tidman of Mill Street has agreed to take over this role from issue 115. I will continue to contribute written articles from time to time (if the editor so wishes).

I think I, myself, have delivered Packington Posts to every house in the village at some point over the last few years.

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After living on a fairly modern estate for most of my life I find the layout of our village and the variety of housing in it quite fascinating. Nearly 1,000 years of housing are contained in a space you can comfortably walk round in under a day. Some properties are right on the road while some are hidden away and require some seeking out. Most properties are numbered or named, but not all, while some have hidden letterboxes or holes in walls which are not obviously visible as you head for the front door.

It might be worth pointing out during this "Covid" period that every minute a newly enrolled emergency ambulance driver takes to locate a property might make the difference between life and death. A very visible house number from the road on properties set back from a road could make that difference especially at night. It might also stop your computer-initiated deliveries being left in one of your neighbours' gardens! You could also have the misfortune to have fire break out on your premises, or need to urgently contact the Police. Can the emergency services find YOU?

The last two years have been difficult for the Packington Post but this summer social activity is returning to our village. The Platinum Jubilee Events will soon be upon us. You will want to read about them here in YOUR Packington Post.

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Packington Lunch Club

In 2009, after the refurbishment of the Memorial Hall, some residents began to explore the idea of starting a Lunch Club in the Meeting Room. They organised a meeting with a representative from the County Council who were encouraging the introduction of Lunch Clubs. To gauge the interest within the village, letters were distributed within Packington and it was obvious by the response there was real interest in the scheme.

The County Council were using Apetito, a ready meal supplier, and the County Council were prepared to subsidise the scheme initially. The Memorial Hall's newly refurbished kitchen met all the standards required and we had a team of volunteers who helped plate, serve the meals and collect some residents who had recently moved into sheltered accommodation in Ashby.

The Group decided to meet once every month and our very first meal was served in October 2010.

Things have changed considerably over the past twelve years. The County Council stopped their subsidy and unfortunately the standard of the food provided by a new supplier began to deteriorate. So, in stepped one of the organiser's daughters who, with the help of her friends, provided the meals, freshly cooked on the premises. All attendees had always enjoyed the social aspect of the Lunch Club and now they really enjoy the food.

During the dark days of Covid, Lunch Club had to be suspended and now, as rules have been withdrawn, we are meeting in the Main Hall allowing better social distancing. 

Packington Easter Egg Hunt


The Easter bunnies were out early hiding eggs and bunnies, one eagled eye little boy even brought a bunny back before we even started!

30 Years' Service!

Janice Sumnall has been the Brownie guider for over 30 years at Packington and was recently presented with long service award. She tells us about the award and her time with the Brownies.



I received the award for thirty years' service and it consisted of a silver brooch and certificate which was presented to me at the end of our Brownie meeting on Tuesday 5th April. Apart from all the parents, there was other guiders and the commissioner in attendance.



Of course, the celebration cake had to be a large chocolate brownie, which I and the girls demolished.

Receiving the award made me very proud of what I had achieved with hundreds of girls over the years, teaching them new skills and helping to prepare them to be adventurous young women whilst having loads of fun.

I started life as a Brownie in Leeds in 1966 in the days of a brown dress and brown tie. Having progressed through Guides I joined as a young leader in Leeds before I went to university. The draw of being involved with the Guide Association took me back to helping at my original pack in Leeds before I moved to Packington in 1985 where I soon became involved in the local pack: 1st Packington Brownies.

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My favourite thing about being a Brownie guider is having an involvement with the girls from an early age and seeing them develop new skills, confidence, and friendships to take them into adulthood. I don't even mind being called Brown Owl in Tesco's although it does raise a few eyebrows usually because of the decibels! Some of my original Brownies are now even mums themselves.

Over the years the Guide Association and Brownies have evolved to ensure that they appeal to today's young girls. The Promise reflects the diversity of the girls, their background, religion, and country of origin. The days of the sewing badge (my first badge) which involved darning a sock have long gone to be replaced by much more contemporary activities such as space challenges, caring for the environment and my rights. The current themes that the programme is based on includes Know Myself, Express Myself, Be Well, Have Adventures, Take Action, and Skills for my Future. Even after 30 years, I don't intend to give it up yet and my plan is to continue being involved whilst I feel I have more to offer.
