
Near Fatal Accident on Measham Road

How long before we report a FATAL accident?

A collision took place between a car pulling out of a resident's drive, turning right to go into the village, and a motorbike, coming from the village. The impact was taken on the driver's door. The wing mirror was sheared off and found lodged in the rear of the car.



The car driver suffered injuries to his head and face. The motorbike driver was badly injured. He has broken his back, his arm and had a dreadful open wound to his mouth, jaw and chin.



The impact of the crash has written off both vehicles.

Investigations by police surrounding the cause of this crash, are ongoing.

Speeding in the Village

This issue has been a high priority for many villagers over many years. Concerns were raised as far back as the "Village Survey" of 2002.

Asked for three negatives about the village the top answer with 26% was "speeding traffic through the village" Measham Road was also the top answer about the location of speeding traffic, along with "all entrances to the village".

A supplementary question regarding possible solutions to the problem were:

Ramps 27% Cameras 20%

There have been a number of letters on this subject that have been published in the Packington Post over the years. Some giving examples of possible solutions. Among the suggestions have been: Average Speed Cameras and chicanes. If you have any suggestions that will help to reduce speeding in the village then please email: nicolabeanland@btinternet.com

Interesting comment from the Speed Reduction Officer for Leicestershire, who says that it is too dangerous to carry out Speed checks on Measham Road, where this latest accident happened!

Editor's Note: I learned that my Daughter-in-Law was involved in a similar accident at this same location some 25 years ago.

Open Gardens Success

August Bank Holiday saw the return of Packington Open

Gardens, the first since Covid. Geoff Gasson has retired from organising this event. He offered much experience and know-how to me in taking it on, for which I thank him. He still played a big part with Doreen, organising the teas at the church. There were just nine gardens open this year, with thanks to Keith Keller for his walled garden in Hall Farm Close and Pete and Rachael Wozywoda for their varied garden in High Street who both opened for the first time, alongside a number of regulars. A number of previously opened gardens were not available, all for very good reasons. The great thing about having a number of gardens is that the 'whole is greater than the sum of its parts', where a smaller garden can offer an important facet in the jewel of the event.

The whole event raised £2,875 for the upkeep of the fabric of the church, a very historic building in the village. With less gardens to spread people around it was encouraging to see 351 passports being sold for £1,755. Teas at the church and Memorial Hall raised £805, the garden stall £125, book stall £50 and donations (including one from our Sponsor David Granger plus their printing of programs) £175. All sums rounded to nearest £5.

I was so busy trotting round the venues and sorting one or two minor problems that I didn't take a single picture!

Betty Carter

One of Packington's oldest residents, Betty Carter, has died at the age of 95.



Betty and her late husband, Eric, moved to their Hall Lane home 20 years ago to live next door to their younger son Nick and his wife Kay. Betty died on 4th August following several months of ill-health and immobility brought on by a fall in November.

Like her husband of 70 years, Betty was a journalist all her working life, starting her career as a teenage reporter in Weston-Super-Mare before transferring to Tunbridge Wells in Kent, where she met Eric. She went on to become chief reporter of the Kent and Sussex Courier.

In 1973 they became owners of the Dawlish Gazette in Devon and ran the newspaper together for 10 years. Betty continued to write even after her retirement and her words appeared in the first edition of Packington Post. Betty was a founder member of the Packington Post and contributed for a good number of years. She was also an enthusiastic member of several Packington groups, including the Book Club.

She leaves three children, seven grandchildren and one great grandchild. Betty's funeral was held in August at Holy Rood church.

Road Traffic Accident – Measham Road: plea for traffic calming

We need your help!

"Now" is already too late. Accidents have already occurred, and people have been injured, and this time round the injuries were severe.

Attempts have been made to get traffic calming but to no avail. We have been told that "there have been no fatalities" – we consider this unacceptable – it will be no comfort to any future families affected.

Over the years Roberts Coaches and Leicester Council have been contacted regarding the speed at which buses and refuse lorries speed through the village, as it is not only the motorbikes and cars which travel fast through the village, but all types of traffic.

Living on Measham Road we regularly witness traffic entering and leaving the village, driving in excess of 30mph, in an area which is close to the school and busy with people visiting the park, recreation ground, and church. Measham Road has poor vision due to the bend and bridge.

It is unacceptable for residents to be expected to wait until another serious accident happens or worse a fatality occurs – it is only a matter of time.

This road needs traffic calming. Proper traffic calming designed to suit all roads in our village. Yes, we've got a flashing light. Yes, we've got "dragon's teeth". This is clearly not enough.

We are now taking action, and this time we will not be fobbed off and we will not be going away!

Parish Council Report page 4

Packington Parish Council have continued to meet monthly during the summer and have discussed many topics. These can be viewed on the Council's website. However, two re-occurring themes have emerged; Firstly, the illegal encampment of travellers along Coleorton Lane. This, as most of you know, has been ever present on the Council's agenda for a long time. The processing of latest applications, changes in applications and the amount of time needed to process appeals through the courts, is proving to be a long, long, windy road. The Council have therefore asked for a full update of the situation from the Head of Planning NWLDC. This will take place in the next few weeks.

Secondly, Traffic Calming; As a Council we continue to discuss this as the worsening situation means we cannot do 'nothing'. There was a near fatal accident in a 30mph zone recently on Measham Road. Speeding was the cause and facts are the speeding motorcyclist broke his back and other bones and was in intensive care. The car driver he smashed into suffered severe facial injuries. He was told he was lucky, as it could have been even worse.

The Council were then told of an incident witnessed by a Councillor who, whilst doing 30mph along the 30mph stretch of Ashby Road was overtaken by a car estimated to have accelerated to 60 to70 mph who then slammed on his brakes at the Normanton Road/High St and Mill Street junction. This person proceeded into High St, turned round and parked up. Obviously, a local person! 'Words were spoken to the driver who mumbled an apology.

Another incident which narrowly avoided a collision was on the bend in High St. south of Homecroft Drive. A car coming down High St towards the Bull and Lion at 40mph! It could have been nearer 50mph but too fast to estimate. Car coming up High St at 20mph, both cars overtaking parked cars. A collision nearly took place.

How they avoided each other or one of the parked cars was a miracle.

I'm sure a number of you reading this have experienced something similar in the village and the Council are determined to do something. Signs, speed limits, Vehicle Activated Signs, road markings etc do not appear to work for some drivers and so the Council are coming round to the view that physical control is the only way forward. Could I ask all readers and residents who drive, not to park their cars on the uphill section of High St (the Homecroft Drive side.) This includes not parking on the pavement.

Council are also becoming increasingly concerned that cars and large vans are parking on the Measham Road verge next to the Bull and Lion. This is causing a real hazard, as it restricts totally the view of drivers turning right or left out of High St. It is impossible to see anything coming along the busy Measham Road from the Bridge to the T-junction.

Invasive plants removal in the Gilwiskaw Brook

Himalayan Balsam outcompetes native plants in ecologically sensitive areas, particularly river banks. The Mease catchment is a Special Area of Conservation that includes the Gilwiskaw Brook. Where it grows in dense stands along river banks it blocks flow at times of high rainfall, increasing the likelihood of flooding. The die back of large strands over the winter can leave river banks bare and exposed to erosion.



Packington's Round House

Ever wondered what the small 'round house' on the junction of Normanton Road, High Street and Ashby Road is?



Thanks to the Packington Village History Group (PVHG), here we have some information about this quirky little piece of our village's history.

Packington is not the only village in Ashby's hinterland to have a round house. Smisby, Ticknall, Breedon and Worthington also have ones which have survived to the present day and it is believed that they all date from the late 18th century.

The Packington round house became part of the Hastings estate, suggesting that it was built on the instruction of the local lord of the manor, Charles Hastings (later General Sir Charles Hastings).

The purpose of the building, in general terms, was to provide somewhere to lock up wrongdoers for a short period.

On the instruction of the Countess of Loudon, who inherited the Willesley estate in 1920, most of the estate was auctioned off in 1921 and 1922, but the Packington round house was not sold and remained part of the estate.

During World War Two the round house was used with a different purpose – by serving as the base or shelter for Air Raid Protection (ARP) Wardens. Daughters of local families

(Marjorie Pickering, later Canner, of 6 Ashby Road and Joan Orton, later Bradbury, of Round House Farm) later remembered taking refreshments across to the round house for the wardens serving there.

PVHG has evidence from 1958 of a letter from a Mrs M Treharne (nee German) who owned the adjacent house (1 Normanton Road) up to that time. She states that "I have just sold my cottage but the little lock-up still belongs to me and I have the key. It was given to me by the Countess of Loudon, I have the letter that she wrote to me, but the lawyers say that without some legal formalities it cannot belong to me. For me, the letter is sufficient and binding. The stipulation was that I looked after it and did not have it pulled down."

As the round house was still part of the Hastings estate until 1997, it appears the lawyers were right.

A press cutting from May 1958 states "When Mrs Treharne bought her house in Normanton Road the lock-up was dilapidated and the doorway which faced to the road bricked up. She restored the Round House, had the doorway re-made to face the garden."

The plaque on the door of the round house (now once again facing the road) states that it was passed to the village by the Countess of Loudon by Deed of Gift in 1997, implying that Mrs Treharne's lawyers were correct back in the 1950's.

The most recent use of the round house was highlighted in a press cutting from 2007. It shows a Mr Alan Hemsley, dressed in a mock prison outfit, having volunteered to spend 24 hours "locked" in the round house to raise money for the refurbishment of the Memorial Hall. Many will remember Alan as Chairman of the "Steering Group on the 2002 Village Appraisal" He was also actively involved in the refurbishment of the Memorial Hall.

Packington Book Club




For the meeting on **Wednesday 26th October** we are reading "A Class Act" by Gervase Phinn, an amusing look at life in a struggling village school.
