#### **Questions from Members of the Public**

These included concerns involving; the traveller site on Coleorton Lane; the forthcoming Public Inquiry and subsequently its outcome; which Councillors would be standing again for re-election at the May Local Council Elections.

### Crime in the Village

February saw the worst crime figures for some time. There was an assault, two burglaries and a road traffic accident involving a drunk driver. The Council urges residents to remain vigilant and keep all doors locked and report any suspicious activity.

#### Coleorton Lane. Illegal Campsite

The Chairman read a factual report of the proceedings of the Public Inquiry which will then be published as an article in the Packington Post to inform all residents – see page 3. A decision notice is expected within a three-month period.

#### **Traffic Calming**

The County Council Highways has still not come back with any results of their traffic survey at the time of writing this report.

The Council is putting all the traffic calming data from neighbouring villages together and will present this at the April meeting.

#### Footpath Sign

The Highways Authority has rejected, on safety grounds, a request from the Parish for a footpath sign between Hall Lane and Homecroft Drive.

# Village CCTV System Neighbourhood Watch

The Council is arranging a public meeting in order to explain the Village CCTV operation and to combine this with a Neighbourhood Watch update. A date for this will be arranged after the May elections.

# Public Inquiry Coleorton Lane Traveller Camp

The inquiry began on Tuesday 28th February, included a site visit on Thursday 2nd March and concluded at lunchtime on Friday 3rd March.

The proceedings began with opening remarks by the Inspector and he had assurances from both parties that the points that had been previously agreed on remained. At this point he did say that he had received a written submission from Packington Parish Council and confirmed they had written in support of the local District Council and there were no new points in the document.

The inspector then called for the appellant's highways expert to give his evidence in support of his written submission that the inspector had received twenty-eight days prior to the hearing. This highways expert was particularly led by his council and both tried to say that the poor visibility of the site's access and the findings by the Highways Authority on the stopping distances were not sufficient to prevent planning permission. Their position was that it was not a real issue.

The appellant's expert was then cross examined by the NWLDC barrister who was very direct and to the point and went a long way to discrediting the witness's assumption that the highways issues in this case were not insurmountable. This led to the opposing barrister having to help out his highways' expert on a number of occasions.

Then followed a re-examination of the appellant's highways expert by his barrister. Again, it was very much barrister led and even at this late stage the appellant's barrister introduced new documents to the proceedings even though written submissions had to be in to the inspector prior the actual inquiry.

The next engagement was the Council's highways expert and he was questioned by the Council's barrister on his written submission. He stuck by all the figures supplied in his document and could not recommend this application for approval. He said the 'desirable stopping distances' had been applied for this particular stretch of road and that the 'minimum standard' could not be applied. He also said it was not appropriate to remove mature trees and too costly to alter the road layout to improve visibility as the appellants had suggested.

As readers can see from the above short precis of day one of the inquiry, it would take the whole of several issues of the Packington Post to give readers chapter and verse. So, I will cut to the chase and give you headlines so that when the Inspector gives his verdict on the application, which could take around three months, you can see how close his decision will be.

- 1) Does the Inspector go with the minimum or desirable stopping distances on the access site highway connection?
- 2.) Does the Inspector, take into account that the Local Authority has done very little to provide travellers' sites over the last decade?
- 3.) Does the Inspector give weight for approval from the personal circumstances given to the inquiry by a number of travellers who gave personal testimonies?
- 4.) Will the Inspector think that a traveller site in the middle of the countryside enhances or detracts the landscape of the National Forest?
- 5.) Will the Inspector judge that the application is a sustainable development or that there will be too much reliance on motor transportation to and from the site.

There were many other smaller issues not mentioned above.

### **Guide Dog in Training**



Hello, my name is Cracker, and I am new to the village. I currently live with the Ball family on Mill Street and am teaching them how to teach me to become a guide dog for the blind. I'll live there for a year before I go on and do my proper apprenticeship with the guide dog people. After another 12 months of training, I will become a qualified guide dog for the blind.

At the moment, I'm only a few weeks old, so I have to teach the humans about potty training, especially the young humans Jenson, 13 and Josh, 16; I have to make sure they don't tire me out too much, as I am only little. I also live with the grandparents Terry and Chris; Chris is knocking into shape well, but granddad Terry has still got a lot to learn; he's been throwing sticks and expecting me to chase after them; I don't, of course; poor old grandad doesn't realise I am not supposed to be chasing sticks particularly when I am working with blind people - but he means well.

I am off for my afternoon nap, so I will speak to you later.

### **Fascinating Fossil Find**

Whilst out recently, litter picking the brook, village resident, Simon Tebbett, had a rather interesting find, discovering what he believes to be a Club Moss Bark fossil. With an interest in geology and palaeontology, Simon tells the Packington Post, "At the bottom of the brook, amongst bits of pottery and glass, I noticed something with a dappled pattern, around 20cm by 15cm so took a closer look.



"In my amateur opinion, I believe the fossil to be a Club Moss Bark. Our village is, at least in part, on the Carboniferous coal measures; the Carboniferous period persisted between 259 to 299 million years ago (although some experts differ in opinion as to the exact dates - so let's say give or take 10 million years). At that time Packington would have been positioned on or near a large, lowlying, tropical area, probably not too far from the coast, and interspersed with marshes, swamps and forests. A form of primitive tree-like plant, Club Mosses thrived in wet and humid conditions, with some variants able to grow as high as 30 metres. However, although looking 'tree-like', Club Mosses were not related to modern trees; and despite the name, neither were they directly related to moss. The plants shared their environment with some sizeable animals, as the largest of the primitive reptiles of the Carboniferous period grew up to 30 feet long; however, it is very unlikely that we will find any of those in Packington since they did not seemingly live in this area."

The next meetings are on Thursday 23rd March, 13th April and 27th April.




# **Packington Book Club**

# Thinking of becoming a Parish Councillor?

# "...go for it!" says one of our current Parish Councillors.

Packington Parish Council is calling on residents, passionate about their community, to stand in the local elections in May 2023.



There are six councillor positions and there is currently one vacancy on the council. However, at election time all positions are essentially vacant and therefore anyone can put themselves forward for one of the six positions.

#### What do councillors do?

Councillors are the champions of their community and give residents a voice on the decisions the council makes. Becoming a councillor will allow you to make a real difference in your community by engaging with residents, local groups, and businesses to find out their needs; making decisions on which services and projects the council should take forward; and getting involved locally to ensure the services are meeting your community's needs.

The Parish Council is responsible for litter and dog waste bins, some street furniture such as benches and noticeboards. Packington Parish Council serves as sole trustee to two charities, one of which manages the recreation ground and play area.

It represents the parish with the County and District Councils, pushing for improvements in service such as traffic calming, verge mowing and signage.

The council also supports village events, such as helping to organise and fund the Jubilee and Coronation celebrations. It maintains the Round House and the village defibrillator, provides the planters for the village entrances, helps fund the Packington Post, and supports the CCTV scheme.

The Packington Post asked one our current Parish Councillors, Russell Powell, for an insight into his experience, specifically why he joined the council? "I wanted to contribute to ensuring the village is a safe place to live and to enhance the village spirit through events and celebrations."

When asked what he would say to anyone thinking of becoming a councillor he said, "If you have the time, energy and enthusiasm... go for it!"

#### How much time does it take?

The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) Local Councillor Census Survey found that councillors put aside, on average, three hours a week for council work. This often includes attending meetings, engaging with residents and speaking on behalf of the council to other bodies. However most smaller councils need much less time than this.

#### How the election process works

The next elections will take place on **Thursday 4th May 2023.** 

However the **deadline to submit your nomination form is Tuesday 4th April** to qualify for the election. Election packs will be available from the Elections Team at NWLDC. Voting will take place in the usual way and the results will be publicised after the count.

If successful, you will attend the next Parish Council meeting, sign your Acceptance of Office form, and sit as a councillor for the first time at that meeting. The Clerk will ensure that you are provided with as much information as possible to help you settle into the role and training is also available.

# **Packington Traffic Calming Update**

The committee held a further meeting this month and we now have the independent traffic survey report following the installation of Automatic Traffic Counters in December. We are currently awaiting the report from Leicestershire County Council following their traffic survey when we will then be able to analyse the data.



Information which has recently been received from Leicestershire County Council confirms that there have been eight accidents in the village in the last five years which involved injury and were reported to the Police! Of these accidents, three were categorised by the Police as "serious".

Measham and Atherstone Parish Councils have kindly been in touch to provide information on how they have progressed with traffic calming in their villages. This has been interesting to read and has been helpful in considering our next steps – thank you to those Parish Councils.

We are currently considering our position regarding a potential application to the Solar Farm Grant – further updates to come.

# A bright future for Hospice Hope

The future of our local charity, Hospice Hope, is looking bright as work starts to build them a new day centre to be known as **Bright Hope House.** 

NWLDC has provided land in Swannington so it can create a bespoke facility and continue its work supporting people with life limiting conditions. Local house builder Bloor Homes will fund the building work at no cost to the charity.

Work started on site to build Bright Hope House on Monday 27th February, with the centre expected to open by the end of 2023.

In 2019 Hospice Hope learned that they would have to move out of their current accommodation in Griffydam, so the trustees turned to the District Council for ideas.

In response, the council agreed to lease a plot of land in Swannington to the charity for a peppercorn rent.

Bloor Homes have now started building the bespoke 6,000 sq ft facility.
