Parish Council

The Parish Council have met three times since the last issue of the Packington Post, one of which was an extraordinary meeting to discuss a planning item.

Crime in the village

May - One traffic offence on Coleorton Lane and anti-social behaviour on Spring Lane. June - Criminal damage on Babelake Street and vehicle interference on Heather Lane.

Traffic Calming

Members of the Packington Traffic Calming Group (PTCG) attended the July meeting to discuss the findings of the recent LCC traffic surveys as compared to a private survey, which showed significant speeding on a number of roads in the village. A wide-ranging discussion took place which recognised the frustration of financial limitations at LCC which mean that any traffic calming solutions are unlikely to be provided by them. Council advised that the traffic data should be sent to Leicestershire Police who can influence county decisions.

The PTCG have a priority requirement list which starts with average speed cameras and also includes changes to the pavement on Measham Road to enable it to be used by wheelchairs and mobility scooters, which the Parish Council supported. It was agreed that LCC will be asked whether they will support traffic calming if funding can be found. Council proposed a meeting with LCC and agreed that they will be happy to host and pay for the hire of the meeting room.

Hall Lane/Homecroft Drive

The Council have been working with residents to try and overcome the problems that they have due to sat nav not being able to find Homecroft Drive. With LCC permission, the Parish Council have agreed to pay for a sign which will hopefully relieve these issues.

Events at the Memorial Hall

The Parish Council had a stand at the recent open event at the Memorial Hall, with information about both the council and the Breedon & Kiddier Charity, which owns the recreation ground. They advertised the Solar Farm Funds, which they manage and are

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available as grants to village groups. They were also seeking expressions of interest in allotments as they have a potential site on Babelake Street.

Street Lamps

The County Council is seeking input to a survey on street lamp brightness. In order to save money, they are proposing to dim street lamps to 30% brightness from 8.00pm (they already dim to 30% after 10.00pm). The consultation runs until **Thursday 3rd August** - more information can be found by visiting **www.leicestershire.gov.uk** and searching 'street lighting consultation'.

Coleorton Lane Traveller Site

The traveller site on Coleorton Lane has been granted approval by the Planning Inspectorate. The full decision notice can be found on our website.

Packington Traffic Calming Group

With the long summer days upon us, the clear disregard for the speed limit through the village is more visible than ever. However, we have continued to push forward with ways to make the roads safer in our village.

Progress has been slow as we have been awaiting the traffic survey report from Leicestershire County Council (LCC). However, this has now been received along with their comments:

"Whilst we appreciate your concerns, we do need to advise that the current accident data and recent speed surveys do not justify funding for further traffic safety measures as they do not meet our current criteria."



LCC's traffic survey indicates that traffic is not travelling at an excessive speed. However, residents may recall that the ITS OF A locations of the Council's Automatic **REASON** Traffic Counters were questionable.

The independent traffic survey carried out by Packington Traffic Calming Group fully supports the concerns of residents. This will be forwarded to LCC and Leicestershire Police, and a meeting will be requested to discuss next steps.

We have also raised concerns with LCC regarding the width of the pavement on Measham Road. Not only is it too narrow for pedestrians to walk two abreast, but residents using mobility scooters, wheelchairs and with double prams are unable to utilise this path. This is unacceptable from both a safety aspect and community equality and inclusion. Whilst suggestions have been made to LCC to widen the path (which would also reduce the width of the road, causing traffic to reduce their speed), they have replied advising:

"Officers have assessed the footway width at the above location and can confirm it is of sufficient width for pedestrians to use in single file, the widths range from 1 to 1.6 metres along the footway. The length of the footway in question (starting at the junction with Babelake Street to opposite Vicarage Lane) is approximately 90 metres.

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We appreciate that at busy times, pedestrians will be walking in both directions, however, as is the case where footways are narrow at numerous locations across the County, pedestrians are responsible for ensuring that they overtake / pass pedestrians when it is safe to use the carriageway. We can only advise that all road users should be aware of their surroundings / environment and take appropriate action when required and follow guidance contained within the Highway Code.

Whilst we acknowledge that widening footways can be advantageous to pedestrians and can in some cases assist with slowing traffic, there are also several disadvantages such as:

- cyclists may feel intimidated by some vehicle drivers' behaviours where the road narrows
- It may be difficult to take space from the road, which could already be quite Charrow
- Taking land from the other side of the footway could be very expensive if it is owned privately (as is the case at this location)
- May encourage more clutter to be placed into the footway e.g., wheelie bins
- Some drivers may be tempted to park on wide footways, because they believe there is plenty of space which could further compromise pedestrian safety

In addition to the above, such schemes can only really be looked at as part of larger scale projects which come with their own dedicated budgets. Upgrading this area to facilitate a wider footway is something that would require a substantial level of funding. Schemes like this involve a significant level of engineering design which generally require heavy resource dedicated towards that project as this is due to the multiple elements such as highway maintenance, managing water drainage (which can be complex and costly) and requires a full assessment to understand how the layout would exist prior to committing.

Even if private land was acquired to enable widening of the footway, a broad budget estimate for a standard third party funded footway that we would be prepared to adopt is more than £50,000. We would generally add a further 20% to this to cover full design

costs. As I am sure you can appreciate this is a significant amount of funding even for the County Council to consider."

As anticipated, we have a battle on our hands, but we are still pursuing all avenues.

We now have a constitution in place which will enable us to apply for grants/funds going forward, one of which is the Solar Farm Grant.

And finally, residents will no doubt have noted that the Visual Automated Sign on Measham Road is now back in operation! Only a year of chasing – but we got there!

Villager Interview

Farewell Liz

After 22 years in the village, Liz Deakin, founder of the Friendship Group and an active member of our community, is moving on. The Post caught up with her to find out about her time in the village.



Liz Deakin arrived in Packington on a very rainy December day in 2000. After a busy time dealing with unpacking, she and a friend went to the Bull and Lion for the 'Monday Night Special' meal – the first of many! Afterwards they walked back up to her new house, serenading any passersby with 'Singin in the Rain', and the latest chapter in her life had begun.

Liz was born and brought up in Salford but she met her husband Tony, who worked for the Coal Board, on the Isle of Man. They moved to a village near Chesterfield where they lived for about twenty years, raising their family of four children. In the late 1980s they moved to Coleorton.

However, Tony sadly died in the late 90s and after a couple of years Liz started to look for somewhere for a new start, to reinvent herself. She really liked Packington, but the clincher was that her new house had a room big enough for the baby grand piano!

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The day after she moved in, her next-door neighbour popped round to introduce herself and Liz made the first friend of the many she has in the village. Liz was soon attending Holy Rood church where she became a very active member. She helped with a stall at the local car boot sale, giving balloons to passing youngsters and talking about the church community. She helped at Ready Steady Stick too, a holiday club for primary school children.

Liz was also on the committee of the WI for a while. She and a friend were chatting at the back of the AGM and the chairwoman fixed them with a stare and asked if they would like to be on the committee? What could they say?!

When eventually the WI in Packington had to close, the members were all keen to keep in touch and so Liz set up the Friendship Group to provide that continuity. They met monthly at the Memorial Hall and had tea, coffee, cake and a chat. Sometimes there would be speakers, quizzes, 'bring and buy' sales and beetle drives.

She has also been very involved in lots of village activities including the Lunch Club, the Book Club and keep fit.

When we asked her what she would miss most about Packington her immediate response was her friends and the sense of community. She is also going to miss having the village shop just round the corner.

Liz is moving to Bedford where she will be a short walk from her younger daughter, Sarah. Her new home is in a McCarthy and Stone assisted living complex with many activities for the residents, including a restaurant, and she is looking forward to this new chapter with the same positivity that she brought to her life in Packington. She plans to use modern technology to help her keep in touch with her friends.

Liz summed up the last twenty-two years in Packington; "It has been a fabulous place to live, and I couldn't have chosen a better community to be part of."

The Ashby u3a Science & Technology Group is one of 28 activity groups within the Ashby u3a. But what is the u3a? Founded in 1982, the u3a is a collection of groups (u3as) that run local and online member-led learning for those no longer in full-time work across the UK. Its motto is Learn, Laugh, Live, so it's all about encouraging physical and mental activity into retirement.

Within the Ashby u3a there are groups for a very diverse range of activities, from Arts & Crafts to Wine Appreciation. At the Science & Technology Group, we try to explain the science behind the technology in layman's terms in a friendly environment. A career or academic qualifications in science or technology are not required, just a curiosity to learn more about these subjects, now you have (hopefully) more free time.



This year has seen our attendance grow and we have speakers booked for talks till December. Starting at 2.00pm in **Packington Memorial Hall**, the main talk occupies the first part of the meeting and is given by either a group member or a guest speaker. Members often share their work experiences as professional geologists, science educators or as engineers in aviation, trains, submarines or electronics, focusing on their colourful colleagues as much as the science. Guest speakers are often experts in their field and wildlife subjects are always popular as well as topical ones on climate change and nuclear waste disposal.

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Future talks include:

Tuesday 12th September – Nottingham Trams - building a new tram system in Nottingham

Tuesday 10th October - Climate past, present and future – a comprehensive review by an expert

Tuesday 14th November – Twycross Zoo – the science behind the enclosures

Tuesday 12th December – Searching for the Snow Leopard – one trip to Mongolia was not enough!

After the main talk we review science or technology news items, feature a scientist or engineer whose birthday coincides with the date of the meeting or just highlight one of the many unsung heroes of science. In August we will be led by an expert on a walk listening for bats, a follow-up to a meeting held in June. For next year, we are planning to visit the Forensic Science Department at Derby University. Tea, coffee and biscuits are served at the end of the meeting.

Anniversary 20 Years

Packington Communication Group (PCG) and the Packington Post 20 years on...

Continued from page 1...

At a public meeting, called by the Parish Council, in May 2000 it was decided to canvas residents' thoughts over a wide range of local issues which would help planning to maintain and improve village life. The Packington Appraisal Steering Group (PASG) was formed comprising 12 village residents, a picture of which can be seen in the foyer of the Memorial Hall.

A formal constitution was adopted on 1st August 2000, and a very comprehensive questionnaire, comprising of three sections, was formulated, printed, and circulated to every household (then 312 houses) in November of that year.



Thanks to the efforts of the PASG, who steadfastly and repeatedly called back to collect the completed forms, by early 2001, a fantastic 80% response rate was achieved.

Over the next few months moving into 2001, more than 140,000 tick box responses and over 7,000 written comments were collated by hand and entered onto a computer spreadsheet for analysis.

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Then the mammoth task began of interpreting the results and summarising the recommendations of the PASG.

With my contacts and background in mail order catalogue production, I was able to oversee the result; a professionally designed and produced 36-page report, which was, in 2002, circulated to every house in the village.



The recommendations were summarised in five categories: -Information & Communication Leisure and Recreation Environment & Conservation Traffic & Transport General

Recommendation no.1 in the first category was: -

"That a working party dealing with 'Communication' within the village is formed."

A new group of 12, including some old and some new faces, stepped forward to look at this area.

The first decision was that we should produce a newsletter with two important provisos.

- 1. It should be a professional, full colour production consistent with modern expectations.
- 2. It should be distributed **free of charge** to **all** households in Packington.

Anniversary 20 Years

Funding support was given by the Parish Council and other sources, and plans made for a bi-monthly newsletter – **The Packington Post**.

A competition was held in Packington Primary school and Ivanhoe Community College to design a logo. From 50 entries the winner was 13-year-old Natalie Moreland (see below), a year 8 pupil at Ivanhoe.



With the irreplaceable help of Wes Ewing and his design and printing business Context Print, based in Mill Street, the first eightpage edition appeared in the summer of 2003.
