# **Packington Parish Council**

#### Crime

During the last two months the Police have reported that there had been three crimes. Theft from a car and a building site and a crime of harassment. No further detail was given. The Parish Council urges residents to be vigilant to deter crimes in the village.

### **Flooding**

Again, this has been a real problem with two more notable flooding episodes of the Gilawiskaw and Babelake Street. The Parish Council's working party, FLOAT (Flood Action Team) has met again and is asking for a follow up meeting with LCC, Environment Agency, The Rivers Trust, NWLDC and Severn Trent.

We have not heard anything from the NWLDC Planning Authority as to our inquiries into their procedures and enforcement of flood mitigation on past, present and future building sites to the north of Packington.

### Village CCTV

An update of the system was given by Councillor Powell who said the agreement between the supplier and the Parish Council had almost been finalised and the decision to either go ahead or reject the system would be made at the April council meeting. Councillors were hopeful that a successful outcome would occur.


The council and the independent Traffic Calming group are still awaiting a report by LCC Highways Authority regarding the type of traffic calming measures and cost.

# **Packington Traffic Calming Group**

Some of you will have noticed over the last few months a speed camera van parked in the village enforcing the speed limit into our village.

The Police have recognised that Packington has a speeding issue and some of the driver behaviour is well below the standard it should be. They have therefore added us to their *hot spots* and are now targeting drivers, increasing fines, drivers' awareness courses and points on your licence. It's just not worth speeding. Better to be late than never!!!

Towards the end of 2023 we had a meeting with Leicestershire County Council to discuss further traffic calming measures to reduce the speed through the village. Surveys were carried out in early 2024 and we are awaiting the reports from LCC. We have also been invited to join in the Community Speed Watch initiative this year which will be running in spring/summer. We will be monitoring the speed at different times of the day and relaying this back to LCC to help reinforce traffic calming measures.

As finally the lighter nights are arriving, we will see an increase in motorised traffic and public on foot or bikes. We will no doubt see the speeding problem increase with longer daylight hours. Please be careful when you're out and about enjoying the early spring mornings and evenings.

Recorded speeds through our surveys have shown double the speed limit on all major roads through the village. If you walk/run on the smaller lanes we seem to have some drivers using these lanes like it's a formula one straight! Please take care and enjoy our beautiful village.

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# **Key Handover to Bright Hope**

The ceremony last month marked the conclusion of 5 years work with Bloor Homes and the local council. The facility in Swannington has been funded by Bloor Homes as part of its support for local charities. The state-of-the-art 6,000 square feet centre boasts two complementary therapy rooms, counselling rooms, a quiet room, workshop for hobbies and training/technical facilities, a dining room, lounge, conference room and offices.

It can accommodate up to 20 people in daycare for three days a week, where guests can enjoy daily activities and a hot meal at lunchtime. We will also host a wide range of services provided by Bright Hope and its partner organisations. NWLDC has provided the charity with a 150-year lease over the land at a peppercorn rent so we can call the building home for many years to come. This unique collaboration enables Bright Hope to develop and build on all we have learned and achieved over the past 20 years. We now look forward to the next stage of developing our services in this wonderful building for the people of Packington and NW Leicestershire.

Bright Hope provides day care, counselling, befriending and complementary therapy for people with life limiting conditions, allowing carers to take a well-earned break.

We would like to say a very big thank you to the residents of Packington who have over the years supported us and continue to do so. We could not have done this without you.







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# **Packington History Group**

### **Update - Preserving Packington's Past**

Many thanks to all those who have already responded to the article on the front page of the previous issue no 124 of the Packington Post in which Packington Village History Group (PVHG) requested information from readers and residents about the date of construction of their individual properties.

We have had a magnificent initial response and think we already have sufficient data to be able to date the construction of all the houses in Brook Close, Century Drive, The Grange, Hall Farm Close, Homecroft Drive, and Nethercroft Drive. We have also received information to enable us to include the seven new bungalows being constructed on the soon to be named Mychecroft Drive adjoining Ashby Road.

We have had a good response from individual residents in almost every other road in Packington. We will get back to those who have raised questions about their properties as soon as possible.

There are however still big gaps in our data on Ashby Road, Bridge Street, Hall Lane, Heather Lane, High Street, Leicester Road, Measham Road, Mill Street, Normanton Road, Spring Lane, and Vicarage Lane where there are many individually built properties of varying dates.

We are hopeful that as the spring-cleaning season gets under way in Packington, residents will be venturing into their lofts, attics, garages, potting sheds, or even looking in their cupboards, filing cabinets, chests of drawers etc, and coming across those long-forgotten deeds and old manuscripts and will think to themselves, I must make a note of that date of sale/construction of my house and email it to:

#### Request for information – Thomas Oakey

The History Group has obtained copies of three manuscripts written by villager Thomas Oakey in and soon after 1900, describing Holy Rood Church at that time. He tells us what he thought about changes which occurred back then and paints a vivid picture of church life. Thomas was born in or about 1875, grew up at Redburrow Farm and in adult life farmed at Hill Farm, which was then situated in High Street just above the Bull and Lion. He married Janet, nee Blackburn in 1905 and they had children Thomas, Janet and Frederick. He died in February 1940 and was buried in the Holy Rood churchyard.
