Parish Council Chairman's Report

Councillors and Meetings

The council meet every month, usually the first Tuesday and we have had a very good representation from all councillors throughout the year. In May of last year, a new council was formed. There were five nominations which returned unopposed and a sixth councillor was appointed following the co-option procedures laid down for Parish Councils. The new councillors were, Paul Fleetham and Bryan Smith.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow councillors for their commitment and input into the wide variety of decisions and actions the council has had to make.

Planning

The Parish Council are consultees in this matter and, whilst the Parish Council plays a small role in deciding the outcome of planning decisions, most decisions during the last twelve months were non-controversial. We have, however, stuck to the principle that Packington's development boundary, expressed by the NWLDC strategic plan, must be upheld.

It is disappointing to note that several new builds have been allowed outside this development boundary under the selfbuild rule. The result of an appeal by the Travellers for their site on Coleorton Lane was announced in their favour in June. Again, another development outside the development limits.

Flooding

What a dreadful year it has been for the Gilawiskaw and for all who live and work near the flooding areas. There have been four major flooding events since September last year.

The first proved the worst and the others were not much better. Mill Street, Babelake Street and Heather Lane were badly affected and even national TV came out to interview some homeowners who had up to several feet of water in their downstairs rooms.

The council's working group FLOAT has met numerous times and there are ongoing

talks with the Environment Agency, LCC, Highways England, The Rivers Trust and Severn Trent, but it has been very difficult to get any commitment yet from any of these bodies to find a solution.

The council has asked NWLDC to make sure water run off upstream is mitigated and that the planned enlargement of Ashby is managed in terms of flood risk downstream. Whether this can be achieved is up to the planners and the NWLDC Planning Committee.

Traffic Calming

This item is always on the agenda and the council would like to thank the residents Traffic Calming Group for their efforts into finding solutions. The County Council's view is that they have no money and will not support villages which have few traffic safety incidents over a five-year period. However, they may be able to approve measures where they are self-funded. Both the council and the Traffic Calming Group are now in a position to view what the LCC will approve and the costs of the measures.

Police Reports

This is a standard agenda item. A police report is sent to the clerk before the council's monthly meeting. Throughout 2023-24, crime in Packington has been low and the improvement seen after the installation of a village CCTV scheme has been maintained.

CCTV

The council has continued to debate this topic and has asked that quotes be obtained from suppliers in order to improve the current system. We thank Anthony Cash and Karl Saunt for overseeing the CCTV system.

Neighbourhood Watch

I am pleased to report that our new Councillor Bryan Smith has undertaken a lead role in this area. He has renewed and found new contacts to enable a co-ordinated Neighbourhood Watch programme for the village. This was an integral part of the council's recent "Welfare and Safety Event".

137 Funding

The council is able to give financial support to recreational activities and facilities. 137 funding is responsible for the maintenance of the play equipment and the grass cutting of the Recreation Ground on Measham Road. Maintenance of this facility has been undertaken by staff from the NWLDC Works Dept. and paid for by the Parish Council.

The Parish Council agreed a grant of £2500 for financing the Packington Post for another year and also support for the Horticultural Society and the Traffic Calming Group, paying venue costs for shows and meetings.

Grants

The Parish Council are able to distribute grant funding to projects within the Parish under the 137 rule. We are also able to distribute money acquired from the Solar Farm Community Fund.

Solar Farm Grants

The council manages funds which are supplied by two Solar Farm Companies. The Packington Brownies, who meet at Hill Farm and the Packington Community Choir have both received funding this year.

Entrances to the Village

Again, I must pay tribute to Councillor Bob Martin who has taken responsibility for the planters at all entrances to the village. He has been the driving force to get these planters and make them up with colourful displays of flowers. He and his team of helpers are much appreciated.

King's Coronation

The Parish Council was instrumental in setting up a working party to mark this occasion. A party in the park event was staged successfully and we engaged the school in a poster competition. The posters were judged and then used to decorate the lamp posts around the village. The winners of each age group received a small prize along with an English oak tree and a winner's plaque. The trees can be seen planted on the roadside bank of the Recreation Ground. Special thanks go to the Organising Working Party who made things happen.

Charities

The Parish Council is responsible for managing two charities; **The Recreation Ground Charity** and **the Earl of Huntingdon Charity**. The Huntingdon
Charity is a parcel of land around 17 acres adjoining Hill Farm Spring Lane. The rent from this land is used to support widows and widowers within the Parish of Packington.

The Recreation Ground Charity provides a space for recreation which is fitted out with numerous facilities and is a suitable area to hold events such as Party in the Park, football matches, bonfire parties, and general play. The Trustees are the Parish Councillors and they are responsible for its maintenance. The main income for this facility is the proceeds raised from the annual bonfire party and grants from the 137 Parish Council Budget.

Freedom Of Information

The council is bound by the Freedom of Information Act and all business conducted by the parish can be viewed on our website. Parish meetings, audits and notifiable material will still be posted on noticeboards.

In conclusion may I thank our hard-working clerk who has gone that extra mile to keep this council on the straight and narrow. She maintains our website, is our financial officer and guides us through procedural and policy matters whilst preparing thoroughly for meetings. She contacts hundreds of officers and officials on our behalf over the year and keeps everyone informed. Thank you, Alex.

To finish, may I say that I might have forgotten to mention some minor issues in this report. For instance, I have not mentioned finance as much as I should have done. Welfare and Safety Event Update

The Packington Welfare and Safety Partnership launched on 15th March with residents turning out to see and hear from the village groups that attended.



Representatives from Neighbourhood Watch, Packington Social and Kind, the Church, FLOAT, Packington Communication Group and the Traffic Calming Group all took the time to tell us more about their work and their plans for the future. We also had representatives from the local police and from first responders who gave demonstrations of resuscitation and the use of a defibrillator.



The Neighbourhood Watch Team are working to re-connect with representatives and reinvigorate the scheme across Packington. They will be looking for volunteers to fill any gaps and creating an action plan. Together with the CCTV and Packington Watch team they are key to safety and security in the village.

The CCTV scheme has helped over the years to identify traffic or individuals coming into the village and help the police with evidence following an incident. The Parish Council is working with the CCTV group to formalise the scheme and improve it where necessary.

The Packington Communication Group – home of the Packington Post, email alerts, www.packington.info, Facebook page and welcome pack for new residents encouraged us to let them know about new residents so that they can receive the welcome pack and be added to circulation lists.

The Traffic Calming Group - formed in the last 2 years, is determined and driven to get better traffic calming for Packington – they are working with all parties to get results. One of the main issues is funding but they are working to find a solution, even if it means self-funding. They thanked PCSO Nick Hayling and colleagues who have helped to increase the number of visits from the police van to Packington.

FLOAT continues to liaise with the County Council, NWLDC and the Environment Agency to push for works to reduce flooding in the village and to improve the warning system – currently the flood alert monitor is downstream of the village meaning that alerts are received too late.

Holy Rood Church – representatives reminded us that there are events such as Coffee and Chat at the church and the lunch group provide a hot lunch on a regular basis for those who want to meet up over a good meal.

The WhatsApp Groups – a useful communication tool over the last few years and a vital way of keeping in touch. Please note that Social and Kind have now changed to Packington Chat and Packington Notice Board respectively.

Next steps ...

We held this event to mainly communicate the idea of the **Packington Welfare and Safety Partnership** and our first question is "can we improve what is here now?"

Thank you to all of the groups and everyone who came along to the meeting and for your continued hard work.

Local Development Update

As most of you know, the Parish Council has been working hard to maintain new housing development within the development boundary set by the District Council. As the District Council does not have a core strategy or local plan in place, the boundary appears to be very fragile, allowing developers to have greater opportunities to build in open countryside outside the historic limits to development. Officials at the District Council, who we pay for through our Council Tax, have been working on a plan since 2006!

Recently, the District Council conducted a consultation on the proposed draft for a New Local Plan in the NW Leicestershire area. On a cold Autumn Day, council officials were stationed outside Tesco's in Ashby offering the chance to look at the proposals. Notices asking for your views were in the local paper and online too. The results have just been published and the responses appear to be few.

The Parish Council were told that the District Council had a healthy five-year land supply for new development. In January and February, this was challenged by developers who won their appeal. The District Council were also taken to a judicial review by developers wanting to build 600 houses at Moneyhill and again they succeeded. Due to this decision, we're told Severn Trent stepped in, prohibiting any further development within the catchment area of the Gilawiskaw and the River Mease.

Children from the village and Packington primary school proudly showed off the May sticks they had made, gaining full approval from the Garland Dancers and Morris Men.

As tradition dictates, the dancers then set off with their newly crowned Queen to parade through the village. Joined by many others, music and smiles were plenty as everyone joined in to spread good cheer before returning to the Bull and Lion for some welcome refreshments, and of course, more singing and dancing!



Packington Traffic Calming Group

Readers may have recently noticed Community Speed Watch Campaign signs displayed on lampposts throughout the village and people in hi-vis jackets lurking on street corners! This is due to a campaign organised by the group with Leicestershire County Council.



Members of the PTCG, along with volunteers from the village, recently received training to record the speed of traffic in an attempt to deter high speed motorists, and to highlight and obtain yet more evidence of the traffic speed problem we have in Packington.

- Between 3.00pm and 4.00pm on one day, 33 vehicles were recorded exceeding 35mph on Ashby Road.
- Between 5.00pm and 6.00pm on one day, 14 vehicles were recorded exceeding 35mph on Measham Road (a speed of 50mph recorded)
- Between 7.00am and 8.00am on one day, 18 vehicles were recorded exceeding 35mph on Measham Road.
- Numerous offenders have been noted as residents from the village.
- Unfortunately, the highest speeds recorded so far (52mph on Ashby Road and 61mph on Bridge Street – both with a 30mph limit) were motorists who live in the village!

This is very disappointing, and we clearly have a long way to go in getting our message across – **SPEED KILLS!**

We have now received a detailed proposal and costing for potential solutions for traffic calming from Leicestershire County Council, following a site visit from one of their engineers. Whilst a lot of work is still yet to be done, we feel that this is a major step towards gaining the support of LCC and puts us in a position where we are now able to progress in the direction of quantifying a traffic calming scheme and attempting to gain monetary support from various sources. If anyone is aware of any available grants or organisations we can approach, please get in touch!

The PTCG was formed 2 years ago following a near fatal accident opposite the Recreation Ground entrance. We would like to thank again, the residents of the village and readers of the Packington Post for your continued support.







Packington History Group

Construction Survey Update

As I write this article, Packington Village History Group (PVHG) has now received data confirming the age of construction of almost half of the properties in Packington. We think there are c360 individual residential buildings in Packington and we now have information on the date of construction of 170+ of these.

From this existing data we may be able to gather an appreciable number of additional properties adjoining the ones where dates of construction have already been supplied, where there is evidence that adjoining properties were constructed by the same builder. Developments constructed between the World Wars were frequently on a much smaller scale than in the post war years and restricted to two or three properties being built at a time.

In some cases, we have been given sight of deeds relating to Packington properties which go back to the Hastings family who owned the freehold of many village properties up until the 1920s.

Some house deeds have reminded us of the hardship involved in life in the early part of the previous century where property owners had the need to rely on a specified neighbour's well for their water supply and also help fund its upkeep!

Many thanks to all those who have responded so far. If you have not contacted us yet, please help our village project and get in touch with the date of construction of your property.

Although this agency is no longer running, Caring for Gods Acre and the Wildlife Trust are very keen to continue keeping these spaces as a haven for wildlife.




