Packington Traffic Calming Group

Following our article in the last edition of the Post, readers may be interested to know the results of the two-week Community Speed Watch Campaign.

240 letters were sent to drivers, with 6 second letters then sent.



The Police Traffic Management team were grateful for the work carried out and asked us to pass on their thanks to those who volunteered for their "hard work and commitment". This information will now be passed onto the beat team for some enforcement attention. Unfortunately, we were unable to include Normanton Road in our campaign due to this road being covered by the Mobile Police Camera Van. However, during the Mobile Police Van's 80-minute visit in May, they recorded 10 offences on Normanton Road/Coleorton Lane.

As anticipated, the team were subjected to numerous gestures and verbal abuse from drivers during the two weeks, along with one driver being quite confrontational and questioning. It is unfortunate that some drivers were unable to see or understand that the actions being taken were all in an effort to try to make the village a safer place and to try to prevent any future fatalities. On the whole, we received a lot of support from residents and passers-by and we are very grateful for this.

We have recently been successful in our application for the North West Leicestershire Community Lottery and we are in the process of applying for National Lottery Community Funding. We are, however,

unsure as to whether we are eligible for this or whether the campaign falls under "activities that replace government funding". Watch this space!

All Change at the Bull & Lion

This week, the existing tenants of the Bull & Lion announced on Packington social media that they were leaving on 8th October.

Marstons recently sold their 40% stake in the brewing joint venture with Carlsberg to, they say, concentrate on the pub portfolio. Enquiries have been made with Marstons and their advert for a new landlord is located on their website. It is not clear whether this is for a tenant (as before) or a manager. However, the following paragraph in the advert might indicate a change in concept as the several former tenants, it is believed, were responsible for their own food purchases and offerings. "All of your stock, including food, and all associated consumables are supplied by Marston's, although you will be responsible for managing it once it has been delivered"

The following quote is directly from their website:

"They are seen as an affordable treat and our high-quality pubs are at the heart of many local communities, offering a warm welcome. A place to enjoy good company. Marston's is a people-powered business, and our behaviours and strategic objectives are core to how we achieve our purpose."

Let us hope that they are successful in attracting a suitable candidate that can stay the course and fulfil their objectives. We might be forgiven for being sceptical given the regular turnover with short tenures of landlords since long serving Ray Connelly died in 2004.

We are waiting for further clarification and as soon as more information is available, it will be circulated on all of the usual village communication channels.

Parish Council

Packington Parish Council meet regularly on the first Tuesday of the month and have recently addressed questions from parishioners. These questions have revolved around the poor visibility and access to both sides of the exit junctions of Homecroft Drive and the poor visibility in both directions when leaving High Street and turning on to Measham Road.

The danger is caused by cars parking without any thought to other road users or pedestrians. The patches of grass at these junctions should be left unobstructed as they are designated by the local authority as safety spaces called visibility displays. As safety on the highway is a strong concern for the Parish Council and the resident's traffic calming group, we have already acted. The police, who have already inspected both sites to view the problem, say, "No one should be parking on either side of the Homecroft grass areas or obstructing vision of Measham Road". They are recommending the Parish Council erect soft landscaping for both areas.

Packington Parish Council has already set up a consultation process and await the outcome. If you are submitting a comment to the clerk, please bear in mind the measures are to ensure road safety, accident and injury prevention.

Another matter on safety. If you have a hedge backing onto to the side of roads or footpaths - in particular Little Lane, High Street, Homecroft Drive or Measham Road -please trim closely so there is no danger to anyone's eyes and face when passing.

Please look at any hedges where the public are passing. If there is still a problem in August the Parish Council may have to cut your hedge and sorry to say, we will send you an invoice for the work. If you have a physical problem in removing the overgrown hedge, the council may be able to assist.

One final point, if your hedge is more than 90cm - 95 cm high and obstructing vision at junctions, it could mean you are contravening planning law.

Following our inspection on 4th June 2024, we were proud to announce that Ofsted continues to judge Packington CofE Primary School as a 'GOOD' school. 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Packington Memorial Hall

Back in March, the Memorial Hall had its Annual General Meeting, and I am pleased to report that all roles within the Management Committee were filled by volunteers who had previously held that position. As chairman, it was my privilege to give an annual report at the meeting and I am again pleased to say that at the present time, the hall is thriving. Bookings remain high and as a result, the Memorial Hall is in a good financial position. The booking secretary recently looked at similar venues within the district and found that Packington Memorial Hall was a really good price and offered more at a lower rate than many other community spaces.

The hall's appearance is important to the committee and we have engaged professional people to repair and decorate where necessary. We ask all of our users to look after the facility and would like to think that Packington residents appreciate the care and attention that is given to maintain the hall. Recently, we have upgraded most of the light fittings within the hall and the extra brightness that the LED fixtures bring is remarkable.

As the hall is officially known as Packington Memorial Hall, we have been contacted by the National War Memorial Society to have our hall officially registered on the War Memorial Register. If you look into the background story of the hall, it was back in 1946/7 that villagers began to look into providing a memorial to both World Wars.

It was noted that an article in the Packington Post mentioned the fitting of solar panels to the roof of the hall. The committee have looked into this but has found that the configuration of the roof does not lend itself to good solar energy production.

Another article in the Post also stated that the hall committee had a duty to the youth of the village and to set up a youth club. Like the article's author, the committee would love a youth club to be formed and anyone interested in leading one should get in touch with the booking secretary. When the youth club closed, the committee reserved the day and hours for a long time but when nobody came forward to create a new youth club, the committee reluctantly offered the time and space to other groups. However, through its present users, the hall is catering for youth.

We have a karate and table tennis youth group; the local school runs discos and many birthday parties are held for all age groups.

Anne Wathes

If you're a regular reader of the Packington Post, you won't be unfamiliar with the name Anne Wathes, a long-standing village resident who was recently awarded the Village Community Champion Award. The Post caught up with her to find out more about her life, interests and the time she dedicates to the village community.



Anne was born in Tredegar, South Wales, where she lived with her mother until sadly losing her father in a tragic accident. It was after this that Anne's mother, originally from lbstock, decided to leave Wales and return to the area she knew well.

In 1970, Anne married Keith, a thirdgeneration farmer here in Packington and went on to have three children, Vicky, Jane and Matt who between them, have blessed Anne and Keith with six grandchildren.

Over the years, besides helping out on the farm and raising her family, Anne has worked at Ibstock chemist, (as it was known back then), the pharmacy at Barlestone surgery and on reception for the out of hours service at Coalville hospital.

It was the City and Guilds Course in cake decorating that Anne took in the late 1980's that she is most proud of. From this, Anne went on to start up her own business, regularly supplying birthday and anniversary cakes to The Lyric Rooms, Café 76 and Mr Bun the Baker, all of which were once in Ashby. Anne's love of baking continues to this day, obvious through the wide variety of delicious cakes on offer at the church coffee mornings with lemon drizzle, I am told, being the top of the request list!

So how did Anne become involved with the church? It was around 2006, she recalls,

when Margaret Andrews, another village resident, convinced her to join the church choir. In the years that followed, Anne went on to take over the church coffee and chat and the charity coffee mornings, both of which continue to be a popular fixture in the church calendar all these years on.

Not only is Anne kept busy with the organising and baking for the coffee mornings, she also runs, with her army of volunteers, the soup and pudding events, luncheons and afternoon teas throughout the year, the New Year's Day lunch and more recently, Toastie Thursday. It can be easy to forget that alongside all of the marvellous social events for church that Anne is an integral part of, she also sits on the Holy Rood Church Committee, seeing projects such as the Eco Church brought to life. Asked what inspires her to continue the work she does, she told me that it's just nice to give something back and that over the years, it has helped her confidence to grow.

When asked what winning the Community Champion Award meant to her, Anne shared that at first it was a total shock but that it really was lovely to receive recognition, alongside Martin and Louise, for the work we all do.

At 73 years young, there is no sign that Anne will be slowing down anytime soon, with the upcoming Open Gardens and Church Flower Festival bearing testament to her dedication! Although Anne no longer 'actively' farms, she is still on call to help nurture the lambs or any animal that might need a bit of extra mothering - one of her favourite things to do. On the rare occasion that Anne gets to enjoy some free time, she tells me she enjoys gardening, reading and walking the dogs, taking them out into the meadow, away from the traffic and noise to enjoy the views over Packington and, of course, the peace and quiet.

Reflecting on village life, Anne tells me the best thing about Packington has to be Pete's, aka Daybreak Services. When asked what her favourite memory of the village is, she fondly recalled the carnivals and the numerous costumes that were made in her own barn, and that of Robert Plant, a fellow farmer and friend. Lastly, when I asked her what her one wish for the future of the village would be, she said most passionately that she hopes Holy Rood Church will survive the changes that are coming.

Featured in the meeting room at the Memorial Hall will be a display by the History Group which will include present information about the group and its building date project.




