

Editorial Note: Packington Parish Council is responsible for administering the Parish Precept of approximately £25,000 which is collected as part of your council tax. It also administers the Community Benefit fund which is income from two local Solar farms. In addition, councillors are Trustees of two village Charities - the Recreation Ground Charity and the Earl of Huntingdon Charity. The latter owns 16 acres of land on Spring Lane which is currently let to a local farmer.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the current clerk, Alex, for all her help and attention over the past few years and we wish her every success and happiness in her new position.


Packington Traffic Calming Group

We recently received data from the Community Speed Watch campaign which took place in April. This shows the speed of the traffic recorded before and after the campaign. This data clearly shows a reduction in speed on all roads following the campaign – a positive result!

However, the data also shows that the speed limit on Ashby Road and Measham Road is still being exceeded, even **AFTER** the campaign. The 85th percentile reducing from 44mph to 37mph on Measham Road and from 45mph to 43mph on Ashby Road. The mobile police van did not visit the village in June but made two visits to Normanton Road and Coleorton Lane in July with seven offences recorded. We are currently making enquiries with the police as to whether the location of the mobile van can be changed at each visit to Packington rather than being restricted to Normanton Road.

Readers will be aware from our article in the May edition of the Packington Post that we have been liaising with Leicestershire County Council who advise that there are no funds available for traffic calming in Packington. We are therefore left with no choice but to raise the funds ourselves and we have asked LCC for a detailed proposal of possible traffic calming solutions which we have now received. They have confirmed that the estimated cost to complete the works based on their plan is **£154,763.28**.

This could be achieved through a phased delivery over a period of time on smaller projects, circa £25,000. The proposal includes a substantial scheme to reduce vehicle speeds on Measham Road and Ashby Road consisting of a priority narrowing, see the image below as an example.



We have applied to the Parish Council for a contribution from the Solar Farm Grant. We are also making enquiries with the Parish Council with regards to two charities for which the councillors are trustees - the Recreational Ground Charity and the Earl of Huntingdon Charity. Unfortunately, following enquiries with the National Lottery and People's Postcode, the group do not meet the criteria and are considered ineligible.

On a final note, a resident from the village reported to the group a vehicle being driven by a parent or carer from Packington Primary School being parked extremely close to the junction of Mill Street and Measham Road, and then reversing blindly from this position onto Measham Road. A collision was narrowly avoided with a transit van travelling at speed along Measham Road.

The speeding motorcyclist involved in this incident suffered horrendous injuries, but fortunately survived.

Film Club returned from its summer break on **Friday 13th September** with the film One Life, based on the true story of British humanitarian Nicholas Winton.

Our film for Friday 11th October will be Wicked Little Letters (15)



A 1920s English seaside town bears witness to a dark, absurd scandal in this riotous mystery comedy. Based on a stranger-thanfiction true story, **Wicked Little Letters** follows two neighbours: deeply religious local Edith Swan (Olivia Colman) and rowdy Irish migrant Rose Gooding (Jessie Buckley). When Edith and fellow residents start to receive wicked letters full of unintentionally hilarious profanities, foul-mouthed Rose is charged with the crime. The anonymous letters prompt a national uproar, and a trial ensues. However, as the town's women, led by Police Officer Gladys Moss (Anjana Vasan) begin to investigate the crime themselves, they suspect that something is amiss and Rose might not be the culprit after all.

Warning: severe profanities and cussing aplenty but modulated by the comic context in this film.

A critics view: "The range of insults sprinkled in with a healthy dose of f-bombs is truly awe-inspiring. The letters are spicy for the villagers, but for a modern-day audience, they're just delightfully silly. Unless you happen to be offended by foul language."

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As we move to Friday 8th November we will be showing Back to Black (15)



A celebration of the most iconic - and much missed - homegrown star of the 21st century, BACK TO BLACK tells the extraordinary tale of Amy Winehouse. Painting a vivid, vibrant picture of the Camden streets she called home and capturing the struggles of global fame, BACK TO BLACK honours Amy's artistry, wit and honesty, as well as trying to understand her demons. An unflinching look at the modern celebrity machine and a powerful tribute to a once-in-a-generation talent.


